

APOSTOLIC HEALER BRINGS SMILES TO SUFFERERS' FACES

Englishman Who Claims to Effect
Cures by Faith Alone Treats
"Patients" in Trinity Chapel.

MAJORITY CHRONIC CASES

Ability to Inspire New Faith in
Others Discovered When 14;
Surgery, Medicine Not Decried

New York, June 6.—James Moore, Hickson, England's "apostolic healer," who, however, distinctly disavows any power to cure save through the biblical, authoritative quickening of the faith, held a public meeting Thursday night at Trinity chapel, 18 West Twenty-fifth street, where he laid his hands upon 100 persons, mostly women, and uttered prayers for them.

None of his "patients" claimed to have been cured, but their faces were lighted and their steps, for the most part, lagging as they approached Hickson, were noticeably firmer when they departed.

The majority of the "patients" were clearly chronic cases who had abandoned hope of being helped by physicians. Not a few were so feeble that friends had to assist them to the choir rail before which Hickson stood. Each, apparently, was treated alike.

EPISCOPAL PRAYER USED
Prior to the opening of the meeting Mr. Hickson, who read immediately prayers from the Episcopal ritual, a young woman assistant circulated among the audience, notebook in hand, jotting down memoranda of names, addresses, ailments and what had been done in seeking cures.

Then after the opening prayers, she called the roll, leading the "patients" to Mr. Hickson one at a time.
The "treatment" was simplicity itself, consisting of a moment's conversation and a murmured prayer by Mr. Hickson as he laid his hands upon the patients' heads or hips. Some of the women were in tears as they departed, but all wore smiles.

DISCOVERED POWER WHEN 14
His first discovery that he had some power to help others came when he was with his own family. He was then 14 years old.

"I discovered then," he said, "my ability to inspire new faith in those who were discouraged by long suffering, even to the extent of their being able to resist pain and find a new vitality for getting well."
"I believe that my work has enabled those who have come to me to find a physical cure. But it would be doing a great wrong if anything said of my efforts should be used for the depreciation of the scientific use of medicine and surgery. To strengthen faith, faith in the divine healing powers of a Christ who is still and always will be with the world, is the most that I can lay claim to. It has been given me to gain much in the past."

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CALLED HERESY
Mr. Hickson characterized as heresy the assertion by some that sickness is sent by God to develop a spiritual life. He also declared heretical the denial of evil by Christian Scientists.

"The real cure is to know that Christ is present in our daily lives, then no ill and no fear can stay with us," he said.
Mr. Hickson has been working quietly in New York about a week on invitation of Rev. Dr. William T. Manning, rector of Trinity church, who was present at today's meeting, but a number of his activities were made public only today. When asked after the meeting for information as to results of his efforts thus far in behalf of "patients" here he replied:

"Only after months of observation is it possible to tell how far my efforts have helped a sufferer. I like to watch a patient a long time before I am willing to say a cure has been effected. This ministry is not simply for bodily disease. There are mental and moral diseases and obsessions which must be helped."

CHURCHES NEGLECT HEALING
The churches, he asserted, have neglected the gift of healing, which he described as the birthright of the church since the fifth century.

"The success of a cure depends upon the patient's capacity for faith," he said. "It is supplemental to the treatment of doctors and has no relation to psychology—therapy or suggestion," he declared.

The greatest measure of success, said Mr. Hickson, has been among children, as they have "less to unlearn before submitting themselves to a faith that cures."

Mr. Hickson will remain in New York for two weeks.
