

MILITARY RULES IN INDIANA TOWN

Riot Following Use of Non-union Telephone Operators Results in Martial Law.

Indianapolis, Ind., April 28.—(I. N. S.)—Martial law has been proclaimed at Linton, Greene county, Indiana, by Governor James F. Goodrich, as a result of a riot there Monday night, when 500 citizens, mostly miners, stormed the local telephone office and compelled strike-breaking girl telephone operators to leave their switchboard and flee for safety. The governor issued a proclamation this morning declaring martial law in the mining town, following reports that further trouble was expected. The governor also issued a call for the state militia company at Bloomingington, Ind., to proceed to Linton under arms at once to strengthen the forces of state troops already there under command of Adjutant General Harry R. Smith.

The proclamation issued by Governor Goodrich sets out that there exists within the city limits of the city of Linton and the immediate environment thereof a "state of riot and lawless insurrection" against the laws of the state of Indiana, and that the civil authorities of the city and county have been unable to cope with the situation. The proclamation proclaimed martial law throughout the city and adjacent territory and proceeded to Linton under arms at once to strengthen the forces of state troops already there under command of Adjutant General Harry R. Smith.

INSULTS HEAPED ON AMERICANS IN ROME

Paris, April 28.—(I. N. S.)—Just before the Italian parliament convened in Rome today to consider the momentous Fiume problem, King Victor Emmanuel declared that he was at heart and soul with the Italian people in whatever they wanted, according to a dispatch from Rome to the Matin. "I wish what my people wish," the Italian king was quoted as saying. "I shall solidly support any action that parliament may decide upon."

It is apparent that Paris and London are not informed as to the real feelings in Italy, says a Rome dispatch to the Petit Journal. The dispatch adds that "all Italy is a solid bloc, impervious to appeasement, to conciliation." The Italians are prepared for isolation, battle or death from starvation. No matter what the result may be it will leave grave traces, the Rome correspondent of the Petit Journal believes.

Italians are demonstrating against Americans everywhere, except in a member of the American food commission, who arrived in Paris today from Vienna by way of Trieste and Northern Italy.

In describing the effect of President Wilson's statement the American said: "American Red Cross officers who were given honorary commissions in the Italian army have been notified that all such commissions were cancelled."

The Victory bonds," declared Emery Olmstead, city chairman, today. "There has been a first-class, efficient, energetic force of salesmen in the downtown district. They have worked day and night and have been neglecting their own business to perform this patriotic task. These men cannot be held together forever. It would not be right nor just to ask or expect them to continue indefinitely combing the streets of Portland for subscriptions. The men of Fiume and the committee has agreed that a good time to quit—to close the Victory drive and disband the organization—is Saturday evening.

"No one can say that the Victory campaign has not resorted to every effort to bring the bonds to the attention of the people. There have been more stunts than in any other drive. There has been more publicity.

"The bonds are the best investment government has ever offered. The public is aware that the government needs the money. What more can be done? Portland is still more than \$6,000,000 short of its quota. The drive is coming harder all the time. If people want this town to go 100 per cent, as it has in all the previous drives, then they will have to come forward and help—they will have to do their share. So far as the city organization is concerned it disbanded Saturday night. The buck is passed to the people.

People who say that they have sympathy for the cause but who have no sympathy for O. C. Overbeck of the executive committee. The encouraging feature is that the number of subscribers is increasing and the subscriptions are larger, but the goal is still a long way off for the city.

SHIP REPAIR WORK GIVEN TO PORTLAND

Willamette Iron & Steel Works Gets \$100,000 Contract From Union Oil Company.

In the awarding of the contract to the Willamette Iron & Steel works for the installation of new boilers and repairs for the steel oil tanker Okeum of the Union Oil company, Portland has been favored with one of the largest ship repair jobs that has come to this city in several years.

It is estimated that the cost of the work will be in the neighborhood of \$100,000. Three new Scotch marine boilers are to be placed in the Okeum, and considerable other work is to be done on the vessel.

The setting of the contract to the Willamette Iron & Steel works, according to C. L. Tostevin, assistant district sales manager for the Union Oil company, is in line with the policy of the company to patronize local industries where possible.

The tanker Okeum was built specially for the Columbia river run, and for the past seven years the craft has been plying between Portland and California ports, principally. The boat has a capacity of 20,000 barrels of oil, besides bunker fuel. During the war emergency the Okeum was taken over by the government, but the craft has since been returned to her owners.

Captain Andreason is master of the Okeum. It is expected repairs will be commenced as soon as the tanker returns to her next voyage to the south, which was begun Monday night.

tain rights of control along the Vistula while Germany has rights of communication east and west with East Prussia. Indemnities reaching 5,000,000,000 francs (\$1,000,000,000) will be collected immediately and 20,000,000,000 francs (\$4,000,000,000) within two years. Thenceforth an international commission will decide what further sums Germany must pay. The text of the treaty concerning the return of the property of the enemy, namely, the damage of civilians and their property by sea, air or land.

It is maintained in American circles that France and England can sign the treaty with Germany without Italy because the Italians agreed to the pact of London before they declared war on Germany. Moreover, this treaty concerns merely the duration of the war and did not foresee the disarmament of one side. Also, Italy, by continuing to demand Fiume would be breaking the treaty of London which left Fiume to the Jugo-Slavs.

FOREIGN MINISTER TO ARRIVE TONIGHT

Versailles, April 28.—The German delegation will receive the peace treaty Friday, according to the program outlined today.

Foreign Minister Brockdorff-Rantau and the other principals of the enemy delegation are scheduled to arrive tonight. Verification of the Germans' credentials, together with other preliminary formalities are expected to occupy Wednesday and Thursday.

Posters have been put up all over Versailles asking the public to maintain its usual calm demeanor while the Germans are here. The streets leading to the hotels where the Germans are quartered are not barred, but "move on" notices have been posted in conspicuous places.

The question of German war prisoners, which is expected to be the first one brought up by the enemy delegation, is understood to have already been settled by the foreign ministers council—the last transaction by that body before the Italians withdrew. Enemy prisoners, it is said, will be released in the exact proportion that Germany furnishes civilian labor demanded in the peace treaty.

GERMAN DELEGATION REACHES VERSAILLES

Versailles, April 28.—(U. P.)—Eighty-five members of the German peace delegation reached here early today. The enemy representatives arrived in Vaucluse on a special train shortly before midnight. They were met by Colonel Henry, French liaison officer, and the staff. The party, which included 14 women stenographers, most of whom are at ease under a barrage of flashlights. Curious villagers clustered about them, and the German delegation, which preceded them, shook hands with the leaders of the party. 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IDENTIFIED AS FORMER CONVICT

Bootlegger Leads Officer to Warehouse and Makes Bold Attempt to Escape.

Boyle Faulkner, arrested with Ignacy Kowalski Monday by Deputy Sheriff Charles Schirmer and Backman, has been identified, declared W. R. Bryon, federal investigator, as a Seattle bootlegger and counterfeiter who has served 36 months on McNelly's island.

Faulkner and Kowalski are held in the Multnomah county jail on charges of violating the prohibition law. They are accused of having had 480 pints of whiskey in their possession.

They bought the liquor, pint bottles, packed in cans labeled "Carbon Tonic," guaranteed to increase the Power of Your Motor," from a man said to be known by the name of Livingston. He is being sought by federal officers.

After the pair were arrested Faulkner told the officers that they could find more of the liquor at the Manning warehouse.

"I'm through with you fellows," he is alleged to have shouted when, with the officers, he was walking through the rooms on the third floor, and then leaped from a window, attempting to get away by means of a fire escape. At the point of revolvers the officers forced him to re-enter the window.

He was recognized by Chief Bryon of the bureau of investigation of the department as the man who was indicted with Sergeant Comstock of the Seattle police on charges of conspiring to ship liquor from Ohio to Washington.

According to federal officers he was accused of handling for all illicit liquor in Seattle. He was convicted of counterfeiting several years ago, Bryon asserted.

Chenoweth's Trial Put Off Until Fall; Must Stay in Jail

Marshfield, April 28.—The trial of George Chenoweth, member of the legislature from Coos and Curry counties, which was started before Judge John S. Cols in the circuit court of Curry county in Gold Beach, has been postponed until the September term of court. It was claimed by the defense that it was necessary to send to London to secure evidence of Chenoweth's sanity and on this ground the continuance was allowed. Chenoweth served in the Canadian army and was at the front much of the time.

He shot and killed George Sydnor, aged 18, at a dance at Langlois, claiming that Sydnor was father of a child born to Chenoweth's daughter while he was serving in France. It is supposed that insanity will be the defense. It is said by friends of Chenoweth that long after he was in the trenches he dreamed of the trench rats which infested the trenches and that the experience at the front seemed to have affected him. Chenoweth is the father of a large family. He will remain in jail until tried in September, bail not being allowed.
