

RUSSIAN MASSES OPPOSE KOLCHAK

Correspondent Tells House That
Admiral Is Too Reactionary
to Receive Support.

New York, June 7.—(U. N. S.)—The Russian people will not submit to a government under Admiral Kolchak, whose recognition by the allies is being urged by French and certain other foreign interests, declared Frazier Hunt, newspaper correspondent, who returned from Russia Friday, after stopping in Paris to give his views to Colonel House.

Kolchak, Hunt said, is regarded as too reactionary. The Russians are anxious for recognition by the allies, particularly by the United States, he said, but are determined to have a radical government and will not permit the reactionaries of the czarist regime to return to power.

"The people have had a touch of real liberty and are going to hang on to it," he said. "All classes have a great faith in America, which they consider the one great nation they can trust."

The Bolsheviks have an army of 1,000,000, Hunt said, while Admiral Kolchak has only 200,000 opposing them. Petrograd, he said, is now as safe as New York and there are no executions except of robbers and holdup men, who are shot as soon as caught. The deaths from disease in both Petrograd and Moscow are appalling, he said, because the population is underfed and too weak to resist disease.

Make World Safe For Teetotaler, Is Slogan of League

Washington, June 7.—(U. P.)—The Anti-Saloon league of Nations, with aims of making the world safe for the teetotaler, will be organized here. The American Anti-Saloon league is the sponsor.

A covenant has been framed by a special committee for the international organization for a submission to the American league convention today.

Plans are for all nations, large and small, to have an equal representation. The "secretariat" is expected to be located at Washington. A special foreign relations committee of the "league" is provided, with James A. White of Columbus as chairman.

Germany has not yet applied for admission to the "league," but other countries that will have charter members besides the United States are Canada, Mexico, France, Ireland, Italy, Great Britain, Scotland, Japan, New Zealand and Australia.

Radical Sculptor Is Facing Deportation

Chicago, June 7.—(U. P.)—Deportation proceedings started before Assistant Immigration Inspector Howard E. Ely here today against Emilio Mari, 30, sculptor, organizer and charter member of the I. W. W. Mari's arrest Thursday night was regarded by police as of vital importance. Mari operated a clearing house for the mail of radicals, the police said. They said many I. W. W. at Leavenworth penitentiary were able to communicate with comrades and friends through him. The Mari investigation was expected by authorities to throw light on activity of Chicago radicals in the recent attempt to bomb prominent men in eight eastern states.

Trio of Aliens Ask To Be Shipped Home

Salt Lake City, June 7.—(U. P.)—Alvo Von Alvensleben, Ernest Laybold and Minnie Beckman, held as enemy aliens in the Fort Douglas internment camp, have applied for deportation. This will be granted, federal officials state. The trio will sail from Charleston, S. C., this month with other aliens to be deported. Von Alvensleben, who is alleged to have been the former financial agent of the former Kaiser in America, was arrested with Laybold on Puget Sound, charged with violating the espionage act. The Beckman woman was arrested attempting to smuggle a note to Laybold at the internment camp.

The resolution clothes the committee with power of administering oaths, compelling attendance of witnesses and issuance of subpoenas.

THE DALLES SHERIFF HALTS BOOZE PARTY BUT LETS 'EM LOOSE

The Dalles, June 7.—A man wearing a prominently displayed star bearing the words "United States Marshal," three bootleggers and an automobile loaded with liquor passed through The Dalles Friday without stopping. The three bootleggers, according to the story told later by the man wearing the star, were taken in custody at Bend and were being sent to Portland with their liquor, but Sheriff Chrisman received a tip that a large amount of liquor was in transit through the county and immediately got busy.

Chrisman gave chase in an automobile, but his car was too slow and he resorted to the telephone. He instructed his deputy at Mosier to stop the party and hold them, no matter what story they put up. The deputy held them up at the Mosier bridge.

"These men are my prisoners," the man with the star protested in a loud voice. "I am taking them to Portland. Let me pass. What right have you to interfere in the processes of the law?"

When Chrisman arrived the protests were still in progress. Then Chrisman discovered the identity of the man with the star. His near prisoner was Frank Tichenor, a real deputy United States marshal, and the three bootleggers were his prisoners. Explanations followed and Tichenor proceeded triumphantly to Portland.

Los Angeles Mayor Gives Women Share

Los Angeles, June 7.—(U. P.)—Women are to have an equal share with men in running the Los Angeles city government under the administration of Mayor-elect Snyder. Snyder declared today that he felt women were entitled to an equal share of the official positions and he intends to divide his appointments on a 50-50 basis between the men and women voters.

Chance of Losing.

Portland leads all cities in the Twelfth Federal Reserve district in the amount of oversubscription to the Victory Liberty loan, according to a report wired to The Journal from San Francisco, Friday night, by Robert E. Smith, state manager of the Oregon Liberty loan campaign.

"Get a shovel and begin digging for the foundation of the prize German cannon which is to go to the leading city of the district," enjoins Mr. Smith in his message. The figures are as follows:

Allies Will Punish Germany for Polish Frontier Aggression

London, June 7.—(U. N. S.)—If Germany attempts any military operations on the Polish frontier she will be punished by the allies in the west, said a Paris dispatch to the Evening News today.

It is probable, the correspondent adds, that there may be a modification of the treaty terms affecting the frontier of upper Silesia and also the economic conditions imposed on Germany.

A Berlin cablegram to the International News Service on Thursday stated that General Ludendorff was apparently in charge of the preparations for a German offensive in the east. It was said that large numbers of troops were being sent eastward from Berlin and that others were in training.
