TASK IN CONGRESS FOR REPUBLICANS IS LOOMING BIG

Measures Killed by Partisan Filibuster Will Have to Go Through Long, Hard Paths.

HIGH EXPECTATIONS DOOMED

Penrose Expected to Fight Any Soldier Reconstruction Legislation Which May Be Offered.

Washington, April 12.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL).—Surveying the scene of devastation caused by the wild horse filibuster of the last days of the late session, Republican members of congress who are now taking stock of the situation see a big job ahead. The big supply bills, aggregating around \$3,000,000,000, which failed, form only part of the problem. The country had been led to expect legislation on several important matters, and the expectation would have been realized except for the flare of the filibuster. Now these bills, which were almost at the point of enactment, will have to be introduced over again and tread once more the uncertain and thorny paths through both houses and the important conference stage thereafter.

Reconstruction Ends in Talk
 Western members of both parties feel keen disappointment over the failure of Secretary Lane's bill for soldier land settlement, under which \$100,000,000 might have become available for reconstruction effort. Congress did much talking about reconstruction, and it ended in talk. Secretary Lane has announced that he intends to renew his effort for this bill as soon as the new congress meets. With Penrose ready to fight it from the drop of the hat, it has dubious prospects.

Oil land leasing legislation had reached the last stage when the La Follette put it to sleep. The bill finally agreed on had been deadlocked several times during the session, but the chief warriors in the fight had reached a compromise. Whether the same support can be rallied for another bill on the same lines is doubtful.

Tax Bills Coming Up
 The house, with scarcely a word of objection, had put through a resolution repealing the semi-luxury taxes of the new revenue bill. It did not reach the point of a hearing in the senate. If it comes up again, it may encounter some of the revenue and tariff theories of the new rulers of congress, and be held back until a more general revision is made.

The house also was ready with a bill to prohibit immigration for four years, but the senate gave it no consideration. The house had passed a measure for retirement of the older rank of government employees, and that fell by the wayside. The same fate came to the Barkley (house) bill for enforcement of war prohibition.

The waterpower conference report, another congress-long disputed question on which agreement had been reached at last, was passed by the house and went no further. Here is another long trail to be retraced before any measure dealing with that subject can again reach such a favorable position.

Suffrage Issue Arises Anew
 Suffrage was about to take on new life by making a change in the Anthony amendment and thereby gaining the support of Gay of Louisiana, his vote being all that was needed to give it the necessary two-thirds. Now the new members must be taken into account, and the whole thing fought over again. The senate had passed a far-reaching anti-red flag bill, which included heavy penalties for organized suspension of work, having the Seattle strike in mind. It had also passed the Jones bill to require the opening of American steel shipyards to contracts to foreign account. These measures had no hearing in the house.

The Colombian treaty, with its proposed payment of \$15,000,000 to the Colombian government, to "mellow" the Panama affair, was left in the air by the senate, and the Republican opposition to it forecasts a chilly reception in the new senate.

Chamberlain Bill Delayed
 The Chamberlain bill for reform of army courts-martial would have been passed in the senate had the session lasted a little longer. Now it has assumed a controversial form, growing largely out of the differences between General Crowder and Ansell, and its future is in doubt.

These are some of the measures which failed when they seemed about to pass, in addition to the appropriation bills. In the general deficiency bill was found the \$750,000,000 addition to the railroad revolving fund, and the \$660,000,000 estimated as the needs of the shipping board for continuing its diminishing program.

All of these bills will rush in early in the new session, but it will be many months before a majority of them can reach the legislative position they held on the 4th of March, when the filibuster fractured the calculations of their friends.

Goldendale Roads Are in Bad Shape As Result of Rain

White Salmon, Wash., April 12.—The sum of \$20,000 is to be expended on the Troutlake-White Salmon hard surface highway, which is to be graveled on the sides, with hard surface center.

The heavy rains of the past two days have put the roads in bad shape between here and Goldendale, via Lyle, but a week or so of good weather would put this road in passable condition for automobile travel.

The automobile park camping ground in this city is being fitted up for tourists. The local Boy Scouts will work at the park Sunday.
