# Rural Health Bill Goes to Congress, Is Word to Board

A rural health bill, giving aid to the various states by allotting money to be expended for sanitation of rural districts, contingent upon the appropriations by the states of similar sums, has been introduced in congress, according to a letter received by the state board of health from Surgeon General Blue of the United States public health service.

The beneficial effect of the federal aid extension principle has been demonstrated in good roads promotion, and more recently in the prevention, control and cure of venereal diseases, according to Surgeon General Blue.

The present Oregon legislature should be urged, said Dr. A. C. Seely, state health officer, "to provide a contingent appropriation in order to get the benefit of this federal aid. Oregon's allotment would be \$28,702.53."

# WHITE SLAVE TRIAL ENDS IN CONVICTION OF BAKER BROTHERS

Young Women Appearing Against Defendants Tell Sensational Stories as Witnesses.

Guilt on two of the four counts of a white slave indictment was the verdict returned Wednesday by the jury in Federal Judge Wolverton's court against Owen and Harry Baker.

The counts on which the brothers were found guilty were those involving the transportation of Frances Guthrie and Laura Soderquist from San Francisco to Portland, and a similar act from Wallace, Idaho, to Portland. Counts three and four were based on the sending of a telegraphic money order from Portland to Wallace to allow the girls to purchase their tickets.

A motion asking for 10 days in which to prepare for a new trial was allowed by the court. Immediately after the verdict was read the trial of the Bakers on the second white slave indictment was continued. Practically the entire morning session was consumed in the direct examination of Mildred Fitzhenry, who, according to her testimony, is 18 years old.
