Feast of Weeks Will Be Celebrated in All Synagogues on That Date.

Special festival services will be held in all Jewish houses of worship, Wednesday. June 4 (in orthodox synagogues also on the fifth) for the Feast of Weeks or Pentecost, known to the Jews as Shabouth. The name derives from the fact that the festival falls seven weeks or 50 days after the beginning of the Passover festival. And just as the Passover festival is the precursor of Easter, so the Feast of Weeks is the prototype of the Christian feast of Pentecost which falls 50 days after Easter. While the Feast of Weeks was in Biblical times an agricultural festival to celebrate the gathering of the wheat harvest and of the first fruits. later tradition makes it the anniversary of the giving of the Ten Commandments and the Law on Mt. Sinat. Thus in the modern synagogue the ancient harvest festival has taken on an historical character which gives it its


