

PROHIBITION TO CUT DOWN SUPPLY OF REAL WHISKEY

Otherwise Oregon Will Experience Little Effect From Enforcement of Law After July 1.

MUCH BOOZE ONLY FOR RICH

Men of Limited Means Must Get On With Bay Rum, Cooking Extracts and Patent Medicines.

The chief effect of national prohibition in Oregon will be to cut down the supply of "bootleg" intoxicants and thereby so increase the price that only the very rich can afford to imbibe, is the opinion of Chief of Police N. F. Johnson. The chief adds to his statement that the evils of prohibition will be automatically done away with within 10 years by the elimination of the supply and the forced curtailment of the demand.

The fact that the rest of the United States will be bone dry on July 1 will neither help nor hinder Portland's bootleggers in their pursuit of forbidden liquor. Portland is about as bone dry as it can ever become, for whiskey is selling at \$15 to \$20 a bottle, and "moonshine" at \$10 to \$12, and the thirsty ones, those remnants of an alcoholic generation whose joy of life is measured in quarts, have turned to substitutes.

APPETITES NOT APPEASED

The inexorable law of supply and demand is working havoc with the appetites of those who love whiskey. The demand is great, but it is only the man with the bottomless purse who can get all he wants; those without money turn to patent medicines, extracts, hair tonic and bay rum as agents of intoxication. The eternal vigilance of city, county and federal authorities makes the barter of whiskey a risky proposition. McNeill Island continually throws the shadow of its somber walls on those who run the liquor into the state; county jails and state prisons wait to crush the joy out of the life of the bootlegger.

Despite all police activity, a goodly stream of whiskey and high priced wine is flowing into the state, through one channel or another. A considerable quantity of illicit whiskey is being manufactured within the state; one such still was recently demolished within 100 feet of the county courthouse. Some brew home-made beer and wines in the secrecy of their homes and druggists are besought for medicinal bitters.

GOOD STUFF SCARCE

Real, bottled in bond whiskey is scarce except for those who can comply with the demands of the bootlegging trade. And even these in all cases cannot be sure that they are receiving real liquor. If a person is only a casual customer, one who purchases only an occasional bottle, the chances are about even that the booze he purchases will be adulterated.

Ether is used extensively in doctoring whiskey. Three drinks from such a bottle and the thirsty one is ready for an operating table. Scores of drunks have been picked up by the police, plainly suffering from the effects of overdoses of ether.

STRANGER OUT OF LUCK

Very little whiskey is being retailed—that is, sold by the drink—about Portland. The trade is far too dangerous. Those who buy booze must get it off the premises of the dealer immediately. A few foreigners, proprietors of North End pool halls, sell drinks to their countrymen, whom they can trust, but the stranger has no chance to wet his throat in these places. Some of the so-called social clubs in the business district are said to sell liquor, but if so the police have been unable to secure evidence against the proprietors.

The activity of the federal authorities means more to the trade than does the threat of prosecution by city or county officials. Possession of more than four quarts of liquor on an incoming California train may lead to arrest and conviction in the United States court on charges of violating the Reed amendment.

The majority of the drunkards arrested by the police are men over 50 years of age, time-servers of the saloon. They resort to anything that will produce intoxication.

LIQUOR PASSING

"Within 10 years," said Chief of Police Johnson, "I think the booze problem will have settled itself. We have very little trouble in Portland except from confirmed drunkards. It is true that people of all classes use liquor, but it is so scarce, so hard to get, and so high priced, that only those with plenty of money can afford a celebration now and then. With the run of North End drunkards who find their way to our jail every night, death is the only solution of the problem. They will drink, will take anything with alcohol in it, and we do not seem to be able to stop them. But we have the booze traffic in control, and every day reduces the supply of illicit liquor in the city. Only the very rich and the very poor seem to be able to indulge in alcoholic pleasures now. If the rest of the United States handles the booze proposition like Oregon does, drunkards are going to be few and far between."

California State Banks May Join Reserve System

San Francisco, May 31.—State banks of California may join the federal reserve system under the provisions of a senate bill signed by Governor Stephens last week. Under the provisions of this act any California bank with a capital and surplus of \$1,000,000 or more may establish foreign branches or branches in the dependencies or insular possessions of the United States for furtherance of the foreign commerce of California and the United States. The act will also enable state banks to lend commercial paper to a greater extent and will give them the opportunity to become national banks if they so desire.

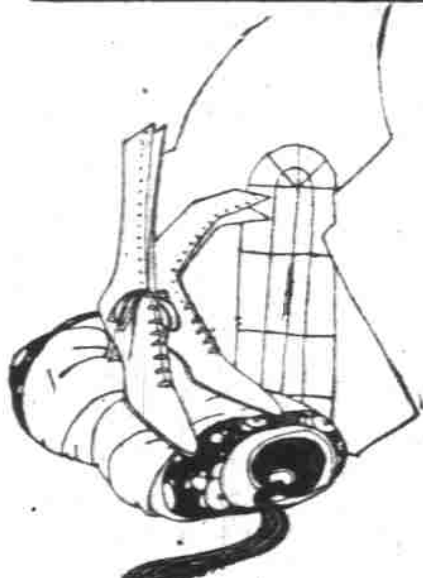
