

MASONS TO BUILD AT FOREST GROVE

Construction Work on Home to Begin at Once; Site Given By Holbrook Lodge.

The grand lodge of Oregon, Ancient, Free and Accepted Masons, has accepted the recommendation of the Masonic and Eastern Star home committee and authorized the location of the home at Forest Grove.

Holbrook lodge of that city offered a free site of 15 acres one-half mile east of Forest Grove, which is described as being bounded on the north by the Oregon Electric railway, on the south by the Pacific highway, on the east by a local highway and on the west by farm lands. There is a flag station on the tract maintained by the Oregon Electric, and the Southern Pacific has a flag station within a few hundred feet. An option is held by the committee for 16 additional acres on the west for \$10,000, which will be purchased.

The grand lodge authorized the cottage plan, with an administration central building, also in accordance with the recommendation of the committee. The grand chapter, Order of the Eastern Star, upon learning of the action of the grand lodge of Masons, turned into the hands of the committee nearly \$10,000, which it had on hand for the home, and the construction of the first units of the home at an early date is thereby assured. It is understood that considerable sums are expected to be donated by prominent Masons of the state as soon as papers are made out.

The committee viewed sites offered free by Ashland, Salem and other parties. Robert A. Miller and J. D. Lee each offered a tract of 30 acres near Lewis and Clark. One tract of 100 acres was offered for \$25,000, with a large building, but because of bad roads leading thereto it was rejected.

Officers and delegates of the grand lodge were escorted Tuesday noon by George East, master of the east, and Mrs. Maude Pope Allyn, mistress of the east, and a host of other Eastern Star women to the banquet halls, where tables were spread for 400.

ORDER OF EASTERN STAR HOLDS MEMORIAL SERVICE

Several local chapters reported that they would furnish rooms in the new home to be built at Forest Grove.

PRESIDENT'S MEXICAN NOTE IS USED IN SUIT BY FORD ATTORNEYS

Introduced to Show Government Policy Conflicted With That Of Chicago Tribune.

Mt. Clemens, Mich., June 12.—President Wilson's note of March 25, 1916, was introduced in evidence in the Ford-Tribune million-dollar libel suit Wednesday. Attorneys for Ford interests read the note to show the government's policy toward the Mexican situation and to contrast it with the Tribune's policy.

The note stated that the punitive expedition led by General Pershing was merely actuated by the outrages at Columbus, N. M., by the bandit Villa, and asked press associations and newspapers to "play" the "get Villa" angle in order to avoid misunderstanding of the expedition's purpose. The note said the expedition was not to be regarded as war and stated clearly there would not be intervention in Mexico so long as there were honest men at the head of the government.

Norman Walker, a newspaper man of El Paso, testified that the Columbus raid might have been caused by two things, namely, a jail fire in which several Mexicans were lost, or the fact that Carranza troops were allowed to cross Texas. German propaganda as the cause, Walker said, he had investigated, but could not find corroboration.

Mr. Thompson of Glen's Springs, Texas, the second witness, told of the slaying of his 4½-year-old son and the burning of his home by 120 Mexican members of a raiding party. Three American soldiers and 27 bandits were killed in the raid, Thompson said.

Attempt Will Be Made to Sell Tags

Seattle, June 12.—(U. P.)—At the risk of going to jail, the members of the Central Labor council will hold a tag day to sell tags for the defense of Tom Mooney. The permit for the sale of the tags has been refused by Mayor Hanson, but the council will make another request, and if this is turned down, it will hold the tag day anyhow, some time before June 21. This course was decided on by the Central Labor council Wednesday night.

Pawned Pants Are Reclaimed Saturday

New York, June 12.—(I. N. S.)—Many a New Yorker pawns his best Sunday pants on Monday and reclaims them Saturday after receiving his weekly pay envelope. This and other deep mysteries of the pawnbrokers' game were revealed by the pawnbrokers themselves today when they replied to the demands of their clerks, who want an eight hour day, that they would not grant the eight hour day every day but Saturday, when they insist that the clerks shall work late, passing reclaimed pants over the counter.

Oakville Postoffice Entered by Robbers

Aberdeen, Wash., June 12.—Robbers Wednesday broke into the postoffice at Oakville, dynamited the safe and made their escape with \$25 in currency, one \$50 Liberty bond and three registered packages. This is the second postoffice robbery in this vicinity within six weeks, the Elma office being robbed a short while ago.

Crew Safely Leaves Burning Lumber Ship

Halifax, June 12.—Their vessel after 1000 miles off the Newfoundland coast, the captain and crew of the three-masted schooner J. B. Kitchen, en route from here to Ireland, laden with lumber, were rescued Wednesday by the French cruiser Somme. A high sea was running and the rescue was effected with extreme difficulty. The ship and the crew's personal belongings were abandoned.

Extra Session Is Called in Missouri

Jefferson City, Mo., June 12.—(I. N. S.)—Governor Gardner today called an extra session of the Missouri legislature for July 2 to ratify the suffrage amendment.

Two Jurors Needed For Wilkins' Trial

Mincola, L. I., June 12.—(U. P.)—Two jurors were needed for Dr. Wilkins' murder trial when his trial resumed today. A panel of 35 was on hand. Dr. Wilkins, retired physician of Long Beach, N. Y., is accused of having killed his wife by beating her over the head with a hammer. He declares three burglars killed the woman.
