

PORTLAND ANIMS TO BE IN AIR WHAT FORD IS ON EARTH

C. S. Woodruff, Photographer, Hopes to Make This City Center of Manufacture of Planes.

HE BUSTED RIB, THAT'S ALL

Trial Flight Without Engine Lasts for Half Mile and Ends Happily Except for Mishaps.

To be the Henry Ford of airplane manufacture and to make Portland the national center of airplane building for the United States is the hope of C. S. Woodruff, photographer, as a result of his first experimental flight in an old airplane of his own design, Tuesday afternoon.

Woodruff's flight ended in a minor crash, in which he punctured himself and rebroke a weak rib, besides ripping the skin off his shin and gaining bruises that gave him a great desire to stay in bed this morning. He is, however, perfectly satisfied with the test flight and believes he has found the most successful solution of the problem of building airplanes that will not only be of reasonable cost but will overcome many faults that have made other machines dangerous.

The inventor's trial flight Tuesday was made with the wings alone. His propeller, not having running gear or motor as yet. From a touring car going at 10 miles an hour Woodruff soared up to a height of about 200 feet and traveled approximately half a mile, he declares, before the lack of motive power brought him down in a field. There were no wheels or other shock absorbing gear to land upon and the result was several minor injuries.

A 25 horsepower motor, such as is used in small automobiles, will carry the Woodruff plane, according to its designer. Its two wings are movable and when at maximum speed straighten out to the appearance of any other monoplane in flight. The driver sits between the wings, above the motor and propeller that will give power to the finished product.

No motive power other than that given by the speeding automobile upon which the Woodruff plane rested to get a start, was used in the trial flight Tuesday. In spite of the lack of engine Woodruff outdistanced the automobile by several miles an hour as soon as his plane was released from the machine, and traveled about half a mile without power.

One of the chief claims Woodruff makes for his invention is that it can land at a low speed, not more than 15 miles an hour, thus making the roof of any building or his own back yard a suitable landing ground and overcoming the greatest handicap to a more general use of airplanes. "Portland is the logical center for airplane manufacture," Woodruff declares, "since it is the source of raw materials. I believe the industry should be an important one here very soon and my tests Tuesday have convinced me that my ideas are right. My plane is so successful that I'm confidently expecting to go into this thing on a large scale. This plane can be built for a fraction of the cost of other types and while just as serviceable it will be more useful because of its size and its variable speeds and speed control that others lack."

Hodges has secured a continuance of the case until next fall. He tried by wire to have the case advanced to May 1, but the supreme court of the United States will not hold any hearings after the last of the present month, and the clerk of the court suggested that the case be set over.

Contract for Rock For Scholls Road

German Language Bill Killed

Sacramento, Cal., April 22.—(I. N. S.)—Senator Sample's German language bill prohibiting the teaching of that tongue in schools was virtually killed in the assembly today by the adoption of an amendment which sends the bill back to the printer. The amendment, by Ambrose, prohibits the conducting of a school in German or any other foreign language to the exclusion of English, but specifically provides that German and other languages may be taught as part of the regular curriculum.

FORESTRY MEN TO TAKE PRECAUTION AGAINST FIRES

Standardization Committee of Western Association to Meet Thursday and Friday Next.

MANY EXPECTED TO COME

Officials and Private Individuals With Large Timber Holdings Are Already Gathering in City.

The standardization committee of the Western Forestry and Conservation association will open its meetings Thursday morning at 9:30 at the Multnomah hotel. Both the private and government interests, state and federal, will be represented at the conference at which will be discussed measures looking toward the prevention and control of forest fires in the Northwest.

Forest service officials, state forestry men and private individuals with large timber holdings are gathering in the city today to be present at the conference. The meeting will be opened by District Forester George H. Cadd and Thursday morning address will be given by George C. Joy and A. E. Boorman of the Washington and Montana Forest Fire associations, R. H. Chapler, forest examiner of Portland, followed by general discussions.

FILM TO BE SHOWN

Securing wardens and patrolmen, automobile patrol, railroad fires and co-operation, elimination of hazards on cut-over areas of the spruce production corporation and disposal of bad fire traps are the topics of the morning session.

In the afternoon fire plans, map making, control of campfires places will be discussed by District Forester R. H. Rutledge of Montana, State Forester F. A. Kell, Charles J. Fisher, C. C. Scott, R. H. Chapler and Assistant District Forester C. H. Flory. A film entitled "A Careless Hunter" will be shown at 4 o'clock.

Sessions of the Western Forestry and Conservation association will continue throughout Friday. On Saturday the Oregon Forest Fire association will hold its annual meeting closing with a banquet to be given at 6 o'clock at the Multnomah.

ALLEN BACK FROM EAST

E. T. Allen, forester for the Western Forestry and Conservation association, has just returned to this city. Mr. Allen, who has been consulting with officials in regard to the taxation of the lumber business under the new government law and other matters affecting the industry. Mr. Allen talked particularly with D. C. Koper, commissioner of internal revenue, who offered him a position to help work out the problem, which is difficult because of the lumber industry being one of the largest industries. "This Mr. Allen declined."

Mr. Allen also attended a conference of the Westfield industrial board and worked with Eugene W. Brown of New England, who is working on the lumberman-soldier welfare fund and the reemployment question. Mr. Allen gave him such information as would assist him in working out the problem in connection with the lumber industry. Mr. Allen also attended the meeting of the National Lumber Manufacturers' association in Chicago, April 14 to 17.

Japanese Affected By School Measure

Sacramento, April 22.—(I. N. S.)—The assembly by vote of 57 to 2 today adopted Senator Sample's bill which was amended several days ago to prohibit Japanese children attending elementary schools in California. The measure, which was introduced by Senator Sample, author of the prohibitory amendment, declared it was "time the state did something" to separate children of different races in the schools. The bill now goes to the senate for concurrence in the amendment.

California Starts Referendum

San Francisco, April 22.—(U. P.)—Referendum petitions for a state election to approve or reject the action of the California legislature in ratifying the Sheppard prohibition amendments were sent out today for signatures by the allied interests opposed to prohibition.

Surcharge Placed On Cotton Cargoes

Washington, April 22.—(I. N. S.)—Effective at noon today an order was issued this afternoon by J. H. Rosetter, chief of operations of the shipping board, establishing a surcharge of 25 cents per 100 pounds on cotton from Atlantic and Gulf ports for London and Liverpool. This action was taken in view of the serious delays at those two ports in discharging cotton ships. The surcharge was made in lieu of demurrage and will continue in effect until discharge conditions improve. It was stated.

Announcement That Cherrians Will Be in Victory Parade Is First Received.

Announcement was today received from Mayor C. E. Albin of Salem of the appointment of P. E. Fullerton, King Bink of the Cherrians, to formulate plans for Salem's participation in the Victory parade to be held in conjunction with the Victory Rose Festival, June 11, 12 and 13.

Salem is the first city definitely to decide to take part in this parade. All cities of Oregon and Washington have been given an invitation to participate, and according to Harry W. Anderson, chairman of the committee of outside participation, this parade is likely to be one of the distinct features of the 1919 celebration.

Selection of the official Rose Festival song and march will be made Thursday by the Progressive Business Men's club, of which President Ira W. Rugs, president of the Rose Festival association, is the head. Mrs. Lulu Dahl Miller will be the soloist, singing all the songs that have been submitted for approval.

Thursday, June 12, will be a half holiday in order that all Portland may join with its visitors to pay homage to the returning service men who will be on parade on this day. Such was the decision of the board of governors of the festival association at its weekly meeting held Tuesday night at the Hotel Terwilliger. Mayor Seer will be asked to issue a formal proclamation setting aside the afternoon of this day as a holiday.

The board of governors accepted a proposal made by the officials of the Portland Ad club to combine the festival industrial parade with the similar "trade market" planned by the local ad club as a feature of the fifteenth annual convention of the Pacific Coast Association of Advertising men, which will be held in Portland, June 8, 9, 10 and 11.

The proposed parade will be held on the first day of the festival, which will also be the closing day of the summer convention. Under the present plans the first section of this parade will be the Victory parade, with the second section being known as the Ad Club-Rose Festival Industrial Pageant.
