

Police Prophecy Of Murder True

"Blackhand" Murder in Chicago Follows Closely on Attempt at Assassination.

Chicago, March 13.—(I. N. S.)—Ready fulfillment of the police prophecy that more "blackhand" murders would follow the attempt to assassinate Mrs. Jennie Finnick Wednesday night came true before 9 o'clock today when Genero Oriani was shot and killed.

Two men stopped Oriani as he left his home and after exchanging a few words with him fired a volley of shots into his body. Oriani was shot in the back of the head, the right eye, the left ear and in the back. He died instantly. The murderers escaped.

Carlo Finnick, aged 9, and his 3-year-old brother, Cosmi, are today being guarded by detectives who fear that members of the "blackhand" gang who several weeks ago murdered their father and seriously wounded their mother Wednesday night, may make an attempt on the lives of the children, in an effort to wipe out entirely the Finnick family.

Detectives investigating say all members of the Finnick family were "marked for death" several weeks ago as a result of a Sicilian feud following Finnick's success in the wine business.

Wednesday night two men called at the home of Mrs. Finnick, and, after firing five shots at her, wounding her in the chest, arm and neck, escaped.

Mrs. Finnick is reported in a serious condition today.

Frederick P. Jones, Citizen of Albany, Passes Suddenly

Albany, March 13.—Hearing an unusual restlessness upon the part of her husband, Mrs. Frederick P. Jones went to his bedside at 1 o'clock Tuesday morning and found him unconscious. He died before a doctor could reach the home.

Rheumatism of the heart is said to have been the cause of his death. Mr. Jones was 69 years of age. He was born in New York City 35 years ago and had lived in Albany since 1913.

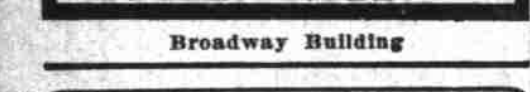

Portland Varsity Man Makes 65,000 Miles by Water

University of Oregon, Eugene, March 13.—To have traveled 65,000 miles on the water since his enlistment in the navy two years ago, is the experience of Eugene George Colton, a senior in the university from Portland, who withdrew from school in 1917 to enlist, and who visited with friends on the campus Tuesday while on a furlough from New York.

Mr. Colton left school the day before war was declared and on April 13 enlisted on Friday in the Thirtieth naval district and later was given a pay check of the number 13.

"This is about as far as the number 13 went in my experiences, however," Mr. Colton said, "and I wouldn't say it proved an unlucky number for me, either."

After cruising in waters about Mexico, Central and South America and Hawaii for more than a year after his enlistment he was transferred to the United States navy steam engineers' school at Hoboken, N. J. He entered as chief machinist's mate and took work in 14 marine machine shops in New York city. After completing the course, Mr. Colton was detailed for overseas duty on the U. S. S. George Washington, with Brest as a destination. At this time he was given an assignment to the position as warrant machinist.

On his return he was given an assignment's commission.

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Mrs. Finnick is reported in a serious condition today.

Graveling John Day highway in Wheeler county, Crook-Benton section, 5.5 miles south of Fossil, 1.6 miles in length.
