What will happen after that time, in the matter of federal provision, will depend upon the action of the new congress, which may be influenced by conrations of national military policy and developments regarding the regular army, which is also in a state of uncer-

The army bill as reported from the senate committee on military affairs provided \$4,467,000 for pay of the naional guard for armory drill, \$1,686,000 bedding and forage for \$1,024,000 for care of animals and equip-900 for transportation of supplies and other items of smaller amount for other expenses of the guard organization.

There was also an authorization for the issuance of stores, animals and equipment, to be made without charge against military appropriations as reim-bursement in kind for all federal property brought into service by state troops. The obligations of the states for establishing the guard were to be considered as filled if the first strength provided the national defense act were atained within one year from the passage of the bill, and other increments added yearly as provided by the national de-

Senator Wadsworth, member of the military affairs committee, declared in the closing debates in the senate that nal guard was amply provided for in the bill with the approval of the war department, which desires to encourage the reforming of the guard in substantial force.

Mr. Wadsworth said that the national guard divisions in France had acquitted themselves splendidly, and that "these veteran soldiers are of immense potential value." He feared that with the delay in previding legislation, these men will not return to the national guard so
