

SAILING DATES OF 8 TRANSPORTS ARE ANNOUNCED

Thousands of American Troops Will Be Returned During the Week From European Ports.

TWO GENERALS RETURNING

Troop Ships and Cruisers Are Due at Various Atlantic Ports During the Next Few Days.

Washington, April 19.—(U. P.)—Transport sailings were announced as follows:

Transport Omsk, La Paille Rochelle to New York, in due April 30, with general company 517, New York, and medical detachment.

Transport Avondale, La Paille Rochelle to Philadelphia via Bremen, in due May 4, with general company 516, New York, and a medical detachment.

Transport Dakotan, Bordeaux to Boston, due April 29 with fourteenth engineer regimental headquarters, first battalion headquarters, second battalion headquarters, medical detachment and companies A to F inclusive.

Transport Aulus, St. Nazaire to New York, due April 29 with headquarters 56th infantry brigade; special casual company 454, marines; 12th infantry field and staff, headquarters company, medical detachment, supply company, and companies A to M inclusive, medical detachment; St. Nazaire convalescent No. 159, and four civilians. Brig. Gen. Hubert A. Allen, commanding the 56th infantry brigade, is a passenger.

WILSON APPEALS TO PUBLIC HELP

President Urges General Aid in Finding Work for Returning Yank Troopers.

Washington, April 19.—(U. P.)—President Wilson today appealed to the American public to assist the government in finding work for returning soldiers, sailors and war workers.

The appeal of the president reads: "The church organizations of the country having generously united in an effort to assist the employment services of the United States in finding work for returning soldiers and sailors and war workers, and having designated Sunday, May 4, as a day for the dedication to the mutual helplessness which will serve to work out in the months to come the difficult problems of employment and industrial organization."

KIDNAPING PLOT LEADS TO POSTING OF REWARD

Salem, April 19.—Albert C. White, paroled convict, is being sought as the result of an alleged plot to kidnap A. C. Beals, prominent Tillamook citizen, and Beals' two adopted children, own children of White. According to the story of three men, who said they had been employed by White for the kidnaping, White was to hold Beals for \$30,000 ransom. A reward of \$100 was offered for White's arrest. He is 48 years old, 5 feet, 8 inches tall, weighs 148 pounds, is dark, with dark brown eyes, and works as a common laborer. He was last heard of in Portland.

Miller Funeral Is to Take Place Monday

Vancouver, Wash., April 19.—The body of Randall E. Miller, who died April 14 at Glendale, Cal., will arrive in this city Sunday evening and be taken to Knapp's undertaking parlors. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Miller of this city, and his mother is accompanying the body. His father and mother, two brothers, Albert, who is in France, and Harvey, who is in St. Joseph hospital, survive. Funeral services will be held Monday at 1:30 p. m. at Knapp's funeral chapel, with interment in the Masonic cemetery.

UNITED EFFORT TO PLACE YET'S IN PROPER JOBS

Capt. Wemple, Director on Coast for Work of Placing Returned Men, Has Arrived in Portland.

PLAN NATIONAL ASSOCIATION

Situation Here Well in Hand, Is Word of Leader; Returned Men Must Have Adjustment Period.

To coordinate the activities of various societies obtaining employment for discharged soldiers, a national organization is being perfected, said Captain C. E. Wemple, director of the Western department of the bureau of returning soldiers, sailors and marines, who arrived in Portland Saturday to explain the plan to persons who are connected with such societies in Oregon.

"The big thing for the discharged service man is to have a suitable job waiting for him," said Captain Wemple. "The round hole and square peg situation, caused when discharged men seek work in which they have not been trained and go to communities where there are few opportunities for them, is likely to cause the ex-fighters to give willing ear to I. W. W. and Bolshevik propagandists."

SEEK APPROPRIATE JOBS

"When the national plan of coordination has been worked out the bureau manager in each city or district will know in advance how many returned soldiers are coming to his community and the vocational training of each. Appropriate jobs may then be sought for these men."

"The ex-service man must be given some time in which to come back to earth before an employer can expect to obtain from him his true value. Most of the discharged men are afflicted with something not unlike shell shock, not caused by exploding shrapnel and big Berthas, but by their sudden precipitation from military life into civil."

"It takes these men some time to get their bearings, but when they do they are going to be more valuable citizens than when they left their homes."

"The plan of the bureau is to keep each community manager or representative acquainted with needs for men in industrial centers all over the country. The manager in Portland will know what opportunities are available for service men in Alaska, Florida, or the Philippines."

PROBLEM NOT ACUTE HERE

"On the Pacific Coast the problem of finding employment is not as acute as in the East. According to my observations, the situation here has been well coped with. Captain George Conville's work shows splendid results. No returned soldier need be out of work in Oregon. These good conditions, however, cannot keep up should there be a big influx of men from the East, which undoubtedly would occur as the result of the many jobless men in Eastern cities."

Community bureau managers will be selected by the communities themselves, and will not be appointed by directors of districts, said Captain Wemple. In Portland, he said, and other cities where the business of obtaining jobs for ex-service men has been carried on successfully, no changes in the personnel of the staffs of workers is deemed advisable.

Captain Wemple is accompanied by Lieutenant Robert Laughlin, field representative of the bureau. His activities will be in the Western district. Captain Wemple's headquarters probably will be in San Francisco, he said.

Soviet May Accept Proposal to Feed Russ, Stopping War

Paris, April 19.—(U. P.)—The soviet government will accept the allied proposal for feeding Russia, or the plan will precipitate sharp differences of opinion among the Bolsheviks, in the opinion of American delegates tonight. "Such a course would involve cessation of all hostilities within definite lines in Russia, which would necessitate complete suspension of the transport of troops and materials," said one official in explaining why some of the Bolsheviks would view the proceeding with distrust.

"Suspicious soviet officials would see in the situation thus created a condition in which the soviet troops would be rendered helpless, if the allies so desired, while the other Russian and allied troops would be free to carry on their campaign. It is inconceivable, however, that any advantage would be taken of such a situation."

Police Have Theory Poison Was Put in Food That Killed 5

Detroit, April 19.—(U. P.)—Police and the coroner's office are working this afternoon on the theory that five persons found dead in their home, 538 Fort street east, were poisoned mysteriously by some enemy of some member of the family.

The dead are: Mr. and Mrs. James Deluvio, 23 and 19 years; Deluvio's father, Tony, 61; his brother, Joseph, 19; his baby, Tony, 1 year.

Their dead bodies were found this morning by neighbors.

On the kitchen table was a half-filled dish of spaghetti and the officials believe that poison was placed in the food.

Easter Finery Leads To Double Tragedy

Newark, N. J., April 19.—(U. P.)—Easter finery caused the death of Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Vernon here today. They quarreled over what their daughter should wear Sunday. Vernon killed his wife and committed suicide.

Buyer to Charge Fish Dealer With Giving Short Weight

P. J. Leonard, 187 Vermont street, reported that he bought what was purported to be 50 cents worth of salmon at Second and Yamhill streets, Friday evening. When he had taken the fish home he discovered it was short weight and returned to the fish market Saturday morning, where an employee weighed the salmon and declared its value to be 45 cents.

Leonard says the proprietor offered to refund the money but that he refused to accept it and reported the matter to the police, who referred him to the city hall. The office of the bureau of weights and measures was closed when he called there after noon. He is in doubt whether the fish will gain as much in weight as in strength by Monday morning, but proposes to be on hand when Ernest D. Jones, sealer of weights and measures, opens his office Monday morning.

Ask Aid in Crushing Bavarian Commune

Berlin, April 19.—(U. P.)—Two representatives of the Bavarian govern-

ment, Herr Hoffmann and Herr Schnepf, have arrived at Weimar, seeking assistance from the national government to crush the communists, who have seized the government at Munich. The radicals are under the leadership of four communists—Lewin, Axel Roda, Toller and Levin. They have established a new dictatorship and now control the government employment bureau. The striking department store workers have won out in their demands. Hoffmann, upon his arrival, declared that 30,000 government troops, including 3000 Wurtembergers, are surrounding Munich.

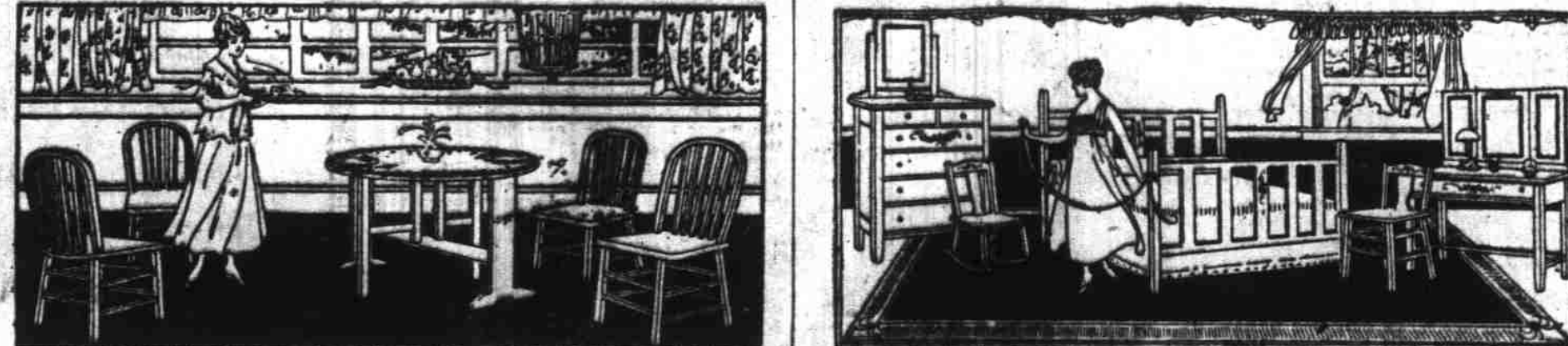
