

CAPTAIN PEASLEY IS AIDING SAVANTS IN PARIS LABORATORIES

With Madame Curie, Great Radium Exponent, Is Engaged in Measuring X-Rays.

Additional distinction has been won by Captain W. D. A. Peasley of Portland, who, shortly after the conclusion of his liaison work with the American peace commission at the peace conference, was one of 24 men to be chosen from the entire American expeditionary force to do research work at British and French universities. Captain Peasley was assigned to the University of Paris and is at the Sorbonne.

Captain Peasley is carrying on his present work with three world authorities in their individual lines. With Madame Curie, the great radium exponent, he is engaged in measuring the wave length of the X-ray by refracting from the atomic structure of a known crystal and allied subjects that may thereby be opened up. It is original work in Madame Curie's own private laboratory and is an honor she seldom grants except to old and proved students.

Research in gas engine theory and also a course of advanced work in superheated steam, of which little is known in the United States, is being pursued by Captain Peasley under M. Koenigs, who is the world authority in the latter subject. Captain Peasley's third line of work is in the private laboratory of M. le Chatelier, who is the great authority on high temperature and microchemistry. He has been using translations of Captain Peasley's papers before the American Institute of Electrical Engineers, of which the captain is a full member, and was delighted to find someone working as he was with polarizing microscopes.

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Liberty Temple May Be Moved to Use as Employment Center

Unless a larger and more suitable building is found, Liberty Temple may be moved from its present location to serve as a central headquarters for all soldier employment agencies. Under a coordination scheme, worked out by government representatives, an effort is being made to centralise all employment services, and to have all departments in one building to eliminate the necessity of a service man going to several different places in search of a position. It has been suggested that Liberty Temple be moved to another downtown site and utilized as an employment headquarters. Lack of finances has militated against the employment work. The government failed to provide money and the Liberty Temple, although small, will likely be the choice for a headquarters because of lack of funds for a larger building.

The construction of a hut for the Soldiers' and Sailors' club would be provided for in an offer of \$1000 by Ben Selling. He has assured those interested that he would bear the expense of such a building.

A meeting of representatives of the various organizations will be held during the week for further discussion of the problem.
