

48 WOODEN SHIPS TO BE DELIVERED TO OREGON YARDS

Total Launchings Up to May 17 Were 104, Reports Statistician Captain Hiram Mitchell.

ORIGINAL CONTRACTS 154

Detailed Reports are Made on Various Yards, Including the Standifer Plant in Vancouver.

Forty-eight wooden steamers remain to be delivered to the shipping board under the original government contracts in the Oregon district represented by 12 yards including the wooden yard at the G. M. Standifer Construction corporation of Vancouver, Wash.

The status of the wooden shipbuilding contracts for the district to Saturday, May 17, is given by Statistician Captain Hiram M. Mitchell of the Emergency Fleet corporation at Portland in the following original contracts awarded to yards.

154; existing contracts for ships, 95; contracts for steamers cancelled, 35; existing contracts for hulls, 10; existing contracts for barges, 7; existing contracts for sailers, 4; total deliveries to be made outside of steamers: Hulls, 10; barges, 7; sailers, 4.

TOTAL LAUNCHINGS 104 Total launchings to May 17, 1919, 104; total deliveries, 47.

The Grant Smith & Porter ship company of St. Johns leads in construction operations, with 31 ships launched and 20 deliveries to the shipping board; ten of the plant's ships remain to be delivered, exclusive of one barge and one hull.

TWO CONTRACTS CANCELLED Supple & Ballin comes next with 11 ships launched and 8 delivered; the yard has still 12 deliveries to be made.

St. Johns' ways are now all empty. G. M. Standifer Construction corporation of Vancouver, Wash., has launched 18 steamers at the yard, of the original contract for 18 wooden ships, six were cancelled.

The McEachern Shipbuilding company of Astoria had 20 contracts originally, of which 9 were cancelled. The yard has launched 9 ships and delivered 6; 2 barges and 2 hulls are to be delivered.

The Peninsula Shipbuilding company has launched 8 ships and 7 steamers are to be delivered, exclusive of four sailers.

COAST LAUNCHES EIGHT The Coast Shipbuilding company has launched 8 steamers and delivered 3, with one hull to be delivered; original contracts, 12; cancellations, 4; ways empty.

Standifer yard, North Portland, has launched 7 steamers and delivered 1 and 5 hulls and 1 ship are to be delivered; ways empty. Of original contracts, 7 steamers and 1 hull are to be delivered; 6 contracts of which 2 were cancelled. The yard has launched 4 steamers and delivered 2; original contracts, 11; cancellations, 4; ways empty.

Somerset Brothers of Columbia City, Or., had 8 contracts of which 3 were cancelled. The yard has launched 6 and delivered 4 and has 2 ships and 1 barge to be delivered; original contracts, 12; cancellations, 4; ways empty.

Wagon Shipbuilding company of Astoria had 8 contracts, of which 4 were cancelled. The yard has launched 4 ships and no deliveries have been made. Four ships are to be delivered.

Feeney & Bremer Shipbuilding company had 2 contracts of which 1 was cancelled. The yard has launched 1; no deliveries; to be delivered, 1 hull; ways empty.

Kiernan & Kern had 4 contracts but all were cancelled. The yard began active building operations.

BUILDERS WILL MEET HURLEY Future Shipbuilding Policy Will Be Discussed by Yard Owners

Pacific coast shipbuilders, including representatives of the steel yards of the Oregon district, who are now in Washington, D. C., will confer with Chairman Hurley of the shipping board next Thursday, relative to the policy of building ships on the flat price basis, with no guarantee by the government against the cost of labor and materials.

The suggestion that the shipbuilders undertake contracts on the basis of 110 to 115 per cent has already been made by Mr. Hurley but no action on the proposition will be taken until the builders' views can be obtained.

Now that the war has ended and peace-time conditions are rapidly returning it is the aim of the government, it is reported, to place American yards where they can successfully compete with the foreign yards.

Another important question pending is the substitution of ships of 12,000 to 14,000 tons for the smaller vessels built and under way.

It is estimated that it will require some \$700,000,000 for the shipping board to carry out the plan already in effect, already been entered into. Congressional aid is necessary for the furnishing of the funds with which to continue building on government account.

The conference is of utmost importance to local steel shipbuilders whose yards will soon finish the contracts they have on hand.
