

# Casey Smith Had "Indian" Sign on Beavers .: Grammar School Meet Draws Big Entry

## CASEY SMITH TOO MUCH FOR BEAVERS AND SEALS WIN, 3-1

Indian Hurler Lets Mackmen Down With Four Hits; One Bad Frame Gives Bay City Three Runs and Victory; Doubles by Maisel and Baker Save Shutout.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 21.—Walter McCredie's Beavers were helpless before the pitching of "Indian" Smith in their first appearance before the local fans this season, and Charley Graham's players walked off with the contest, 3 to 1.

Smith held the Beavers to four hits, two of which were bunched in the seventh frame for the visitors' lone tally. The Seal hurler was given excellent support by his teammates, two double plays coming at times when the Beavers appeared to be getting dangerous.

Pennington, the Beaver hurler, had a hard time getting started, but after the first frame his spitter held the Seals at bay, but the lead established was too much for the Portlanders to overcome.

Schick's single and a wild pitch followed by Fitzgerald's walk, Cavney's out and Crandall's single together with Pennington's error and a double steal gave the locals their three tallies in the opening frame.

Portland's lone run was made in the seventh inning when Maisel and Baker counted for two baggers, the former scoring.

The Mackmen were retired in quick fashion in almost every inning.

McCredie shifted his line-up again, by putting Blue in left field and Koehler on first base, but the change did not have the desired results.

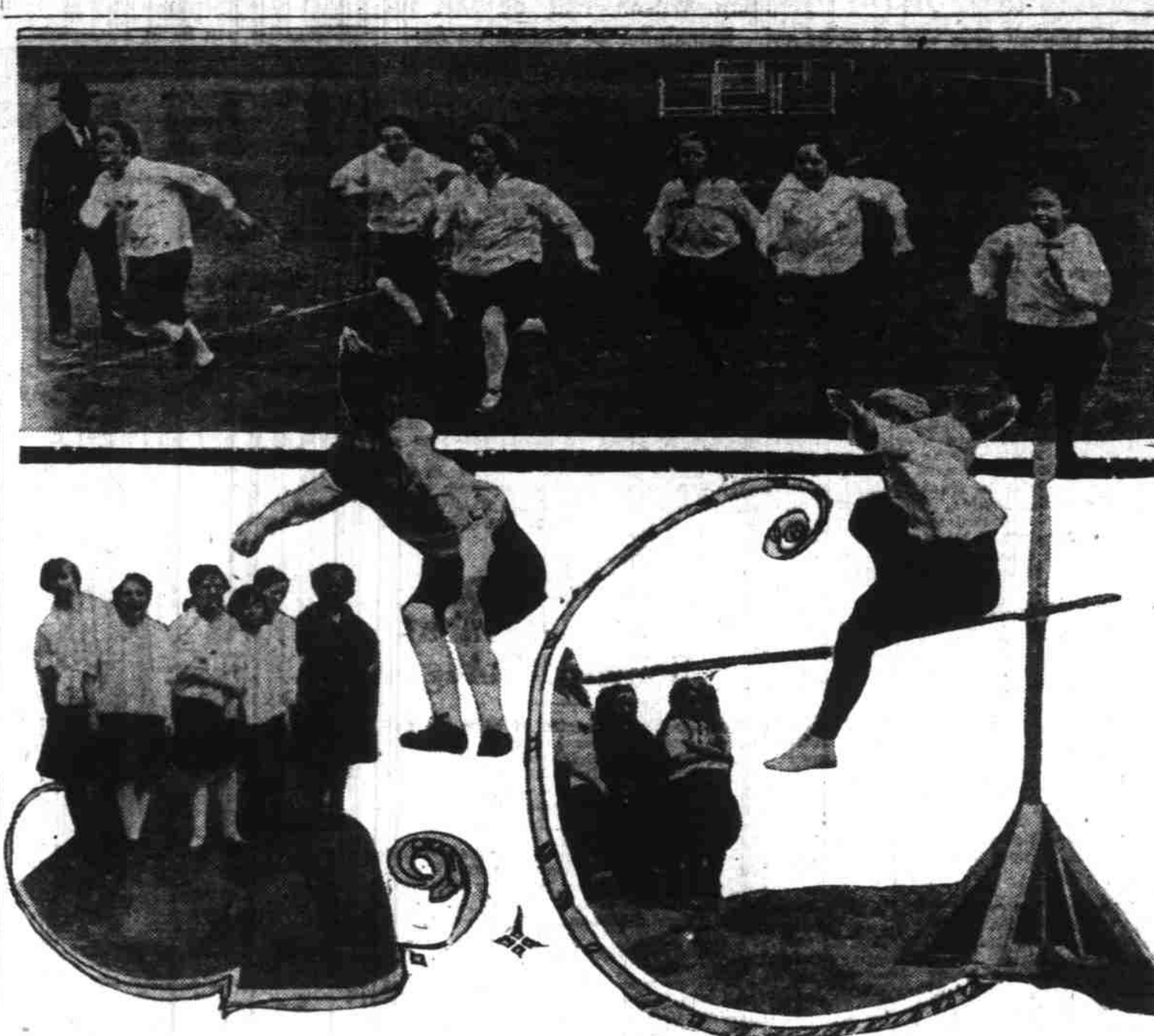
Willard Will Leave For Toledo This Week

TRYOUTS are being held among the various schools of the city, getting ready for the annual Portland grammar school track and field meet, slated for Multnomah Field next Saturday afternoon. Robert Krohn, supervisor of physical education in the public schools, is confident that more than 1500 boys and girls will compete for the various prizes.

The first event will be run off promptly at 1:30 o'clock, so that the meet will be completed before 4:30 o'clock. An admission of five cents will be charged to witness the affair and the money will go toward purchasing medals and paraphernalia.

The junior lawn tennis tournaments for boys and girls will be held by New York city clubs, starting May 26.

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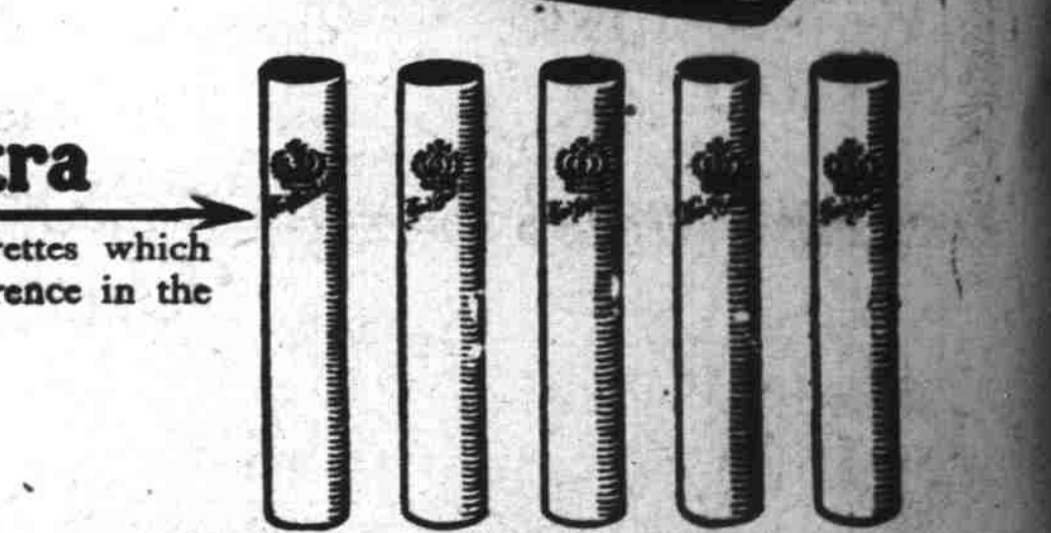
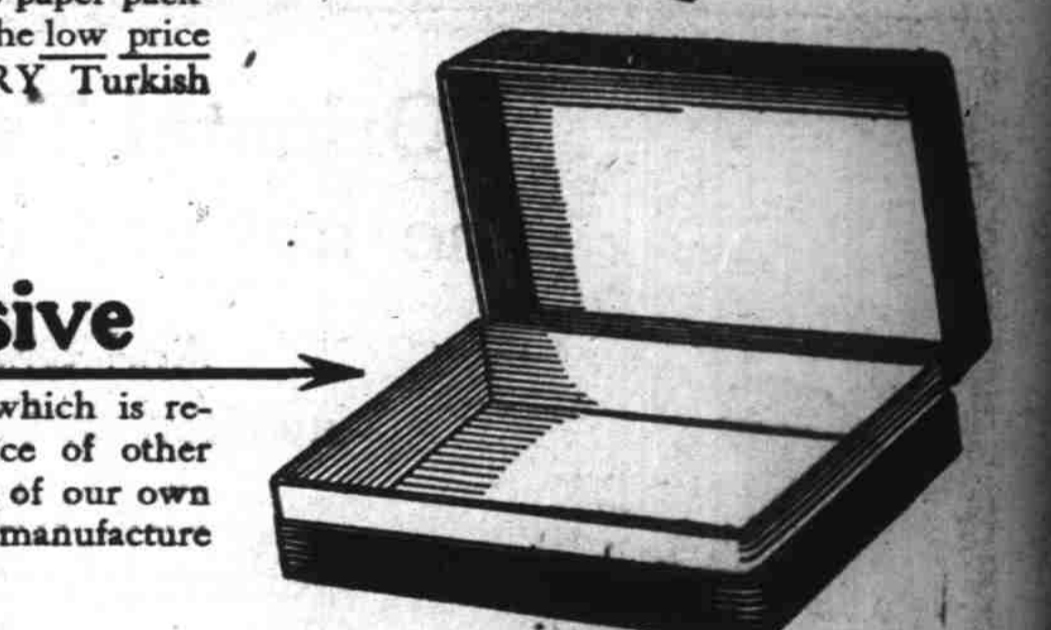
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
