Investigation of the charges of alleged discrimination made by W. J. Jones, Portland stevedore, against C. D. Kennedy, Portland head of the operating department of the Emergency Fleet not corporation, was begun today with the arrival from San Francisco of Thomas A. Thatcher, attorney for the division of construction and operations.

Mr. Kennedy has been accused patronizing certain concerns exclusively and of permitting the government to pay exorbitant prices for the lumber used in lining ships. Objection has been made to the manner in which Kennedy has let certain contracts on government account.

"I am here to give the whole question a preliminary investigation and am actunder the department of operation and construction." he said.




