

FAVORABLE REPORT FOR SHIPPING BILL

Jones Measure Calls for Opening of Yards to Foreign Contract Without Strings.

Washington, June 6.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL).—The senate commerce committee Thursday ordered a favorable report on Senator Jones' resolution to direct opening of shipyards to foreign account without restriction, except as to contract for alien enemies or enemy countries.

This action was preceded by an interchange of views between members of the committee, Jones, Harding, Chamberlain, McNary, Ransdell and others arguing that this action was urgently needed and that the American merchant marine will then really be strengthened sufficiently to enable American yards to demonstrate what they can do in competition with the world.

Senator Simmons asked that Chairman Hurley be heard on any objections he may have before the Jones resolution is acted upon, and Chairman Jones agreed to delay action until after next Tuesday, when Hurley will be invited to present his views.

No change is indicated in the situation regarding the restoration of contracts on the Pacific Coast, the shipping board adhering to its stand that prices offered are unsatisfactory.

Glass May Select Frank A. Vanderlip

Washington, June 6.—That the vacancy on the federal reserve board, caused by the resignation of Frederick A. Delano, may be filled by Frank A. Vanderlip, former president of the National City bank, was the belief expressed in official circles here today. Secretary Glass recently announced that a name for the vacancy shortly would be recommended to the president. Vanderlip has been closely connected with treasury affairs during the war.

Wolf of Wall Street Must Serve Sentence

New York, June 6.—(I. N. S.).—The United States circuit court of appeals Thursday affirmed conviction and sentence of David Lamar, "the wolf of Wall street," and Henry B. Martin of laborers' national peace council, for conspiring to obstruct the shipment of munitions to the allies by fomenting strikes in this country. Lamar and Martin, who were convicted by Franz von Rintelen, were sentenced to serve a year in the Mercer county, New Jersey, penitentiary.

Inefficiency Not Known

Washington, June 6.—(U. P.).—Secretary of War Baker in a letter to Governor Allen, Kansas, made public Thursday, stated he has not seen an official copy of the report of the chief of staff of the first army, alleging inefficiency in the command of the Thirty-fifth division during the Argonne battle.

La Grande, June 6.—The man who robbed the bank at Haines, Or., a few days ago, supposed to be Charles Conners, alias Burke, escaped prisoner from the Pendleton jail, is surrounded by the Baker county sheriffs and police force 9 miles east of Telocasset, according to news received here Thursday.

Referendum of Dry Law in S. D. Sought

San Francisco, June 6.—(U. P.).—Referendum petitions asking that the 1919 South Dakota "bone dry" prohibition law be referred to the voters was filed with the secretary of state at Pierre today, according to a telegram received here from the South Dakota direct legislation committee. "We have just filed referendum petitions containing 16,000 names, referring the question to the voters in November, 1920, as a protest against the search and seizure feature of the measure," said the message in part.

Troopship Is Delayed

Boston, Mass., June 6.—(I. N. S.).—Delayed by engine trouble, the battleship New Jersey, with 154 returning soldiers aboard, reported by wireless today that she will not be able to reach port until Saturday.

CHURCH BOARD SAYS CORVALLIS MINISTER DISAPPEARED BEFORE

Discovery Also Made Pastor of Christian Church Owed Notes at Old Home.

Corvallis, June 6.—Members of the official board of the Christian church have presented a statement regarding the recent disappearance of their pastor, Rev. J. Cronenberger, confirming the published statement recently appearing that the minister left his family and friends unceremoniously in former years, and adding that an indebtedness in the way of promissory notes given at Fowler, Colo., has been discovered. Regarding the former disappearance, the board stated that he was gone several years and later returned to live with his family again.

"We unhesitatingly resented the first insinuations that he had fled the country," the statement read, "because of our confidence in the man, and nothing appearing to justify the assumption of such a course, we stuck to the belief that he had met death in the river as first appearances indicated. However, to satisfy others of the truth of our belief and the error of the rumors, we started our investigation, the result of which is that we found that instead of getting a shave and haircut and making a couple of calls as he stated was his intention when he left home, he did neither, but made a hurried trip to Albany, where he purchased at least a partial suit of clothes, consisting of a khaki coat, at a clothing house, where he was recognized by the salesman who sold him the coat.

"We have found no irregularities in any of Mr. Cronenberger's business or social relations in Corvallis."

Fake Veteran Who Made Love Sought By U. S. Officers

Kansas City, Mo., June 6.—(U. P.).—Dr. R. C. McDonald, Kansas City blood specialist, secretly indicted by the federal grand jury here for impersonating an army officer, was the object today of a nationwide search, the department of justice officials revealed. McDonald posed as a nephew of General Pershing, told tales of being awarded a medal for bravery in the Russo-Japanese war and being wounded in the Spanish-American war, justice officials said.

He is also alleged to have made violent and successful love to Kansas City women and girls, one of these "affairs" being responsible for his detection.

Reds Not Desirable

Cleveland, Ohio, June 6.—(I. N. S.).—After an examination of the 40 alien enemies taken here in the red roundup following the bombing of Mayor Davis' home, Immigration Inspector Fluekey this morning decided to recommend their deportation.
