LABOR NOTES

After long debate the Central Labor council adopted a resolution Thursday night refusing to participate in a jurisdictional dispute over an agreement between the theater owners and various unions, made first in 1915 and renewed in 1918.

Efforts to secure a meeting of the Mooney committee to hear reports of delegates to the Chicago Mooney conference have failed three times in succession. The local committee is supposed to consist of one delegate from each local union in Portland.

The Central Labor council has endorsed a bill in congress to establish a department of education, with the head of it to have a seat in the president's cabinet.

A number of labor unions throughout the city will send telegrams to the Multnomah delegation in the state senate asking for the passage of house bill 203, now before the senate.
