

CHINESE EXPRESS DISSATISFACTION

Agreement to Recognize Japan's Claims Displeasing, Says Ambassador.

Paris, May 1.—(U. N. S.)—The agreement to recognize Japan's claims in the Shantung peninsula, a unsatisfactory to China. It was declared today by Dr. Wellington Koo, Chinese ambassador to the United States and leader of the Chinese delegation to the peace conference. "I do not believe that President Wilson understands the real situation," continued the Chinese diplomat. "The Chinese are most unhappy over this outcome."

Regardless of the declaration by Dr. Koo, President Wilson is understood to have secured important concessions in the Chinese-Japanese matter.

The agreement results in the conversion of all German rights at Kiauchow from Germany to Japan. The terms include territorial sovereignty and other rights. The Japanese promised President Wilson that this sovereignty will eventually be returned to China while Japan retains only certain economic rights. The Japanese demands were recognized in view of the fact that the Japanese troops had taken the territory in question from the German defenders by force of arms.

Being Tiao (the port of Kiauchow) will be a free city, so far as China is concerned.

The complete arrangement was admittedly managed, but the Chinese made material gains in spite of their announced dissatisfaction.

POLAND PUTS; SAYS WAR WILL BE KEPT UP

Warsaw, April 30. Via London, May 1.

(U. N. S.)—Poland is dissatisfied with the decision reached by the peace delegates at Paris regarding her Eastern frontier and will refuse to accept it, according to information secured from government circles today.

In the meantime, it was said, the Polish troops will continue their successful campaign.

The Polish forces engaging the Ukrainians in Eastern Galicia have put the latter to flight and have relieved Lemberg from peril of capture.

JAPAN TO MOVE TROOPS FROM LANDS IN CHINA

Paris, May 1.—Details of Japan's "moral victory" in the controversy over her territorial claims in China will be inserted in the peace treaty, according to information obtained from Japanese sources today.

The agreement reached between the Japanese delegates and the "big three" yesterday afternoon was outlined as follows:

Japan will surrender the Shantung peninsula, including the port of Kiauchow, to China. She will, however, retain economic rights on the peninsula and will receive certain valuable concessions in the port of Tientsin.

The Japanese immediately will withdraw their military forces from Shantung, which they have occupied since they seized that territory from the Germans. Safety of the mines and railways there will be assured through the presence of special Chinese police, trained by the Japanese.

WILSON AND JAPANESE ARE "FULLY SATISFIED"

San Francisco, May 1.—(U. P.)—Both President Wilson and the Japanese delegates to the peace conference are "fully satisfied" with the agreement reached yesterday in Paris on the China-Japanese territorial controversy, according to a Japanese radiogram forwarded to Tokyo today by the United Press.

The wireless, which was sent via San Francisco, originated with S. Uyeda, general manager of Nippon Denpo, the big Japanese news agency, who is in Paris for his service.

Belgium Will Not Accept

Brussels, May 1.—(U. N. S.)—Belgium will not accept the terms which the Big Four desire to impose upon her, the newspaper *Soir* stated today. The Belgian plenipotentiaries are said to be demanding a complete fulfillment of all promises and to be insisting that they will not sign any treaty that does not provide restoration of political and economic independence.

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Housewives Make Plea for Lower Prices on Foods

"Give Us Back Our Five-Cent Loaf," Is Cable Addressed to President Wilson.

New York, May 1.—(U. P.)—"Give us back our five-cent loaf," is the plea Mrs. Julian Heath, president of the National Housewives' league, cabled to President Wilson today.

Mrs. Heath, stating she spoke for the housewives of 70 per cent of the country's consumers, appealed for action to bring down the price of bread.

"We must have lower prices," she declared. "Mr. Hoover should use his \$100,000,000 appropriation (to feed Europe) to bring down the price of bread in America."

Mrs. Heath's cablegram suggested that Wilson immediately authorize importation of Argentine and Canadian wheat to force down bread prices.

Her cable in part follows: "The housewives of 70 per cent of the consumers in this country, the remaining 30 per cent being farmers' wives, through the National Housewives' League of the United States, appeal to you for immediate executive action at the coming session to reduce the cost of living, which, through present prices of bread, meat and corn, has become unbearable. Will you not use your unlimited power for good to put bread into the mouths of the people? Give us back our five-cent loaf and help suffering humanity now straining under the cruel yoke of prohibitive prices of the bare necessities of life."

She said the American consumers will not get much benefit out of winning the war unless food costs are limited, and declares:

"The pre-war cost of bacon was 30 cents and it has now risen to 70 cents; pre-war lard 12 cents, now 40 cents; pre-war pork \$17, now \$63; pre-war wheat 90 cents, now \$2.50; pre-war corn 60 cents, now \$1.60."

"Current statistics show we have the greatest stocks of wheat, meats, fats, hops and cattle that were ever known in the history of the country, yet they are withheld from the people at prices none but the rich can pay."

Her cable ends with a question to Wilson as to whether he will take up food prices at the next session of congress.

Parts of Treaty Are Cabled to Washington

Washington, May 1.—(U. N. S.)—Fragmentary sections of the peace treaty the central powers will be cabled upon to sign have reached the state department, it was learned today. Just what portion of the entire document they represent, officials were unable to say. The belief was expressed, however, that they are but a very small part.

When it is received in its entirety, it will be made public upon notice from Paris, and will be published simultaneously here and abroad. Press reports that a synopsis of the text would be cabled from Paris were without confirmation at the state department.
