

GOLDEN WEST HOTEL PROPRIETORS WOULD CONTEST ABATEMENT

Announcement Made as to Course if Threatened Action Taken by District Attorney.

Proprietors of the Golden West hotel announced today that they would contest the abatement proceedings which are said to be pending against them in the office of District Attorney Walter T. Johnson. The law firm of Johnson, Allen, Stevens and Johnson are open to property owners threatened with abatement. They may contest the action or they may file a bond with the presiding judge of the circuit court contingent upon the lawful maintenance of their premises. The latter action results in suspension of any action for abatement.

The threatened action against the Golden West hotel, which is expected to be filed today, is a result of a raid on the hotel Tuesday by federal aid county officers in which a large quantity of liquor was discovered in rooms of various guests.

ATTORNEY SAYS UNJUST
John H. Stevenson, acting for W. D. Allen, proprietor of the hotel, said that there was no more reason for closing the Golden West because some of the guests had liquor than there would be for closing any other hotel for the same reason. Many of the occupants of the hotel are Pullman porters and according to Mr. Stevenson, while there is no question but that they bring in liquor on their trips, the proprietors of the hotel are not to blame.

The contention is made by the attorney for Allen that should the Golden West be closed because the guests have liquor in their rooms the same action would be applicable to practically all the other hotels in Portland.

PROPERTY OWNED IN CANADA
The owners of the property are Elizabeth L. Watts, Manson C. Watts, Lillian Spencer, Vera Powell and Lael Cook, all residents of Canada.

L. L. Allen, brother of the proprietor, Tom Johnson, Harry Duval and George McCoy will be arraigned this afternoon before District Judge Dayton on a charge of violating the prohibition law. Rooms occupied by these men in the Golden West hotel during the raid made Tuesday were discovered to contain liquor.

MISSING WITNESS APPEARS

Mrs. Dibbern Says She Was Unaware of Nature of Contract.

Mrs. Edna Blanche Dibbern, missing witness for whom a bench warrant had been issued, appeared Thursday afternoon before Circuit Judge Gatens to make a deposition in the suit instituted against her by Attorney Lee Roy E. Keeley to recover \$1600 of the \$4000 paid her by the state industrial accident commission because of the death of her husband in a shipwreck.

Mrs. Dibbern admitted that she had signed a contract agreeing to pay Attorney Keeley 40 per cent of any money recovered through court action or settlement arising out of her husband's death, but she said that at the time she signed the contract she was too ill to know what she was doing. She testified that Attorney Keeley offered to take her case for nothing.

Farmers Say Lake Rising at Klamath Is Causing Damage

Klamath Falls, June 6.—Complaints are being heard from farmers and stockmen whose properties border upon Klamath lake because of the damage that, it is said, is being caused by rising of the water level in the lake. This partial inundation of the lands is caused, it is said, by the dam being put across the head of Link river, the outlet of the lake. Already this season considerable wild hay has been lost because of this, say stockmen from that section. The dam is being erected by the California-Oregon Power company to regulate the flow of water at Copco in the Klamath river, a continuation of Link

river, many miles below this city. The power company has a million-dollar plant at Copco and with electricity generated there is supplying all Southern Oregon and Northern California as far south as San Francisco. The company is building the dam in accordance with a contract with the United States reclamation service.

Council of Safety Organized Here at Meeting in Hotel

Organization of a state branch of the National Council of Safety assumed definite shape at noon today when representatives of industrial concerns in Oregon met at the Multnomah hotel. A temporary organization was formed Monday with A. E. Grodzki, safety en-

gineer of the O-W-R & N. and Southern Pacific, as chairman, and Harry P. Coffin of the Oregon Public safety commission, as secretary. Election of permanent officers will be made this afternoon. C. W. Price, general manager of the National Safety council, addressed the delegates of the industrial plants and said that in a few days a national field secretary will come to Portland to assist the state council secretary and advise him on a working plan for Oregon.

Noted Baptists Are Here Looking Over Situation in State

Dr. Gilbert N. Brink of Philadelphia, general secretary of the American Baptist Publication society, and H. V.

Meyer, business manager, were in Portland Thursday looking over the field and attending to business matters in connection with their society. They also held a conference with Dr. J. D. Springston, Baptist religious educational director for Oregon, and Rev. G. H. Hall of McMinnville, both of whom represent the society in this area. The men also considered a successor to Dr. Springston, as he has resigned his present place to accept a larger post of a similar nature in California. Mr. Meyer said they had several names under consideration but as yet had not decided upon Dr. Springston's successor. While on the coast they will visit the publication branches at San Francisco and Los Angeles, having already called on the Seattle branch.

The trouble is over an effort to enforce the traffic ordinance, following the arrest of 11 persons for violations.
