

PORTLAND ALL RIGHT, DECLARE CHAMBER OF COMMERCE MEMBERS

Experiences in Membership Drive
Reviewed at Members' Forum
Luncheon.

"Growth of the community spirit in Portland since the end of the war is remarkable," said A. J. Bale, vice president of the Chamber of Commerce, at the members' forum luncheon Monday night. "The Chamber of Commerce is thoroughly convinced that nothing is wrong with Portland and the recent membership drive proves this assertion."

Various captains made answer to the question of the day: "What is the matter with Portland?" and they all agreed that nothing was the matter with Portland. They represented the city as being a healthy aggregation of the usual number of boosters and kickers. Some of the captains said that they found a few men with real grudges against the chamber, but they were usually signed up for memberships in the end. Other captains reported that some of the most petty trifles were made into mountains by some of the business men who refused to join the organization.

Chairman Charles F. Berg outlined the plans of the organization for the continuation of the drive. He said that the chamber did not have enough workers out to see even half of the prospects and 500 members was a fine record for the drive.

Max S. Hirsch told of the work carried on by the drive and said the continuation of the work was to bring in the kickers, for it was better to have them inside kicking than knocking the commercial organization of Portland outside.

Captains A. E. Doyle and George Bowen told of their experiences during the drive. T. H. Edwards gave his reasons for feeling optimistic over present conditions and told of the findings of the naval affairs committee while they were at Astoria. Executive Secretary Dodson spoke briefly on some of the local enterprises which the directors have been organizing and Robert E. Strahorn was introduced with the promise that he will be a speaker before the members' forum at an early date.

Only Necessary Sums Will Be Expended by Railroad Management

Railroad improvements during the next few months will only be carried on to that extent necessary to maintain present efficiency and no extensions of present roads will be made, according to a message received from the director general of the railroad administration by Senator Charles L. McNary and forwarded to the Portland Chamber of Commerce Monday.

The repairs and extension now proposed for this district, notably the Southern Oregon projects, will depend upon the ability to dispose of the bonds according to the message, which reads as follows:

"The director general of the railroad administration has given out the information that \$10,000,000 has been borrowed for operating expenses. Other securities will be used as a basis of credit. No extension of the lines will be made during the pending situation. Only such ties and material will be purchased as will be necessary for the safe operation of the lines. Railroads will be permitted to make extensions and betterments subject to the approval of the director general if sale is found for the bonds for the purpose."

Coal Production Hits Lowest Mark

Washington, April 1.—(U. P.)—Coal production during the week ending March 23 reached the lowest mark recorded for weekly coal outputs since Christmas, according to figures of the fuel administration Monday. Anthracite and bituminous produced during that week aggregated 8,848,000 tons, a decrease of 4,672,000 tons, or over 50 percent of production during the corresponding week of last year, the figures show.

New Third Oregon Has First Review Under Colonel May

The first review of the new Third Oregon was held in the Armory Monday evening, Colonel J. L. May, recently returned from France, commanding. There were nine organizations on the floor, which comprised seven companies of infantry and two of engineers. Major J. Francis Drake was second in command. Colonel May told the assembled officers and men on the floor of the Armory that he was greatly pleased with the personnel of the organizations, and in his experience in France, training over 45,000 men, he never saw a better body of soldiers in the making. Colonel May today assumed the position of adjutant general of the Oregon National Guard. It is expected that Colonel W. C. North, who resigned command of the new Third Oregon to make way for Colonel May, will again command the regiment and assist in bringing it up to its full complement of 15 organizations and 1800 men on a peace footing.

PRELIMINARY SURVEY BEFORE CITY ACTS ON EXTENSION PROJECT

No Prospect for Immediate Action
on Extension of Stark
Street.

Action on the Stark street extension will not be taken by the city for months, according to present indications. The proposed opening of Stark street from Burnside to Cornell road has been automatically referred to the city planning commission by Auditor Funk and Consultant H. D. Cheney has been requested to make a preliminary report within 30 days. This report will only indicate whether the matter is to be seriously considered by the planning commission. A thorough investigation by the commission would follow, probably consuming several months, before suggestions would be submitted to the city council for final action.

"Numerous proponents and protestants on the Stark street extension have been asking the city planning commission for immediate action," President J. P. Newell of the commission said Monday morning. "So many questions are involved, however, as to the traffic routes and the future zoning of the whole northwestern part of the city, which must first be looked into before the commission can even intelligently consider the matter, that property owners need have no anxiety or expect any action by this commission for some time. When we have some data to go on, developed independently of proponents or opponents, ample notice of hearings or conferences with property owners will be sent to all those interested. The preliminary report will determine only whether the matter should be dismissed as without merit, or considered further by the commission at this time. In the meantime we ask all property owners to reserve judgment."

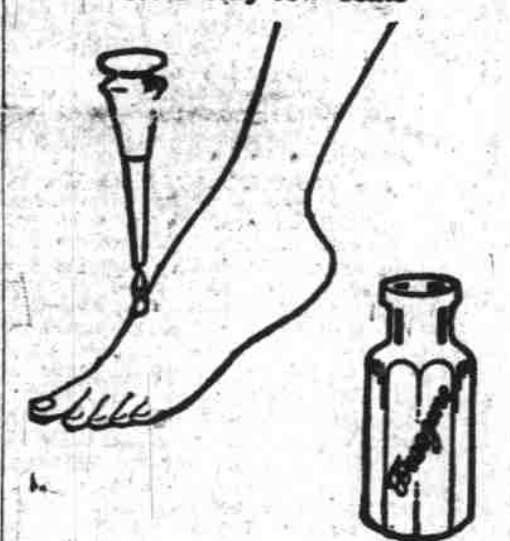
