

FINISH THE JOB, IS WILSON'S WORD TO AMERICAN PEOPLE

Happier Times Ahead, but We Are Only on Threshold, Says President in Note From Paris.

PLEDGE REDEEMED IN LIVES

Nation Must Give Renewed Evidence of Purpose in Subscriptions to Victory Loan.

Washington, April 19.—(U. P.)—President Wilson tonight called on the nation, "to finish the job."

In a cabled message from Paris to the American people the president directed the attention of all to the peace of peace. Happier days are ahead, he declared, but to enter "we must fulfill to the utmost the engagements we have made." Without a successful completion of the Victory Liberty loan, the president said, the nation would not have given the "new evidence of our purpose."

For two anxious years the American people have striven to fulfill the task of saving our civilization. The president's message read, "By the exertion of unmeasured power, they have quickly won the victory without which they would have remained in the field until the last resource had been exhausted. Bringing to the contest a strength of spirit made doubly strong by the righteousness of their cause, they devoted themselves unwaveringly to the prosecution of their undertaking in the full knowledge that no conquest lay in their path excepting the conquest of right."

HAPPIER TIMES AHEAD

"Today the world stands freed from the threat of militarism which has so long weighed upon the spirit and labor of peaceful nations."

"But as yet we stand only on the threshold of happier times. To enter, we must fulfill to the utmost the engagements we have made. The Victory Liberty loan is the indispensable means. Two years ago we pledged our lives and our fortunes to the cause for which we fought. Sixty thousand of our strongest sons have redeemed for us that pledge of blood. To redeem in full faith this sacrifice, we must now give this new evidence of our purpose."

Treasury officials believe that Victory loan notes will never be sold below their par value. Looking to the stabilizing of market values of the new notes have been outlined and officials asserted tonight there should be no repetition of breaks in government bond quotations.

PRICE WILL KEEP UP

Summarizing the reasons why the notes should always be worth in the market as much or more than their face value, Frank Wilson, director of publicity for the loan, explained that regulations governing their sale prevent the absorption of vast quantities of bonds by capitalist interests. Only subscriptions of \$10,000 or less are certain to be filled in full. Through a wide distribution of the notes the percentage of the total \$500,000,000, which naturally will find its way to the open market, will be small, officials believe.

FRIEND OF MORRIS

When Goto left Siberia in March, Siberia was still in a chaotic condition, although the Kolchak Omsk government was gradually extending its power, he declared. Japan is very friendly to the Kolchak regime and would gladly recognize it.

Goto is a close personal friend of Ambassador Morris at Tokyo, and before the overthrow of his cabinet last September was instrumental in securing Japanese intervention in Russia.

Telephone Strike In New England Is Still in Effect

Boston, April 19.—(U. P.)—The fifth day of the strike of 20,000 New England telephone operators ended tonight with the strike still in effect.

During the day a committee of strike leaders, headed by Miss Julia O'Connor, president of the telephone operators' union, conferred with Assistant Postmaster General John C. Koons, Mayor Andrew J. Peters of Boston and other officials, in an effort to bring about a settlement of the strike which has paralyzed the telephone systems of New England since Tuesday morning.

Prosecute Fake Concerns

Dallas, April 19.—(U. P.)—The Texas Oil Protective Union, with William J. Condon, Dallas, as president, has been organized to prevent "irresponsible, incompetent or fraudulent" oil companies from operating in Texas. The association, with a membership of 300, plans to become statewide and to prosecute "fake" oil company promoters.

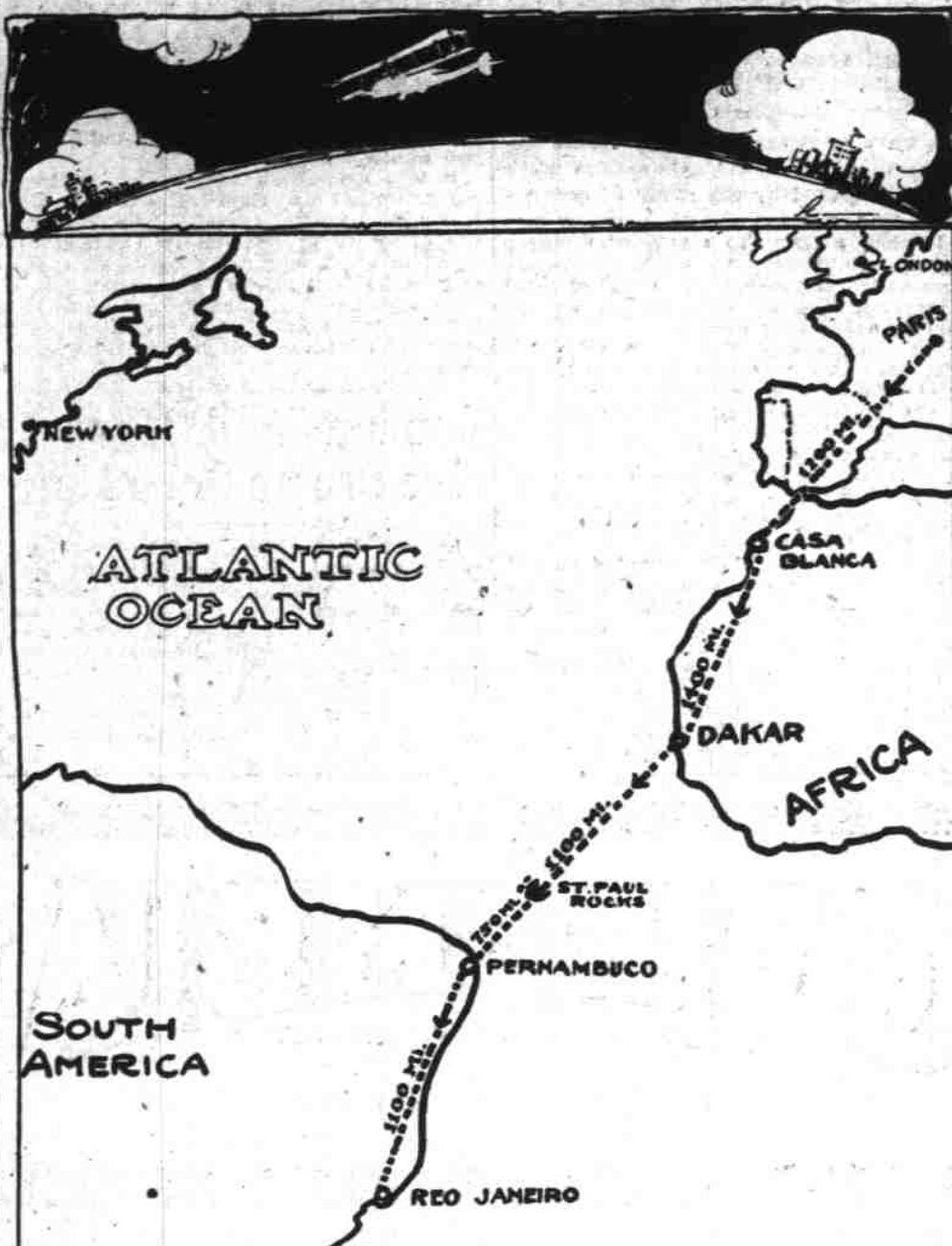

FOGS AGAIN PUT STOP TO FLIGHT

Daring Aviators Skylark at St. Johns, Heedless of Possible Dangers.

St. Johns, N. F., April 19.—Heavy fog today prevented any attempt to start a transatlantic flight. Pilot Harry A. Hawker and Navigator Grieve, as the critical moment draws near, are like a pair of college youths on a lark to the people of this staid city. Except when actually at work on the machine, they chatter of everything save aviation and find endless amusement in snowball fights, wrestling bouts and moving pictures.

Democratic, unconventional and completely devoid of pose, they are the life of the hotel, and the squad of mechanical and flying experts who surround them enter into every prank as enthusiastically.

INDIFFERENT TO DANGER
The most impressive thing about Hawker and his men is their absolute indifference to what in a landsman's mind looms large as danger over the ocean. This is an element which the young Australian has long since eliminated as a factor in the matter. All that he is concerned about is the condition of the field from which the Sopwith is to ascend, the state of the weather and the condition of the plane. Let them once get in the air in favorable circumstances and the thing is done. As one of the party put it:

"If we don't come back in two hours we won't be back at all."
Two hours is the expected duration of the trial trip. When asked about the ability of any man to stand the strain of 20 or more hours in the air at the control of a plane making more than 100 miles an hour, thousands of feet in the air, Hawker smiled pityingly. The thing is too easy to call for explanation or even discussion. He has been 12 hours aloft more than once and speed is nothing but a matter of degree. If the engine is running right and the gasoline tank stands by.

SNOWBALL BATTLE INTERRUPTED
It was while just such questions were being smilingly waved aside that Lieutenant Clements, a British officer, dubbed "Babe" by his companions, entered the hotel with an armful of snowballs. Before anyone glimpsed him he opened fire and drove Hawker, Grieve and the rest to cover. The pilot emerged from behind a door as the official photographer grappled with the assailant. There was a general scuffle with arms and legs flying through the snowy whirl. The combatants separated, more ammunition was gathered from the streets, and the battle was renewed in spasmodic outbreaks in their room.
