

# HAWKER BRANDED AS POOR LOSER

### His Criticism of American Fliers Who Beat Him to Europe Is Not Liked in Washington.

Washington, May 30.—The remarks of Harry G. Hawker, Australian aviator, who, after failing to cross the Atlantic, attempted to belittle the successful American aviators at the London banquet Wednesday drew caustic comment and adverse criticism on every side today in high government circles.

Officials of the navy and other departments said that they would not have hesitated to express themselves for reprobation if Hawker were a British or a colonial official.

If the Australian had been an American the state department probably would have taken him to task.

Officials said that as Hawker is merely a private citizen who is actuated by jealousy over Commander Read's exploit as well as over the fact that two other seaplane commanders actually flew farther than Hawker did, the Australian's explosion should be put down simply to bad manners.

Other officials declared his remarks were "unparliamentary." One American admiral pointed out that Hawker's outbreak was not unexpected as the aviator had begun to be "unpleasantly critical" before he started from Trepassy. The admiral stated that Hawker had previously spoken of the American flight as a "hippodrome performance."

Attention was also given to Hawker's statement that the American flight should not be regarded highly because the Americans' lives were protected every 20 miles.

# NC-4 DOWN SOON AFTER START FOR PLYMOUTH

The NC-4 "hopped off" from Lisbon at 1:20 this morning, New York time, to make the last stretch of a 3775 mile air voyage from the coast of Long Island.

# NON-STOP RETURN FLIGHT IS NOT TO BE ATTEMPTED

Washington, May 30.—(I. N. S.)—Navy department officials today set at rest speculation on the possibility of Commander Read attempting a non-stop transatlantic flight on his way back to this country.

They pointed out that the winds at this time of the year would make such a feat next to impossible. Just what he will do following his arrival at Plymouth has not been revealed. He is under orders to "proceed with the NC-4 to Plymouth, England." On his arrival he will receive fresh orders, to be determined at a conference of Secretary Daniels with representatives of the air service. But these will not call for an attempt at a non-stop return, it was definitely stated.

# PLYMOUTH PUT ON BEST DRESS TO RECEIVE FLYER

Plymouth, England, May 30.—(I. N. S.)—Plymouth was bedecked today with the Stars and Stripes and the Union Jack. The American flag flew from all the vessels in the harbor, both in observance of Memorial day and because of the seaplane's expected arrival.

Three British seaplanes, flying both American and British flags, were on the alert waiting for word that the NC-4 was approaching the English coast. It was their plan to dash out to salute her with Very lights and escort her to port.

The NC-4, when she arrives, will be moored in the Cattwater, the mouth of the Plym river, under present plans and her crew taken aboard the United States ship Aroostock. It is planned to have Lieutenant Commander Read and the other airmen land from the Aroostock at Mayflower Rock, whence the Mayflower set forth on her voyage to America.

Unless present arrangements are changed, Read and the seaplane's crew will go to London before proceeding to Paris.
