

NEW POSTERS FOR VICTORY LIBERTY LOAN ARE HERE

25,000 of Them to Be Spread
Over Oregon in Strong Appeal
for Support of Fifth Loan.

SIX DIFFERENT DESIGNS

Every Form of Appeal Is Con-
tained in Posters; Special One
for Women's Division.

The new posters for the Victory Liberty loan have arrived. There are six of them, all of them striking to the eye, and every one of them making a direct, simple and effective appeal to the loyalty, patriotism and Americanism of Uncle Sam's big family of sons and daughters. Twenty-five thousand of these vivid historical appeals are now in the hands of a special committee which will have charge of distributing them throughout Oregon and seeing that they are prominently displayed in all public places—the windows of business houses and offices, the lobbies of public buildings and theatres, and everywhere else that offers an opportunity for impressing their story upon the public. The poster that is given blue ribbon honors by the local Victory Liberty loan campaign is a big 21 by 28 inch sheet of creamy yellow from which the figure of a big muscular, smiling workman in blue jeans and blue flannel shirt stands out. The workman is delving into his pocket and the words, "Sure, We'll Finish the Job," tells the story of his cheerful answer to Uncle Sam's appeal for another loan.

Contains Strong Appeals. Another big poster under the caption "For Home and Country," pictures a returned soldier in khaki uniform and trench cap, with his "tin hat" dangling from a cord, being joyously greeted by his wife and little son, the youngster in realistic costume of playworn diminutive overalls, and clinging affectionately round the neck of his happy "daddy."

"And They Thought We Couldn't Fight!" is the lettering on another striking poster, which shows the triumphant figure of an exultant young Yank, whose uniform is much the worse for wear and tear, mud and red stains from his own dripping wounds. The Yank has just emerged from a victorious battle with the Hun and carries his trusty rifle with the dead Yankee bayonet on the end, over his right shoulder, one German helmet dangling from its hilt, and two more grasped in his left hand. This poster was contributed by Clyde Forsythe. Still another poster shows a German submarine surrendering to an American destroyer, with a huge transport in the distance, and bears the words "They Kept the Sea Lanes Open," with the appeal "Invest in the Victory Loan," at the bottom. L. A. Shafer is the artist.

Special Woman's Poster. A smaller poster, in artistic dull brown effect, and designed especially for the women's division, shows the Goddess of Victory in an attitude of expectant waiting, towering above a figure representing industry surrounded by heaps of money, with factory smoke stacks in the distance. "Remember, Argonne, Chateau-Thierry, St. Mihiel, Belleau Wood, Cantigny, Soissons, Vesle, Clermont, Flanders, Algonne, Scherpey, Picardy, Verdun, and Invest," is the lettered admonition this poster bears. The sixth poster is simply a great blue V, with white boarding, against a vivid red background, over the one word in huge white letters, "Invest."

Old Ankeny Canal At Klamath to Be Put Up for Sale

Klamath Falls, April 5.—It has been announced by the United States reclamation service here that the government will sell on May 13 the old Ankeny canal here, or what remains of it. This canal was built when Klamath Falls was a small town, while its name was still Linkville, and was used for many years to bring water from Link river and Upper Klamath lake to the city for domestic and irrigation purposes for the early settlers. It is an old landmark here. However, as the city grew and became more thickly settled and homes went up on the banks of the canal which ran right through the residence section, it was deemed a menace to the public health and three years ago the city acquired the water rights of the part owners who lived in the city, and the canal has been closed since then practically all the way through town.

The portion for sale is that extending down to the city from its source. The right of way also includes approximately five inches of water in same.

President Reduces Sentence

Washington, April 5.—(I. N. S.)—For cowardice and trying to induce other members of his command to desert in the face of the enemy, Corporal Andrew W. Morris of Company D, 26th Infantry was sentenced to death by a court-martial in France. In forwarding the case to the United States, General Pershing recommended that the sentence be commuted to dishonorable discharge and life imprisonment, but President Wilson reduced it to dishonorable discharge and five years at hard labor, the war department announced today.

Picture of Man Arrested by Kansas Authorities Identified as That of Coquille Murderer.

FLED STATE YEARS AGO

Newspaper Clippings Found in Possession of Man Held on Minor Charge Point to Crime.

Will the arrival of Coquille of a man supposed to be M. D. Landis, now in custody of state authorities at Arkansas City, Kan., clear up the murder of Jess Uedailey in Coquille valley 18 years ago?

In the man who murdered Uedailey the murderer of a dozen other Coquille valley men, who it is said, were last seen when they accompanied Landis, a real estate dealer, on trips in the valley to look at land?

These questions may be answered after Landis, in custody of Kansas authorities, arrives at Coquille for identification.

His photograph, sent to Mrs. Sarah Yeakum of Coquille, by whom Uedailey was employed, has been identified as that of Landis, who fled from the valley while he was hunted by a sheriff's posse.

When Landis was arrested in Kansas for a minor offense two weeks ago, authorities found in his possession Oregon newspaper clippings of the murder of Uedailey. This led them to suspect his implication in the crime.

According to information from officers in Arkansas City, Landis is already on his way to Oregon.

Suspicion that he was the murderer of Uedailey was caused when neighbors found Uedailey's body buried near a spot where Landis had been digging. One neighboring farmer thought he had buried money and, digging into the fresh earth, he uncovered the body. Uedailey was shot through the head. The bullet entered the top of the skull, plowing downward.

Landis is said to have viewed the body in the morgue before the story implicating him in the murder had been circulated. Then he fled, and his escape from the valley, inhabited by men who knew every trail and egress, has ever since been a topic of discussion by residents.

Shortly before Uedailey was murdered he received a small legacy. It is thought that he was killed for \$58, the only money he was said to possess.

Other men of the valley disappeared and were thought to have been other victims. They were last seen, it is said, when they visited his home, at a place now called Cedar Point, and mail coming to the postoffice for them was unclaimed.

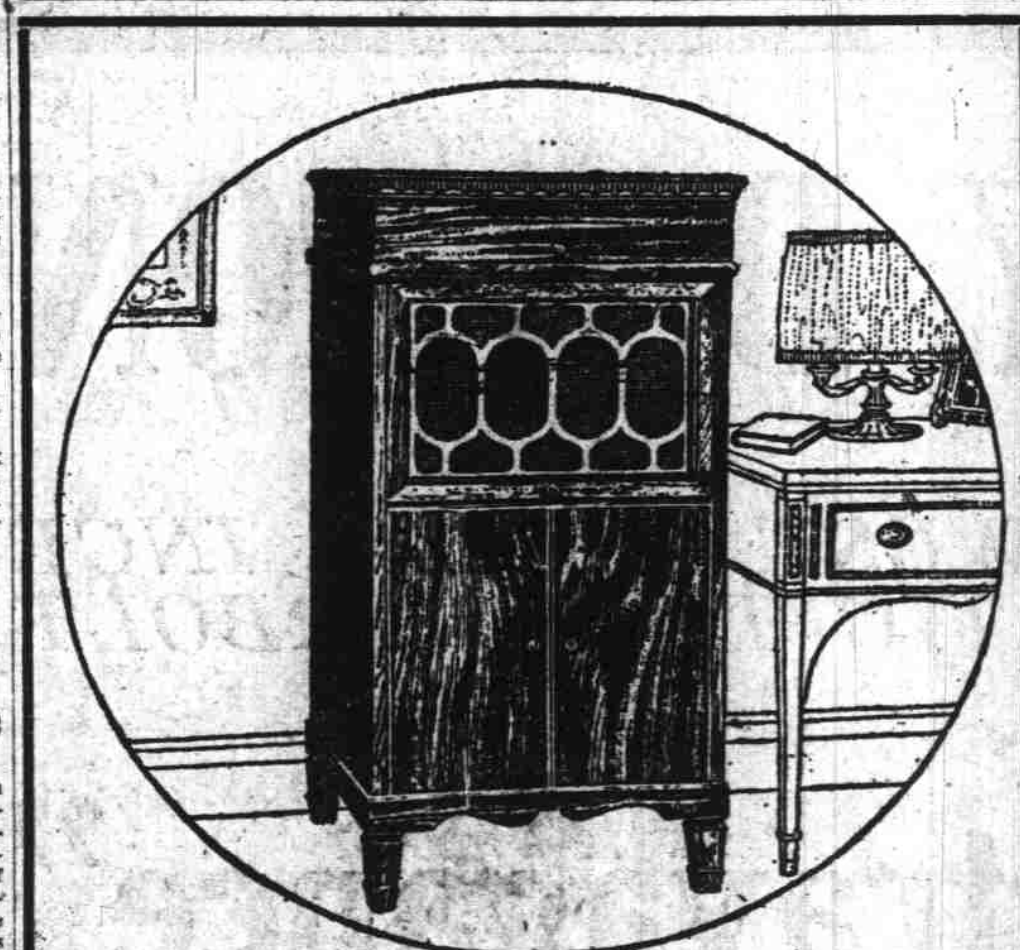
Household Visitation Will Be Made Sunday
