

STATE WILL SOON HAVE FULL QUOTA IN VICTORY LOAN

Counties Are Piling Up Totals and State Chairman Declares Stage of Worry Has Passed.

HONOR FLAGS ARE AWARDED

Portland Has Raised \$5,029,650 of Her Quota and Richest Districts Have Already Reported.

Although no new figures were announced this morning for the Victory loan, subscriptions in the state outside of Portland, John L. Etheridge, manager of the state campaign, declared that Oregon is safe, as far as the securing of its quota is concerned, and, while large financial districts are ready to take the unsubscribed quota districts not yet over the top, the state committee is still leaving the loan to the people.

LINN SPEEDING UP

Linn county, which has been lagging behind the rest of the state, announced nearly \$100,000 in sales Friday, while Corvallis and six other towns, which had been slow in securing their quotas, were given honor flags Friday. Portland, still lags behind the rest of the state. Of her quota of \$14,786,325, only \$5,029,650 was secured by 6 o'clock Friday night, and the cream of the districts had been canvassed. True, the results of the drive in the large industrial plants which employ hundreds of persons, have not been made public and many business men, employing dilatory tactics in regard to the loan, have not definitely announced the amount of their subscriptions. Practically 75 per cent of the districts of the city have been covered. The results are negligible, and unless Portland comes through, say tomorrow, Oregon will lose its record as the "Loan Star State."

FLAGS AWARDED

Despite Portland's indifference, the loan boom in the rest of the state. Central Point, Wapinitia, Clatskanie, Lebanon, Echo, Clatskanie and Corvallis were awarded honor flags Friday as rewards for their fulfilling their debt to the nation. Linn and Clatskanie counties, which have been backward in their subscriptions, both reported large gains. Jackson county's results, which hinged on Medford, came through Friday and showed that Jackson county was behind the drive. Jackson made the twenty-fourth county in Oregon to report that it went over the top.

The rest of the state is assured, says Mr. Etheridge. But rather than give this loan to the banks, the management of the county campaigns is carrying its work on and is showing the advantages of the loan to every citizen before the large financial interests are allowed to underwrite it. The results in Oregon, outside of Portland, are assured, and the metropolis alone rests the success of the drive.

KELSO AND SURROUNDING TERRITORY TAKE QUOTA

Kelso, Wash., April 26.—Announcement is made by George F. Plamondon, chairman of the Kelso district for the Victory loan drive, that Kelso and the surrounding country have taken the district allotment of \$85,000 worth of Victory bonds. Ostrander was the leader in the outside districts, with more than \$22,000 subscribed, of which \$4000 was taken by loggers at the camp. The Inman-Poulsen Logging company crew brought \$8000 worth of bonds and the Bala family crew the same amount. The balance was taken by Kelso individuals and banks. Oliver Byerly of Ostrander, a Civil war veteran, made the largest individual subscription—\$10,000.

Clatsop Subscribes \$125,000
Astoria, April 26.—Clatsop county's Victory loan subscriptions in the hands of the local banks now total approximately \$125,000. Of this amount \$85,000 has been raised outside the city. The local committee is preparing for the big drive, starting Monday.

LABOR SITUATION HURTS

Just what is dragging the Victory loan in Portland the city campaign committee has been unable to solve. The solicitors are working, canvassing office buildings, stores and residences and are cleaning up a few hundred thousand dollars daily, but the response is nowhere near what it should be if Portland is to "finish the job." What serves to give a clue to the situation is this: In the fourth Liberty loan the Standifer Construction company, a wooden shipyard, subscribed \$23,000. Tonight the plant will close and lock its gates. Out of this plant for the Victory loan has been subscribed just \$450. The large force employed in the yard when the fourth loan was on has been dismissed, contracts have been canceled and, naturally, the men who go off the payroll tonight do not feel in position to sign an application for bonds not knowing when they will be working again and able to meet the installments. The Portland company closed long ago and the Grant Smith-Porter yard force is greatly reduced. These are

WAR CASH GONE

At Victory Hut Friday there were 185 subscribers who took a total of \$27,150 bonds, paying \$12,855 cash. On the corresponding day in the fourth Liberty loan there were 473 subscribers who took \$47,600 bonds and deposited \$23,740 cash. The lash of war no longer exists and the patriotic impulse which urged the public to respond in large numbers to the call of the fourth Liberty loan is absent, and while the Victory loan is as essential to Uncle Sam as the fourth Liberty loan, there is a lukewarmness which the city campaign organization is having difficulty in overcoming.
Bond subscriptions totaling \$24,540 were secured by Victorians Friday. Mostie, who is assigned to regular duty on the first night relief at Victory headquarters, between 4 and 6 p. m. Nationalization of Women in Russia Denied by Speaker

Spokane, April 26.—(U. P.)—Wilfred Humphries, returned Y. M. C. A. secretary from Russia, was cheered loudly when he mentioned the red flag and showed a picture of Lenin, while lauding the Russian soviet government in an address here Friday night.
He declared stories told of the nationalization of women in Russia had been started by members of the old monarchial regime who wished to discredit the soviet authority. Posters were put up secretly at night and were later torn down by the soviet as "dirty," he said. "I was told that three-fourths of Moscow was in flames before I arrived, whereas five buildings, one of them the jail, were all that had been burned."

AMERICAN LEGION TO MEET TONIGHT

Multnomah Unit of Service Organization to Be Perfected at Meeting in Army.

The first Portland meeting of the American Legion, a national organization of soldiers, sailors and marines who served during the world war, will be held at 8 o'clock tonight in the armory.
Among important features of this meeting will be the election of officers for the unit in Multnomah county and the selection of delegates to attend the initial national convention, May 8, in St. Louis.
All men who served in America's armed forces, whether at home or abroad, during the war, are urged to attend. Dow Walker, temporary state secretary, appointed by Theodore Roosevelt, expects that men who have not yet been discharged be present and aid in organization of the legion in Oregon.

Simultaneous with the meeting in Portland tonight veterans will conduct meetings in each county in Oregon. Results of these meetings will be sent to the temporary secretary and reported at the next meeting for a state convention when permanent state officers can be elected.

Colonel James H. Hammond, of the 39th Central artillery corps, will preside tonight until a chairman is elected. A secretary, chairman, treasurer and 10 delegates to the St. Louis convention will be chosen. It is hoped that these delegates will represent various sections of the state. Names of delegates selected at county meetings will be sent to Dow Walker.

WILSON'S NAME COVERED

The flags of Italy, France and Dalmatia were exhibited together in today's demonstration here. A large number of priests participated in the manifestation. The crowds did not attempt to proceed to the American embassy, as all the speakers pointed out that Wilson must not be confused with the American people, whose friendship Italy is determined to retain. The proprietor of the Wilson cafe has compelled to cover Wilson's name on his sign with a paper.
Signor Colosimo, minister of colonies, held a long conference with King Victor Emmanuel and returned to lunch with the king.
Prince Colonna, mayor of Rome, issued the following proclamation:
The country will declare it cannot be separated from the government. The American nation, for whom we cherish the most sincere affection, will appreciate the justification of upholding our sacred rights."
Telegraphing from Fiume, Gabriele d'Annunzio said:
"I was never prouder of being an Italian. Of all our heroic hours, this is truly the most solemn. There is nothing greater in the world than this—Italy, which does not fear to renounce alone, opposed to everybody. With her strength multiplied by the sacrifices of the lean days, Italy today is great and pure in the midst of so much allied baseness, hatred, bartering and lies."
"The allies are iniquitous, ungrateful and forgetful. We must thank God, who exists us, that we are worthy of this supreme trial, having had the honor of exposing the false idol at whose feet we once all knelt. I now repeat the Pieve motto:
"Do not surrender an inch!"

A member of parliament, known for his democratic ideas, was interviewed by the Tempo today.
"President Wilson's attempt to set the Italian public against its government has failed, thanks to Premier Orlando's reply," he said.
"The echo of the demonstrations in every city will tell Wilson that he deceived himself in believing the majority of people will endorse his attitude."
Deputy Federson, writing in the Idea Nazionale, pointed out that while France again obtains Alsace-Lorraine, the Sea, Syria and valuable German colonies, while Great Britain grabs Mesopotamia, Central Africa and retains control of the seas, without rousing Wilson's ire, Wilson suddenly finds Italy's moderate demands constitute imperialism."

ROUSING RECEPTION TENDERED DELEGATION

Turin, April 26.—(I. N. S.)—Premier Orlando, General Diaz and Signor Bardal received a rousing reception when they passed through here on their way from Paris to France.
The crowd that gathered, the Italian premier said:
"For six weeks my voice has been defending the rights of Italy, but at last I was conscious that my responsibility had to end with a 'no.' I was in doubt whether this monosyllabic corresponds with the thought behind it."
Cheers greeted his statement, and when he asked what he should have answered, a chorus of "Noes" answered him.

ORLANDO'S PRETENSE OF SURPRISE IS ALL FALSE

Paris, April 26.—(I. N. S.)—Premier Orlando of Italy applied for a visa of his passport for a trip to Rome 24 hours before President Wilson issued his statement on the disposition of Fiume. It was learned in French official circles today. In this connection it was pointed out today that the Italian declaration that the president's declaration came as a complete surprise to Premier Orlando was not borne out by the facts.
It is understood that the president informed Premier Orlando last Sunday that unless the signatory powers to the pact of London reached a compromise, he would issue a public statement setting forth the position of the Americans.

Offers Explanation

Rome, April 26.—(I. N. S.)—The withdrawal of the Italians from the peace discussions was forced by the insinuation that the failure of the League of Nations plan would be attributed to Italy," said the Tribuna today.

living from day to day on the food sent by the allies. Flour is so scarce that the regime of the almost indigestible war bread was recently reinstated.

MAY HASTEN RETURN
There is reason to ask whether the Italian break will not hasten the return of the American delegation to the United States. It had been thought that our delegates would have concluded their task, arriving May 20 or at the latest by June 1, but a well informed American official told me today that he had learned the date probably would be even earlier.

This would seem to me, in view of the present straitened situation, that our delegates desire to contribute what is essential to peace as quickly as possible.
The question is being asked in some quarters whether President Wilson, in precipitating the showdown on the Italian question, was not having in his mind some idea of getting the United States out of the European muddle before we become so deeply involved that a movement is afoot in the senate to cable the American congress expressions of regret at Wilson's unprecedented action.

SAAR CRISIS EASILY BRIDGED
I was able in a recent dispatch to make the first announcement that President Wilson was standing on principle in the Saar crisis and was even contemplating an appeal to the people over the heads of the government, but France's tremendous sacrifices and her obvious right to great consideration apparently caused him to hesitate.
Instead of making the appeal he ordered the George Washington to Brest. For a few days more the conference was under a tremendous tension, and there was a possibility of an open break, but before this ominous possibility everyone seemed to have given way a little and the Saar question was compromised.

The Italian crisis differs from the Saar crisis in that now France, Britain and the United States apparently all stand together in opposing Italy's claims.
Moreover, the diplomatic maneuvers of the Italian government, which have been so far from clear, have been examined by the Fiume question consider it far from clear. I have frequently heard it called one of the most perplexing of the entire conference, and up to the present I have been unable to form a personal opinion upon it.
It seems to me to be regrettable that if a break had to come it should have been occasioned by some more clear-cut issue.

There is another consideration which looms more darkly. The president's assertion of principle in the Italian question implies the application of the principle with equal firmness in the questions relating to the Balkans and Eastern Europe, where ambition and violent nationalism are running rampant.
The task of fixing Italian frontiers may prove to have been simple as compared with the task of fixing frontiers in Greece, Yugoslavia, Rumania, Czechoslovakia and Poland.

If the president, foreseeing what the future holds, has really decided to step quietly out of it all at the earliest opportunity, he can hardly be blamed.

tain publishers not to confine their attack to the zone law, but to broaden their scope of criticism and thus their sinister purpose is disclosed.
The members of the (publishers') committee and the "well known publisher" charged by Judge Wallace McCann, threatened his political ruin were also at the meeting of the publishers' association in New York, he declared. They were invited to disclose their identity.

Mr. Burleson's statement follows:
"The news reaches the postmaster general this morning that 'Mr. Burleson's methods' as applied to the postal and wire service will be subject matter of discussion today by the American Newspaper Publishers' association."

"While this association is putting in the entire day talking about Mr. Burleson and his methods, the thoughts of certain selfish members thereof, during that time, will not be on Mr. Burleson's methods or on desired improvements in the postal and wire service, but on their share in the \$72,000,000 they have been enjoying as an annual postal subsidy for many years and as to how they may recover the part of which they were deprived by congressional action and how to remove the danger of losing more of it. There may be little said by the members about this legalized graft, but it will be uppermost in their minds just the same."

ISSUE HELD PLAIN
"It is now insisted that this issue be not obscured to drive away the attention of the people. The issue is whether certain newspapers and magazines shall continue to filch from the postal revenue \$72,000,000 each year and impose that burden upon other users of the mail. This presents a test. I welcome it."

"Can a postmaster general who has the courage to attack an evil denounced by many of his predecessors be driven from office because he will not acquiesce or aid in undoing an action that only partially remedied this evil? Charles Emery Smith, the great Philadelphia editor, said, as postmaster general, that this subsidy was 'the one great overshadowing evil of the service, because it underlies and overtops all other reforms and advances.'"

POST HEADS LOBBY
"It is noted that C. J. Post has promptly identified himself as the chief lobbyist of this coterie of selfish publishers to whom I referred in a recent statement.
