

Former Mackmen Give the Portland Beavers Trimming in a Ten-Inning Contest

BOTH STRONG BUT BEAVERS LOSE TO SENATORS IN 10TH

Former Mackmen, Bill Rodgers and Gus Fisher, Star in Initial Defeat Given Their Old Chief at Sacramento This Year; Pennington Occupies the Mound.

SACRAMENTO, May 14.—Portland, in its first appearance of the season here, lost to the Senators, 4 to 3, in a 10 inning contest. Bill Rodgers and Gus Fisher, former players for McCredie, started against their former boss. In the ninth, with two out and Pinelli on third, Harry Wolter tied up the game with an infield hit to Rader. In the tenth singles by Orr, Rodgers and Fisher won the game. Gus Fisher dropped the ball over the right field fence for the second Sacramento run. Piercy allowed only five hits in eight innings, but was wild, walking seven men and hitting a batter. Portland's third run was made without a hit, due to Piercy's wildness. The score:

Referee McIntyre Stretches a Point in Giving Decision Against Evans' Protege. Seattle, May 14.—(U. P.)—Stretching his verdict, Referee Chet McIntyre handed Solder Jake Abel, the coast welterweight title after four rounds of toe dancing with Morrie Lux, coast king for five days.
