

ARGONNE HEROES MARCH IN SPOKANE

Thousands Turn Out to Greet and Cheer Men of Wild West Division.

Spokane, April 25.—(U. P.)—Their tin hats gleaming in the sun and gas masks swinging at their sides; carrying the rifles that made such a fatal mark upon the Hun in the Meuse-Argonne and Belgium, 450 men and officers of the Three Hundred Sixty-first infantry, Wild West Division, marched through the downtown streets of Spokane this morning while all the city lined the curbs and cheered.

Major Frank P. Toole, of Los Angeles headed the column, while Colonel A. D. Cummings, commander of the regiment, who succeeded Colonel Davis when that officer was killed in Belgium, reviewed the parade from the official stand.

The troop train bringing the men, practically all from Washington and Oregon, arrived in Spokane at 6:30 o'clock this morning. The men were given breakfast by the Red Cross and Salvation Army, and following their march, had lunch at downtown hotel. They leave at 3 o'clock this afternoon for Seattle, via Northern Pacific, parading there tomorrow morning, before going to Camp Lewis.

Negative Vote by Bend on Strahorn Railroad to Stand

Bend, April 25.—Unwilling to reconsider the negative vote taken at the preceding meeting on the Strahorn railroad until such a time as a definite proposition for construction can be submitted, the Bend Commercial club, in regular session at the Pilot Butte Inn this noon, allowed its former vote to go on record as representative of the wishes of the club. The matter of reconsideration was brought up in response to a request made last week by Secretary Joseph O. of the state Chamber of Commerce, Dr. W. H. Hinson of the East Side Baptist church of Portland was a speaker at the club luncheon. He urged unselfishness in civic affairs as necessary in attaining that degree of cooperation on which true progress depends. Dr. Hinson spoke briefly on the peace work in Europe, and urged that the American people stand behind President Wilson in his endeavors.

Sam Rolli Guilty Of Manslaughter, According to Jury

Sam Rolli, who shot and killed Mrs. Betty Taug at the home of her divorced husband, Hans Taug on January 25, was found guilty of manslaughter by a jury in Circuit Judge Gaten's court early this afternoon.

Court Overrules Demurrer in Case Of Finnish Editors

Federal Judge Wolverton today overruled the demurrer brought by the publishers of Toveri, a Finnish publication of Astoria charged with conspiring to incite insubordination to military forces. The case accordingly will go to trial next Monday.

were 1592 men, including the 167th infantry, headquarters and supply companies and other small units. The 117th Cavalry moved up the harbor before noon with 1508 men, consisting of the Eighty-third infantry brigade headquarters, the 167th infantry machine gun company, medical detachment, Second and Third battalion headquarters, Companies E, F, G, H, I and K, 55 officers and 1470 enlisted men.

TRANSPORTS LEAVE WITH 5000 MORE U. S. TROOPS

Washington, April 25.—(U. P.)—Bringing home nearly 6000 more members of the A. E. F., three transports have cleared from French ports for New York, the war department announced this afternoon. They are: The Neius Amsterdam, with 2070 officers and men, due May 2; the Santa Ana with 1422, and the Houston with 1399, both due May 7. Aboard the Neius Amsterdam are the Three Hundred Second engineers' company, mostly at Camp Upton; Three Hundred Second engineer train, Camp Upton; detachment of Seventy-seventh division headquarters, Camp Upton; detachment Three Hundred Fifth artillery, mostly at Camp Funston; casual company 225, Camp Upton, and Major General William E. McNair, traveling as a casual. The Santa Ana is bringing the Three Hundred Seventh repair and salvage company, tank corps and the Three Hundred Seventy-sixth and Three Hundred Seventy-seventh training and replacement company, tank corps, to Camp Upton, mobile operating unit No. 1, Camp Upton; ordnance casual company for Camps Upton, Grant, Cutler, Meade and Kearny; headquarters army artillery, first army, Camp Upton; casual company 525, New York; Bordeaux convalescent detachment 297. On the Houston are the First anti-aircraft machine gun battalion command and the One Hundred Thirtieth field battalion; signal corps complete, both for Camp Sherman; air service casual company No. 2, Camp Upton; Sixteenth and Three Hundred Fifty-third aero squadrons and casuals.

Newborn Infant Is Found on Doorstep Entirely Unclothed

A baby, said by attendants at the Waverly Baby home to be not more than a few hours old, was found, with no clothes whatever on it, at 7 o'clock this morning on the steps of the back porch of Charles Gorza's home, 227 East Forty-ninth street. The tiny naked body was dashed with mud and rain.

The little spark of life was nearly extinct but by massage treatment it was fully restored and it is said this afternoon that the child probably will live.

Rancher of Hood River Subscribes \$10,000 in Bonds

Hood River, April 25.—W. V. Perry, a prominent rancher of this section, subscribed for Victory bonds to the amount of \$10,000, this being the largest individual subscription recorded in Hood River.

Helmets Rouse Interest

Baker, April 25.—Renewed vigor was put into the Victory loan campaign at Baker by a telegram received by B. E. Harder, Baker county chairman, from State Director John L. Ehrbridge, that the two persons in Baker county will be given German helmets who make the largest subscriptions.

Port Commission Making Inspection Of Portland Harbor

Members of the Port of Portland commission today made a trip of inspection of the local harbor. The party left the municipal landing at the foot of Stark street on the tug McCracken. The party planned to proceed as far as the mouth of the Willamette river, the dredge Willamette, which is at work near the municipal terminal at St. Johns, will be inspected, and a general view of the waterfront will be obtained.

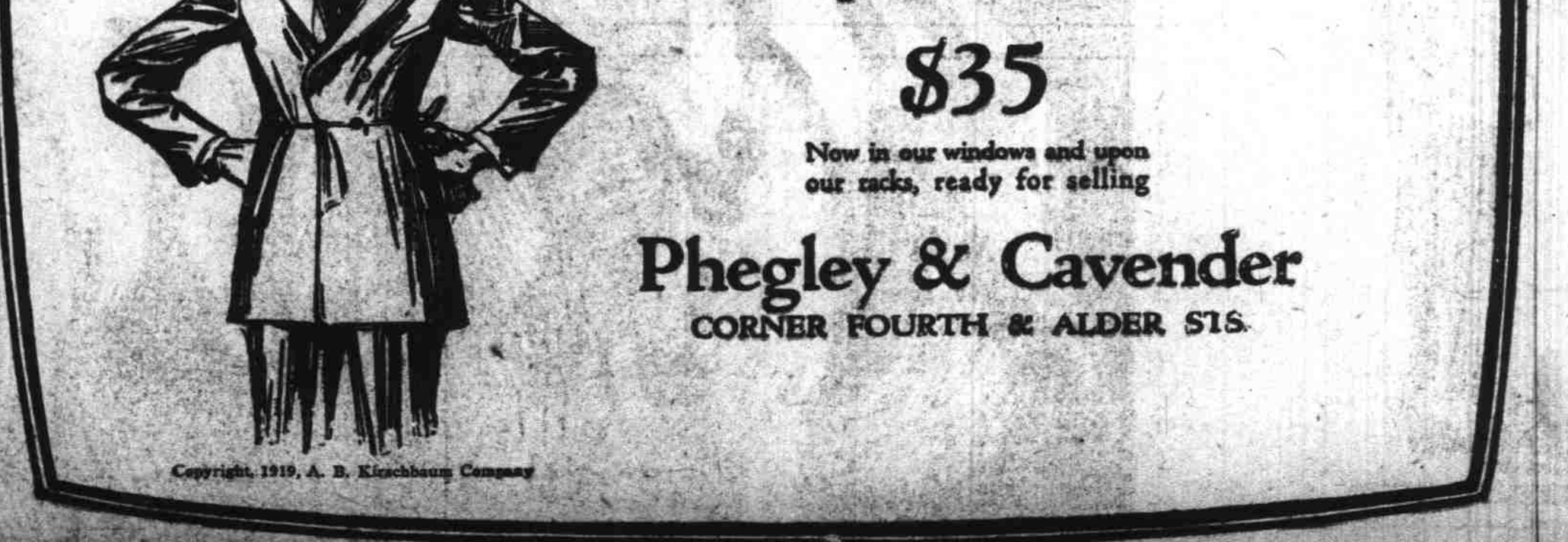
