

TOWNS OF OREGON KEENLY INTERESTED IN CHAMBER DRIVE

State Secretary Quayle Says All Expenditures Will Be Submitted to Referendum Vote.

CROOK COUNTY ADDS NAMES

Messages From Linn County Are That County Chamber Will Be Formed to Cooperate.

John L. Etheridge, state chairman of the membership committee of the Oregon Chamber of Commerce, says he feels confident of securing \$50,000 or more outside of Multnomah county in the state membership drive.

George Quayle, general secretary of the organization, said this morning that on all matters concerning the development, commercial projects and other points outlined under the resume of work to be accomplished under the state organization's report and on which appropriations may be necessary, a referendum will be taken among all the members, and no expenditures will be made without an affirmative vote for proposed disbursements.

"It is the purpose of this organization," continued Mr. Quayle, "to act as a clearing house for all local commercial organizations. They will bring each in closer touch with the other and the directors believe that with the combined efforts Oregon will take the foremost line in the battle for reconstruction."

Favorable reports continue to pour in from all sections of the state and wires were received this morning from L. P. Hewitt, who is managing the campaign in Crook county, saying that 11 applicants for memberships in the state chamber were received at Prineville Thursday night. He says in his message that Crook county will go over the top with its quota of members just as soon as the drive date comes around.

Messages from Linn county say that local organizations there have combined to form a county chamber of commerce, the purpose of which is to act in collaboration with the state organization on any question for the good of the county or state. Reports from other points indicate that every county in line with the state plan and that they are all prepared for the opening of the membership campaign Monday.

Neither Oregon senator has yet authorized a statement of his position. It is believed they do not greatly differ in their views, and that both, favoring the principle of a league which will aid in keeping the peace of the world, are also in favor of some amendment being made in the constitution of the league.

It is altogether probable that Senator McNary will make no formal statement before he reaches Oregon, which will be early in April, and that he will then state the conclusions he has formed.

Senator Chamberlain has been closely engrossed in committee work and army legislation, and has preferred to let others occupy the stage on the League of Nations. It is expected that he, also, will later on formulate his views.

Another contingent of 79 returning soldiers, principally men from the 147th machine gun battalion of the Sunset division, passed through the city Thursday afternoon en route to Camp Lewis. The men were mostly from Washington and Idaho, as the 147th battalion had been made up of parts of the Second Idaho infantry and one company of the Second Washington. A number of men discharged from the Twelfth United States infantry also were on the train en route to Camp Lewis.

The men were traveling as a casual company and were under command of Lieutenant J. C. Irwin of Massachusetts, who has served with the 147th for a number of months. They traveled in two tourist cars with a baggage car for cooking and property. The company was made up at Newport News, Va., and a number of men who were awaiting discharge were picked up at Cheyenne, Wyo., for transportation to Camp Lewis.

The 147th machine gun battalion was formed at Camp Greene, S. C., and was made up exclusively of men from the Washington and Idaho infantry regiments. Like the rest of the Fifty-first division, they did not see action as a unit, the privates having been transferred to other organizations and the non-commissioned officers retained for the purpose of drilling recruits.

The men were in the city only 10 minutes. They arrived from the east at 4 p. m. on train No. 17 of the O. & W. R. & N. and left at 4:10 on a train for the north. Their cars were switched from the incoming train to the outbound train. During the few minutes the men were at the station they were served with coffee, doughnuts, candy and cigarettes by women canteen workers and the Salvation Army.

keen visioned, sophisticated, unscrupulous German, whose business was war. "You are wrong when you say that Germany played with Germany. Bolshevism played with Germany. Had Germany crushed the Russian armies, as she could have done in 1915, by attacking Kovno instead of Warsaw, and signed peace with the czar, Germany would have dictated peace with the entente six months later. General Falkenhayn's campaign against Warsaw was Germany's second great error.

First Error at the Marne
"Germany's first great error was made by General von Moltke on the western front before the battle of the Marne. By bringing five divisions up from the left wing in Alsace to the right wing, Germany should have reached Paris and the channel ports before the end of the year 1915."

"While I am on the subject of 'ifs,'

by attacking Verdun on both sides instead of only on the left side of the river, Germany in 1917 would have been the victor. But I don't like to talk of ifs. The war is lost now. Bismarck could have saved Germany had he been chancellor 10 years ago. Bismarck would have made an alliance with England at the time of the Boer war, and would have made an alliance with Russia at the time of the Russo-Japanese war. As it was, Germany, with foolhardy childishness, entered into no alliance with great nations. Listen to the result."

General Hoffman motioned with his hand toward the hotel window, through which sounds of street battle between Spartans and government troops drifted.

Immediately upon signing with the Bolsheviks we discovered that we had been conquered by them instead of having conquered them. Our victorious army became rotten with Bolshevism. Our military machine became the printing press of Bolshevik propaganda. We did not dare to send a corps of the German Bolsheviks to the western front. What is worse, thousands of Bolsheviks entered Germany. It was Lenin and army Bolshevik propaganda that defeated Germany, undermined the morale and stirred up the quick Socialists of the country. I spoke to Scheidemann at the time.

"If you don't stop agitation," I told him, "you'll ruin Germany."

"He agreed to stop agitation," I asked General Hoffman if he thought that Herr Scheidemann had hurt Germany by his Socialist propaganda.

Invasion of Belgium Planned
"No," he replied. "Scheidemann was all right. It was Russian agents who did it and the German fanatics like Liebknecht. I asked who had made the plans for the invasion of France through Belgium. The plans were drawn up years ago by Count Schlieffen. It was the only way to win the war quickly. We knew that if we started, England and Russia would come to the help of France and therefore we knew that we would have to strike quickly. I knew also as far back as 1914, that Italy would fight Austria, eventually."

I asked General Hoffman if he thought with the Kaiser, that America could not raise an army.

Realized Strength of U. S.
"No," said the general. "General Ludendorff and I knew that America would send a huge army. Ludendorff remained optimistic, however. As for the Kaiser, he believed until August, 1918, that Germany would win the war. He still believed at that time that 60 per cent of the Americans were opposed to the war, but that the United States was forced to join in the conflict because too much capital had been invested in France, England and Russia."

"Of Russia there is this to say. The Russians are ideal soldiers and fought bravely, but their officers were untrained. We beat Russia fairly at Tannenberg with twenty to one against us. The Russian revolution killed our hopes. It didn't make them. To have defeated the Russian revolution would have been the defeat of Russia. Making peace with Bolshevik Russia, however, was suicide though we didn't know it at that time."

Kerensky Refused to Make Peace
"The original Brest-Litovsk peace was not made with the Bolsheviks, but with the Ukrainians. When the Bolsheviks over-ran the Ukraine, we sought to deal

with them. This was after we had tried unsuccessfully to deal with Alexander Kerensky. The allies had Kerensky and our money would not buy him. He refused to make peace.

"What would you do now to preserve Germany?" I asked.

"Exterminate Bolshevism with an iron hand, and much more energetically than Herr Noske is doing."

"I have seen the horrible effects of Bolshevism upon the country. I have seen even the victorious German army undermined. I have seen every bourgeoisie who owned a toothbrush lined up against a wall and shot in the name of freedom of the proletariat. Here we sit with plenty to eat," added the general, pointing to the remains of the afternoon tea, "but beyond the masses are waiting for a chance."

General Hoffman finished his cigar in silence and arose as a massive shouldered giant with beetling brows, red face and firm spoken. Extending his hand, he concluded: "In 1913 I foresaw war, and I thought I foresaw a quick victory. I was half right. The war came. Today I foresee war and a quick victory of the yellow race over the Christian world. I hope again that I may be only half right."

The sound of machine guns spluttering in the adjacent street greeted me as I stepped out of the hotel, and the boom of cannon hit against my ears.

I have written only general Hoffman's words—not my own. I can add, however, that, looked at with American eyes, Bolshevism has already crossed the Russian frontier to stay. Not food nor raw material, but an army sent into Germany within the next few months will remove it.

Same Old Tall and Short Men Are Here

Two robbers held up H. Worth about 12:30 o'clock this morning at Union avenue and Skidmore street, at the point of a revolver and relieved him of \$42. He described one man as being tall and dressed in an overcoat and the other short and without an overcoat. A man and woman walking on the other side of the street saw the holdup from start to finish. They hurried to a telephone and called the police, but the motorcycle officers were unable to find the robbers.

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Discharged From Navy
Centralla, March 14.—Errol Barber, a brother of G. A. Barber of this city, has received his discharge from the navy and will make his home in Centralla.

Quinine That Does Not Affect Head
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Will Entitle Men From R. O. T. C. to Pay Received by Other Members of S. A. T. C.
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H. M. Tennant, registrar, has been asked by the war department to obtain the necessary information concerning the O. A. C. men who come under this order. He is asking for names, rank, army serial number—if any—and date of reporting with the S. A. T. C. of all such men. He also wants data upon which these men were relieved from military service, and information upon whether or not any of them are still in military service. Action will be taken only in case of those men whose names were reported by commanding officers for transfer to the S. A. T. C.

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
