

COLLEGES SUFFERING FROM GROWING LACK OF TRAINED TEACHERS

President Kerr Finds Situation in
East Similar to That in
Oregon College.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, May 1.—More than 225 members of the college faculty staff have withdrawn since the declaration of war in April, 1917, President W. J. Kerr announced. Many of them went into military service in one form or another. Some withdrew permanently to accept more lucrative positions elsewhere, some are still in the service, and others have gone into lines of non-military or industrial war service and find financial and other offerings so attractive that they prefer to continue in their new work rather than return to educational endeavor.

On the eastern trip from which he has just returned, President Kerr found that all institutions experiencing a shortage of instructors, but notwithstanding these conditions he found some college men available for positions in this institution. Great interest in the Northwest was shown, which President Kerr attributes to the great field in this section of the country for the type of work offered by institutions of the class which the college represents.

President Kerr expressed himself as being particularly pleased with the reputation the college has established the country over. He was gratified to note the high standing accorded the institution by the war department for the way in which it has responded in meeting war emergencies. The S. A. T. C. was given high rating and the college record in handling the influenza situation was considered unparalleled.

Steamer Klamath Will Carry Ties To Atlantic Port

Aberdeen, May 1.—The steamer Klamath, second of the fleet of five vessels which will load cargoes at the Eureka mill of Hiquiam for the Atlantic seaboard, is due today from Portland. The Klamath will carry 1,200,000 feet of lumber, which is part of an 8,000,000 feet order recently placed with the Eureka mill. The first installment of the cargo was taken by the steamer Wauau.

The Ferris type steamer Abnoba was launched from the Grant Smith-Porter shipyards shortly after midnight Wednesday. Mrs. Charles Albertson, wife of the manager of the yards, was sponsor. It is the thirteenth craft of the Ferris type government vessels launched from these yards. The launching of the Abnoba leaves but two Ferris-type vessels on the ways, at these yards, of the 16 that were contracted for.

Road to Astoria Via Clatskanie Open

Astoria, May 1.—The road to Astoria via Clatskanie is open. Motorists can make the trip straight through along the Columbia river highway. The last link in the connection temporarily was completed Wednesday, when the fifty-third street improvement at the Hammond mill was opened for traffic.

AGGIES ARE ASSURED ARTILLERY UNIT FOR TRAINING NEXT FALL

Big Staff of Officers to Accompany Field Artillery and Paraphernalia of Battle.

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, May 1.—Arrangements have been completed with the war department by President W. J. Kerr, who has returned from a six weeks' trip east in the interests of the college, for the establishment of a field artillery unit next fall. Two officers, Major Edward C. Hanford and Captain E. B. Wettingell, have arrived on the campus to look after the preliminary details and other officers are on the way or will be detailed soon. In all, four commissioned officers and approximately 25 non-commissioned officers or privates are expected to be assigned to the college to handle the work and equipment.

Between 80 and 100 horses and mules are expected to arrive in Corvallis within the next six weeks for the use of the unit. Other equipment valued at \$300,000 will be sent here by the war department, including types of all the models of guns used by the American and allied forces in field artillery work, such as 155, 75, 47s, and howitzers, Browning machine guns and Browning automatic rifles. Included also will be two 2½ ton tractors, four five-ton tractors, wagons, harness and saddles.

Much engineering equipment is included in the inventory and also special equipment used in field artillery and signal corps work. This will be available for the general instructional work of the college in addition to its particular use as a feature of the military instruction.

The government will carry all the expense of installation and maintenance except for the necessary housing of horses and equipment. Several months will be required in assembling the horses, guns and other paraphernalia.

Tillamook, May 1.—Ralph E. Williams of Portland has purchased the interest of Thad Robinson in the Tillamook County bank and has been elected as its president. He is also vice president of the Gales Creek Railway company, now building from Wilson river into the vast timber tracts of Wilson river, with Tillamook harbor as the ultimate destination.

Prominent Umatilla Farmer Crushed to Death Beneath Car

Pendleton, May 1.—Crushed beneath his automobile, which lay overturned beneath a 10 foot embankment, the body of Henry Lorenzen, a prominent Umatilla county farmer, was found on his ranch, 14 miles northwest of Pendleton Tuesday.

Examination showed that Lorenzen, while driving his car up a hill, had evidently killed his engine, and had been unable to stop his machine as it rolled back down and over the bank. Lorenzen was born in Germany, and had been a resident of Umatilla county for more than 30 years. He leaves a widow and five children.

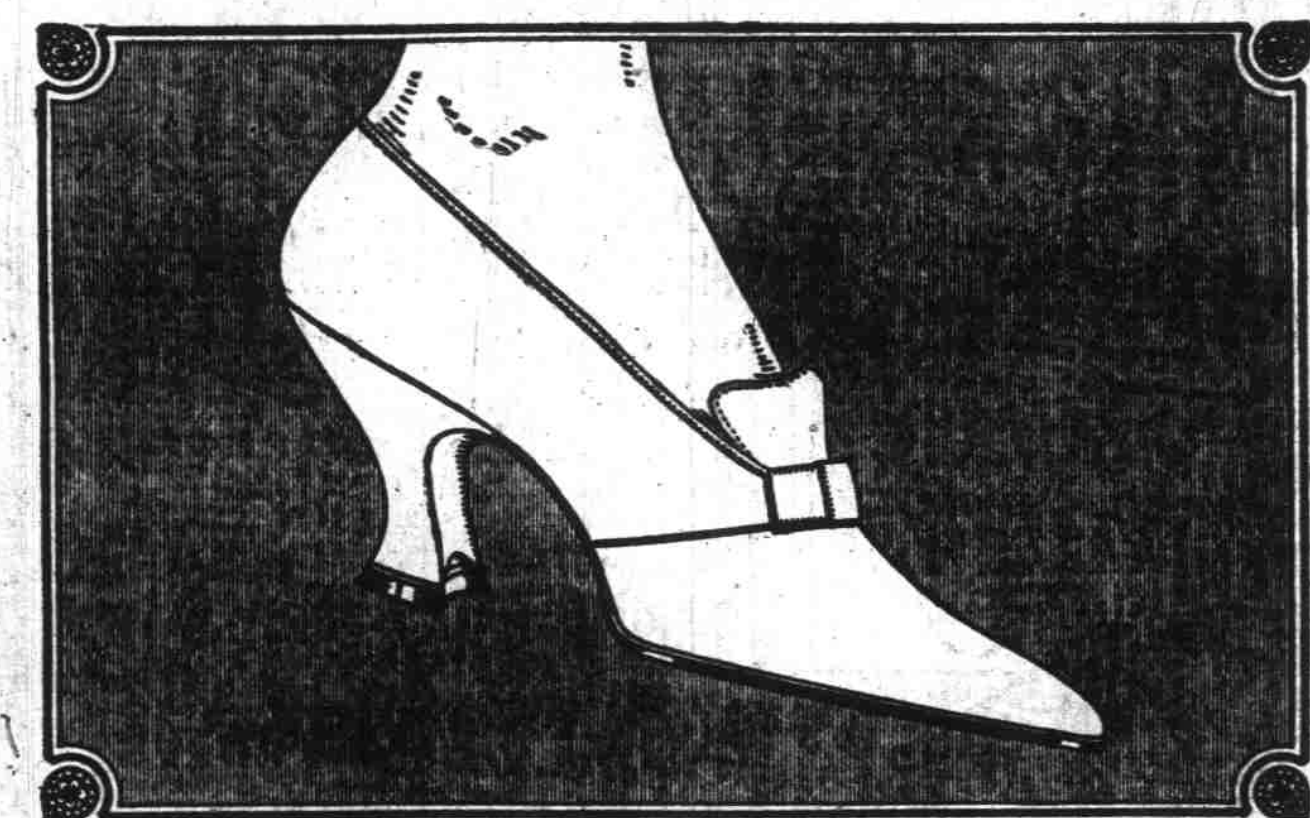

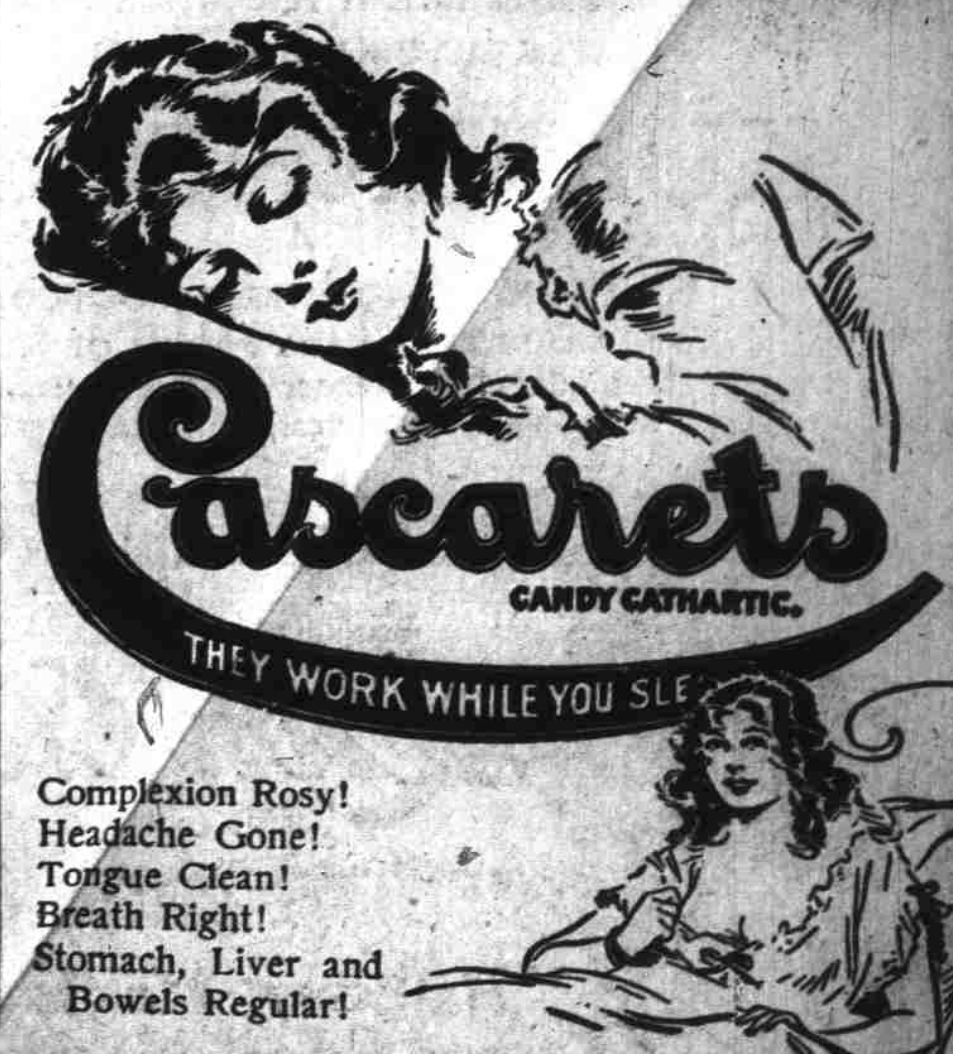
