"Labor is not going to go down and the price of raw material in building enterprises is so insignificant that there will be little change in cost for at least a number of years," declared Nicholas Van der Pyl, industrial expert of the information and educational service of the department of labor at the Chamber of Commerce members' forum luncheon

"The storm center in industry," continued Mr. Van der Pyl, "is in the mass of unemployment and to meet this situation in the transition from the war to a peace basis, the department of labor is stimulating a building plan. If all necessary building was undertaken now it would stimulate the business of the country as nothing else would do. bring business back to normal." Mr. Van den Pyl gave an outline of
