

Heer defeated Troch in a similar race at Seattle last year by a margin of three targets and since that time sports-men of the Northwest have been anxious


to see the two shooters compete against each other again. Should Heer decline to accept the match, it is likely that R. A. King, the Colorado champion, will be Troch's or
