WEATHER CONDITIONS Low pressure prevails in the extreme North-west, over a considerable portion of the Plaims region, and on the Atlantic coast. Elsewhere the pressure is moderately high. Differences in pressure are less pronounced than for some time. Precipitation has occurred over two irregular areas, one reaching from the Middle and North Pacific coast to Colorado and Nebrarks, and the other from the Lower Mississippi valley to the Middle and North Atlantic coast. The following heavy rainfall is reported: Knowille, Tenn., 1.14; Eureka, Cal. 1.02. The weather is much colder in British Columbia, the Northern Bocky Mountain region and most of the states east of the Mississippi river, and is much milder in the Plaims region. 


