Hip Bill Nearly
100 Per Cent
Excellent

Comedy Has Large Share of Entertainment at Local Theatre.

ANOTHER nearly 100 per cent excellent bill of vaudeville and photoplay opened at the Hippodrome Thursday, the outstanding feature of which is Jack Rose, a comedian of the "nut" variety, who keeps the audience in a state of laughter from the moment he steps on the stage until with considerable difficulty, he succeeds in getting away.

Chief Blue Cloud, a full blood Sioux, and Winona, a South American Indian, are well educated and speak English with little or no accent. They give an entertainment which consists largely of their tribal songs and dances. Blue Cloud, while at Carleton, distinguished himself as a performer on the slide trombone, and during his time on the bill he gives some selections on this instrument.

Alma Grant and her accompanist, Sam Armstrong, have an entertaining offering. Miss Grant is a small package and she sings a series of "kidd" songs as naturally as if she were not a grown-up herself.

Claire Hanson and the Village Four give some good singing of a wide variety of selections and the quartet indulges in comedy stuff which seems rather to miss fire somehow. Miss Hanson does some clever work so far as she is concerned, however.

Fitch Cooper is one continuous laugh. Architecturally he would be counted slim in comparison to a telegraph pole. His awkwardness is intensified by his costume.

Some excellent athletics and balancing is an offering by Mareena, Navaro and Mareena. The clown member of the troupe is the hit of the act.

The picture is Zeena Keefe in "An Amateur Widow," the story being that of a girl who chases a dead man's name in order to escape a superfluity of aunts and who found out that the said dead man was very much a live one.

Publicity Game?

"Sergeant Crane, sweet singer of the Portland police department, did either a flagrant case of 'double cross' or an ingenious press agent stunt Wednesday night when he stepped on the stage of Liberty theatre and sang Henry Murtagh's new Rose Festival song. Murtagh, who is organizer at the theatre, was playing the accompaniment and Patrolman Van Volkenburg served him with a warrant charging him with distributing advertising matter without a license.

The warrant was signed by Crane, himself. It alleges that Murtagh pasted handbills on show windows during the dark hours of Wednesday morning, contrary to law and the peace and dignity of the city.

The case was not called Thursday by Judge Rossmann. Some police officials went so far as to swear out the warrant merely to give publicity to the song.

Public Markets End
Era of Middleman

Milwaukee, Wis.—Through its public markets Milwaukee has eliminated the middleman in the handling of garden truck and some other produce to a greater extent than any other large city in America, according to F. C. Janssen, city dealer.

"Additional public markets and buildings have been provided for by the common council," he said. "The public markets in here afford an opportunity for direct transfer of produce from the producer to consumer that is given to no other large city in the country. In the western cities middlemen are admitted to the public markets, with the result that much of the benefit of the plan developed here is lost."

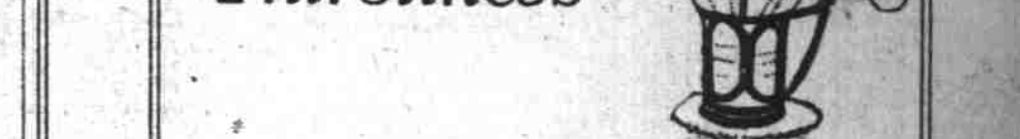
