The Lenten season is here once again and, naturally, we ask ourselves what it means to us this year, perhaps, compared with the years that have gone before.

Lent is a time when we stop to con sider and meditate upon our spiritual condition. The word Lent has no special significance save only as it designates the time of the fast before Easter. The word is derived from the Anglo-Saxon "lencten" which means the spring season. From this we learn that the Lenten Dr. fast means simply the fast that comes in the spring of the year.

It was appointed at this time for the reason that our Lord's passion and death occurred at this time of the year and these devotions of the faithful grouped themselves around that sad hour on Calvary.
