

PRIVATE INTERESTS ASKED TO GET NEW WORK UNDER WAY

Chamber of Commerce Makes Suggestions for Solution of Problem of the Unemployed.

EXPANSION PROGRAM NEED

Counties and State Expected to Get Road Work Under Way Within the Next Few Weeks.

Appeals are being made to private business for an exhibition of the same progressive and confident course evinced by public bodies in handling the problem of a steadily growing army of unemployed.

Mr. Olmstead holds a very optimistic view of the manner in which Oregon is going to bear up under the stress of the period of reconstruction inasmuch as the public bodies are concerned, but feels that it is necessary now to urge the importance of action on individual interests.

Touching on the matter of increased employment, a comprehensive outline has been approved by the Chamber of Commerce.

The suggestions come under 13 points and are summed up as follows:

Have the government permit, through the shipping board, the use of wooden steamers for hauling lumber at rates which will guarantee a spread incentive for this business, and then have the railroad administration enter the market for tie and other materials which are needed for their maintenance.

Take up with the food administration plans to get flour moved out of this port so that new mills which are planning to locate here may be encouraged to build at an early date; present to the shipping board the fact that a number of firms are awaiting the announcement that vessels will be provided for a regular orient run before building new industries here.

Early Highway Work Needed Urge extensions and improvements by some of the local industries; have the school board of this district adopt a capacity building program; have all the counties in this district undertake as much road work as funds will guarantee; encourage the dock commission to maximum production within the limits of safety.
