

AIR FLIGHT REAL HONEST TO GOSH THRILL PRODUCER

"Up in the Air" Sensation When
One Does Tail Spin Hasn't an
Equal, Plane Passenger Says.

CLOUDS ARE ENCOUNTERED

Church Steeples, House Tops and
Trees Whirl as Army Aviator
Drives in Breathless Course.

One sweet young life, so full of hope and promise, became vastly more worth while about 10:15 this morning when it had escaped with nothing more than a shiver of cold and a dash of cloud mist from an honest to goodness tail spin maneuvered by Lieutenant Charles W. Schwartz 3600 feet above ground in the most graceful style his big army Curtiss airplane was capable of.

And before the thrill of that spin wears off and my stomach settles down to normal functions again, it might be well to remark that the woman who said flying has no new sensation is distinctly and decidedly wrong. If Lieutenant Schwartz' tail spin that turned the world upside down and made everything seem so much "up" in the air was a sensation, I trust I may never suffer one.

UPSIDE DOWN
My vocabulary of newspaper English is insufficient to describe in any way the sensation of looking directly "up" and seeing 3500 feet "above" the streets upon which I walk each day and the buildings that my daily tasks make familiar. For that is exactly the effect of riding "top side down" in an airplane. Everything is upside down, the sky below, the city above.

With nose headed straight for solid earth, the "old home" goes spinning and flying up to greet you with a rush that almost takes your breath, you flip into the spin and whirl between the wide wings like a top. There is a sensation that cannot soon be forgotten. It brings to mind in a flash all human failings and all past regrets.

Hereafter I shall be a staunch advocate of conservative flying, not that the tail spin is a new thing in the skies, but for my respect for what might happen if I ever get as empty as I felt for a few minutes this morning.

The tail spin, honestly, is great stuff if you like it. And one is bound to like it when it's over with. In the meantime—well, try it.

BREAKFAST DISREGARDED
One of the passengers selected by the Aero Club of Oregon to grace the front seat of one of the army airplanes in Portland for the Rose Festival, my flight proved doubly a sensation from the fact that Milton Reed Klepper, president of the Aero Club, marked me for the first victim of the morning.

Strapped tightly to the front seat of the big Curtiss bird and warned to keep my fingers out of the machinery, the first thrill of the day was the driver's motion of leaving the beautiful green of the municipal golf links and rising gradually somewhere between St. Johns and Oregon City.

Every pulsation of the roaring motor only added to the delight of the flight until this Schwartz person, seemingly totally disregarding my breakfast, turned the nose of his plane sharply and ascended. The rise of the plane was as distinct a feeling as one can well imagine.

Turning north over the city the big plane defied sunlit clouds that obscured all vision and, unable to see the driver, I hesitated no longer to estimate the value of my meagre insurance.

THINKS OF HOME
That was a lucky thought, too, for just about that time the driver's world turned topsy turvy. With one hand I grabbed for the nearest support for a falling appetite and with the other carried a spot perilously near the pit of my stomach. The plane was standing "on her nose" if a plane ever did, and the ground was coming up to meet it so fast that thoughts of home and wife and a mighty empty feeling surged through me. Then the great wings turned and the spin was over.

Just about the time this reckless Schwartz youth turned the gears for a second revolution of that eventful spin I assumed an overwhelming desire to feel the comforting effect of green grass under my feet and my own desires were only echoed by the chuckle I am positive Schwartz indulged in and which even the hum of the motor must not have smothered.

Schwartz managed his bird machine as easily as I used to drive a spy. An old horse and carted over most of the city and descended to the golf links as easily and as gracefully as he had flown from that spot only 15 minutes before.

Flying may have no sensations that are new, but for my part I never spent such a sensational 15 minutes in my life, and I'll be ready for the next ride when the whistle blows if the driver leaves out the tail spin.

RAILROADS PUTTING ON EXTRA TRAINS TO HANDLE THE VISITORS

California Travel Is Especially
Heavy; Electric Service
Adds New Trains.

More visitors are coming into Portland for the Rose Festival than have visited the city for any one event for the past eight years, according to the passenger movement over the local roads, says John M. Scott, general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific. Both the California and local movement of passengers is heavier than any of the railroad officials had anticipated.

"It is altogether a question of getting enough cars to accommodate the Oregon visitors," says J. A. Ormandy, assistant general passenger agent of the Southern Pacific. The morning train arriving at 7:20 from San Francisco ran in two sections this morning with a total of 20 cars. Most of the Southern Pacific trains are being run in two sections and have from 10 to 20 cars in their makeup.

To make extra accommodations, the Southern Pacific has placed a special train on the electric line to Forest Grove, leaving Portland at 1 p. m. and returning, leaving Forest Grove at 3:15 p. m. This train will operate until Sunday. Another extra train will run to Newberg every night, leaving Portland at 11:25 p. m. This train will be operated until Monday.

Tuesday was the largest day for local traffic the O-W. R. & N. has experienced in many months. The Spokane, Portland & Seattle railroad is placing extra equipment on its trains to accommodate visitors from the valley and the Oregon Electric railroad is placing extra car service in effect to accommodate the college students, who will leave Corvallis about Friday.

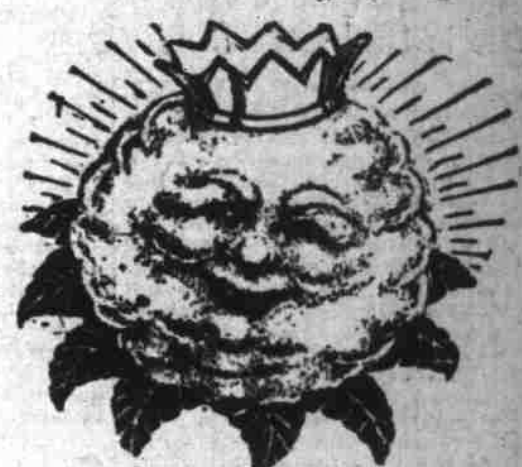
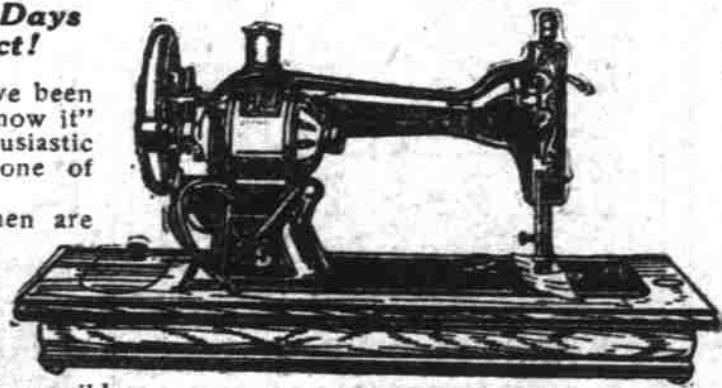
