

BISHOP SUMNER HAS WORDS OF PRAISE FOR NURSES AT HOSPITAL

Annual Commencement Exercises Held at Good Samaritan; Debt Has Been Lifted.

"The pin you will receive tonight is nothing less than a service medal, for no more heroic service has been rendered than that which you have given," declared Bishop Sumner Taylor, president of the board of trustees of Good Samaritan hospital, in his address to the graduates of that institution at the annual commencement exercises held Thursday evening at St. Stephens Cathedral.

You were attacked time and again by disease, yet you never faltered. If one fell by the wayside another was ready to take her place. You were unable to go to France, although that would have been the dramatic, the romantic thing to do. You remained here, where the danger was as great, if not greater.

"Good Samaritan hospital is out of debt for the first time in its history. It now has property worth \$500,000. During the past year more worthy poor cases have been cared for at Good Samaritan than at all of the other Portland hospitals combined, except the county hospital, yet Miss Loveridge, the superintendent, has turned over to the trustees \$15,000, the earnings of the institution for the past year, and she pledges to make the sum \$25,000 before our new wing is completed. The new wing will be a memorial to Mrs. Emma Wakeman, one of the founders of the hospital and its superintendent for 24 years."

Major Ray Matson, in an illuminating address, covered three phases of nursing, the religious, the scientific, and the scientific, ending with a high tribute to the Portland nurses who lost their lives in the influenza epidemic. Music was furnished by Carl Delton, organist; Frank Fichtenlaub, violinist; Ferdinand Konrad, cellist. Rev. R. T. Hicks and Rev. F. K. Howard assisted in the services.

Escorted by a delegation of Portland policemen, the Seattle guardians of the law were being taken for a trip along the highway Thursday morning when their chief, Joel Warren, who acts as drum major for the band, noticed the large brick building which is used by the county as a home for homeless. Told that the imposing structure was a poor house, he gave orders that on the return trip the band should stop for a

few minutes and serenade the old people.

Entirely unaided the automobiles bearing the band drew up at the institution on their return trip over the highway and gave the old men and old women a treat that will not soon be forgotten.

White whiskered, patriarchal appearing old men forgot their rheumatism when the band burst out with the strains of one of the latest jazz steps and tried to think that they were young again by doing an old-fashioned dance. A little white haired old lady, well over 80, an inmate of the home for 10 years, volunteered the information that she had been a good dancer when she was

young and that she wished she could step out again. Some three or four of the nurses, unable to resist the temptation, each grabbed a partner from the crowd of Portland policemen and staged an informal hop on the broad veranda of the home.

INMATES LIVE IN PAST

A small, weakened old man, well on the road to 90, catching the spirit of the occasion, began giving old time dance calls—"Swing your partners" and "All couples promenade," forgetting that dance customs had changed since the days when he trod the terpsichorean measures. Bed-ridden old invalids begged that they might be wheeled to the windows or veranda, to catch a view of the young couples and hear the music
