

ARMENIAN RELIEF DRIVE TO KEEP UP BALANCE OF WEEK

Chairman Dougall Says Campaigners Will Continue Effort to Make Up \$20,000 Shortage

HUMAN LIVES ARE AT STAKE

Deficiency Means That Poor Souls Who Have Suffered Long Must Yield Up Lives in Pain.

Portland's Armenian relief fund drive will be continued until end of the week. This announcement was made this morning by City Chairman John T. Dougall, who said that the campaigners would continue their efforts to make up the \$20,000 shortage announced Tuesday because every dollar of the shortage means a definite amount of food not sent to the starving women and children war victims of the Hun and the Turk.

"This shortage means the actual loss of lives," said Mr. Dougall, "and we are determined if possible to make up every dollar of it. Our campaigners are tired but plucky, and we are still getting subscriptions both through our solicitors and through checks sent in direct to Ben Selling or to our headquarters. More solicitors are still needed. It is not yet too late to help either by personal service or by additional subscriptions. Let everyone help us make up this shortage and save Portland the humiliation of failing to respond to this pitiable cry for relief from the suffering, homeless, starving people of Armenia."

A telegram was received from national headquarters, quoting a cable from relief workers at Tabriz, Persia, dated March 11. This telegram served as a spur to the determined spirit of the campaign workers who had gathered for their day of canvassing. The cablegram is quoted as follows: "Widespread famine through Armenia. Refugees slowly starving on animal corpses, slaughter house blood and chaff. Cholera expected this summer. Drugs and food positively must be imported. Three hundred and thirty thousand in West Caucasus alone need help."

Among this morning's contributions to the fund were: Western Co-operative company employees, \$150; Foster & Kleiser employees, \$34.50; U. S. Laundry employees, \$35.55; Coast Culvert company employees, \$60.50; Wilson-Clarke Lumber company employees, \$25.50; J. D. Farrell, \$100.

A unique subscription was a \$10 check, sent in by Albina Fuel company, with the statement that this amount was the settlement of a disputed account, which both parties had agreed should be sent to the Armenian relief fund.

A further subscription of \$8.50 was received from the "Buck Bee" club yesterday afternoon. This contribution was brought in by three little girls, Dorothy Turner, Evalyn Jensen and Hortense Club, president, secretary and treasurer respectively. Several days ago they brought in \$23.35, raised by giving "shows" and the latest contribution, they said, was secured by a membership drive at 5 cents per member.

incomes, of the bank clerk, the book-keeper or the ditch digger. So far as the law itself is concerned, in its written provisions, every man and woman in the state, from the governor to the sexton, come within its all embracing scope, provided their income is sufficiently large to bring them there.

Law and Interpretation Not Same
It is doubtless true, as Collector Miller points out, that the salaries of these officials and employees are held to be exempt by regulation of the treasury department. But it is also true that this regulation is simply the interpretation of the department, and is not the enacted law of congress. The supreme court reports are full of decisions over-riding and reversing the constructions placed upon statutes by subordinate officers entrusted with their administration.

It is also a fact that the regulation of the treasury department has been founded upon an old decision of the United States supreme court, based upon an entirely different statute and more than probably upon entirely different conditions.

It has been held by the United States supreme court that the compensation of the president and judges of the federal courts could not, constitutionally, be subjected to income taxation. The law of 1913 followed this decision and exempted these officials from taxation. The law of 1913 specifically includes their compensation as taxable, just as the incomes of all federal officers and employees are now subject to the provisions of the law.

The supreme court of the United States once held that the compensation of officials and employees of a state or its political subdivisions could not be taxed by congress. The income tax law of 1913, and those prior thereto, followed this decision and definitely and specifically exempted such compensation from income taxation. Congress did not write this exemption into the law of 1913, and these salaries are not exempted from income tax by the law, notwithstanding the regulation of the treasury department, upon which the position of the local office of the collector of internal revenue is based.

The situation stands that under the law itself and salaries of officials of the state and its subdivisions are now not exempted from income taxation. By fiat of the department they are exempted. The federal courts have not been heard from and persons interested have the liberty of taking their chances between the language of the law and its construction by the subordinate officials who administer it.

WILLIAM L. FINLEY MAY GIVE UP HIS POSITION IN OREGON

Oregon Biologist Receives Offer Of Work in Wider Fields; He May Accept.

After many years in the service of Oregon in conserving Oregon's wild life, William L. Finley, present state biologist, is seriously considering submitting his resignation to the state game commission that he may be able to accept a position with the American Game Protective association of New York city at a lucrative salary. In the position Mr. Finley may accept he would become vice president and manager of educational work that is being carried on in every state to protect wild bird and animal life and to interest the public in the out of doors. Pending the completion of certain important undertakings he has started Mr.

Finley is debating the opportunity for more general service than he has here. Such undertakings include a survey, in which Mr. Finley would aid the federal government in appraising the bird and animal life in national park, Washington. He would be associated thus with the national park service of the interior department to do photographic work, in which he has achieved a notable reputation as a result of his success in picturing bird and animal life in Oregon. The Finley wild life pictures, shown throughout the United States, have drawn much attention to Oregon, it is said.

Educational work which the biologist has carried on in Oregon has attracted wide attention to the resources of the state. Features of this work are his writings and the motion pictures that he has produced. Mr. Finley has been especially active in preserving wild life within the state.

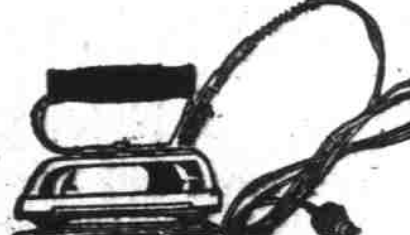

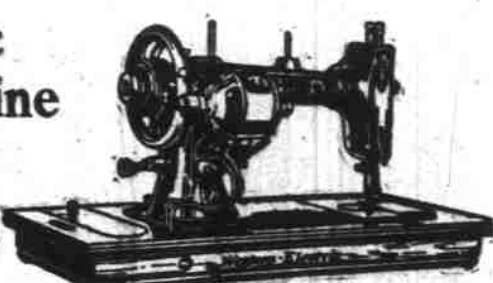
