MURDER WARRANT AWAITS MATE

Frederick Hansen of Schooner Edward R. West Charged With Crime.

Charged with the murder of Charles Hannan, second mate on the American schooner Edward R. West, First Mate Frederick Hansen is facing arrest, and it is expected that he will be taken into custody on a warrant issued by United States Commissioner Francis Krull of San Francisco as soon as the schooner makes her appearance off the Golden

Captain C. W. Brasting, master of the Edward R. West, is also involved, in that it is charged that he made a false affidavit to the American consul at Durban, South Africa, to the effect that Hannan had stubbed his toe and fallen H. overboard accidentally. Members of the craft's crew submitted counter affidavits blaming the first mate.

The Edward R. West has made the Columbia river on previous trips. Her present cargo was consigned to Comyn Mackall & Co. originally.
