**TODAY'S WEATHER**  
Portland and vicinity—Tonight and Friday probably fair; variable winds.  
Oregon—Tonight and Friday fair; gentle variable winds, mostly easterly.  
Washington—Tonight and Friday fair except possibly rain near the coast; gentle winds, mostly easterly.

**WEATHER CONDITIONS**  
A low pressure area of unusual depth is central in Missouri. The barometer stands about an inch below normal. Low pressure continues on the coast of Alaska and British Columbia. Centers of high pressure are shown in California, off the North Atlantic coast and in Middle Tennessee. Precipitation has occurred on the Middle and North Pacific slopes, and an area reaching from Saskatchewan southeastward to Tennessee and the lower Mississippi valley. The weather is generally clear and dry. In Montana, North Dakota, Manitoba, Alberta, Oklahoma and Arizona, the weather is mild in the south and lower temperature in the north. In the lower Mississippi and upper Missouri valleys the temperature amounts to more than 20 degrees.
