

FUNERAL IS HELD FOR MINING MAN WHO DID MUCH TO BUILD WEST

Charles M. Mullen, Well Known
in Three States, Died at Home
Here Saturday Night.

The funeral of Charles M. Mullen was held this morning from St. Stephens church and final services were in Rose City cemetery, under direction of Miller & Tracey. Mr. Mullen was one of the active upbuilders of the West and one of its noblest men, known in three states and in British Columbia as a remarkable mine finder and promoter. He made many millions for others, but died Saturday night at his home, 1112 East Washington street, at the age of 73 in moderate circumstances.

Mr. Mullen was born in Massachusetts and went to Denver, Colo., when 20 years of age. He drove stage with William Cody (Buffalo Bill) and for Ben Holladay, and entered the Colorado legislature when but 23 years of age. Here he introduced what is probably the first woman's suffrage bill in any legislature of the country. It was defeated, but afterwards formed the basis for a persistent campaign for that principle, resulting in Colorado being the first state in the Union to give the ballot to women. He served one term as speaker of the house and was a representative of Colorado and then quit politics and the practice of law.

CAME TO OREGON IN 1903

Mr. Mullen went to Boise, Idaho, in 1901 and to Baker, Ore., in 1903. He is known in Eastern Oregon as the father of the Ox Bow. He conceived and planned the Ox Bow power plant now being brought to completion, but it required too much capital for him to complete it and he sold his location rights.

Mr. Mullen was interested in the Great Ohio group of mines near Hazelton, B. C., and also in the Copper Crown at Tokwa, B. C. He saw in them the promise of great yield and interested Colorado and other capitalists. A few weeks ago he and his wife revisited Baker, and leaving her there, he went into the mountains with his old friend, L. W. Anderson of Tacoma, and located what is thought to be very valuable mineral lodes. They had only returned to Portland a few days when he was stricken with his last illness. In reply to questions as to where they had been, Mr. Mullen replied that he and Mrs. Mullen had been on a wedding tour.

A WESTERN NOBLEMAN

"He was a man who had no dollar marks before or after the word," said Mr. Anderson. "I knew him for many years and never heard him speak ill of any man no matter how unjustly he had been treated. He was one of the old-time Western noblemen and knew the earmarks of a mine in its prospect hole state whenever he saw one. Many made money from his remarkable insight into the possibilities of development, his suggestions and his ability to interest others in great enterprises."

Mr. Mullen is survived by his widow, Mrs. Mary M. Mullen, and five children, Robert E., now in Le Mans, France, at a Knights of Columbus secretary; Samuel P. of San Diego, Cal.; and Edward J. Mullen of Portland; Mrs. Mary A. Mullen of Baker, and Mrs. Pamela McIntyre of this city. There are 10 grandchildren and one great-grandchild.

Toledo, Ohio, April 29.—(I. N. S.)—Run runners between the word and trot were busy today warning "all females of the specie" who are engaged in this very lucrative occupation to beware of the "bloomer censor" at Monroe, Mich., half way between the two cities, where persons suspected of having concealed liquor about their persons are held up by state constabulary and searched after they enter the state of Michigan.

Officials engaged in efforts to prevent the running of booze into Detroit tonight today that because so many women have become active in relieving the drought at Detroit, and so many ingenious devices have been employed in hiding the wet goods, such as "bloomer censor," "hot water bottle spears" and "bloomers with harness attachments." It has been found necessary to appoint women matrons to the Monroe temporary detention barracks to investigate women bootleggers.

A majority of the arrests for smuggling whiskey during the past month have been of women, authorities say.

S.)—Representatives of bakers and drivers who Monday night voted to refuse to handle bread not bearing the union label will confer with the bakers' union committee today "preparatory to calling a general strike of drivers" in sympathy with the bakers' strike. Commissioner Fred Felch of the United States department of labor, in this city on another matter, will attempt to bring the strikers and their employers together today.

Union Record at Seattle Is Scored By Spokane Labor

Spokane, April 29.—(U. P.)—With only two delegates dissenting, the Spokane Central Labor council Monday night voted indorsement of a similar reply drafted by President William J. Coates to an article in the Seattle Union Record, criticizing the labor council here for its failure to indorse a soldiers' and sailors' council.

The Union Record article also indorsed that the Sons of Democracy, a soldiers' organization which labor here has indorsed, had been organized by the Chamber of Commerce. The Record's article was headed "Labor Deputed in Spokane by Chamber." This heading Coates branded as "infamous" and added:

"No paper more openly condemns and no paper in America more openly violates the principles of the American Federation of Labor or so abuses and villifies its splendid young state president, Shortt, than the Seattle Union Record. I personally have nothing against it, but it doesn't represent the American Federation of Labor."

The labor council passed through a stormy session before a vote was taken. Broken Axle Derails Train Wilkesbarre, Pa., April 29.—(I. N. S.)—A broken axle caused the derailment of train No. 8 on the Lehigh Valley eastbound, from Buffalo to New York, near here at 1:10 a. m. today. The locomotive, a combination car and two coaches left the rails and eight passengers were cut by flying glass. None of the sleeping cars was derailed.

NEW YORK, April 29.—(I. N. S.)—Amok, the untamed headhunter of the Philippine Igorot tribe—yes, madam, he collects human skulls—who delighted the crowds at Coney Island, is one of the heroes of the war, it was learned today.

Amok was drafted when the United States got into the war. He volunteered to carry messages through a heavy barrage while the 96th Infantry was advancing in the Argonne, and was officially cited for bravery.

Now Amok, who never tipped the Coney crowds to the fact that he was a high school graduate, is going back to the Philippines to teach school.

California members of the unit, numbering 270 men, are at the Presidio today awaiting discharge. Cooperating with the famous Infantry units of the 91st, the machine gunners rendered valiant service in many fields, and its personnel received many valor decorations.
