

WALL STREET IS DECLARED TO BE FAVOR OF LEAGUE

Republicans Speak Softly When They Find Financiers Are Not Unanimously Fighting Them.

STAND MAY END ARGUMENT

Knox Resolution Gets Approval of Foreign Relations Senate Committee by Narrow Margin.

Washington, June 13.—How does Wall street stand on the peace treaty now?

That was the question which was being asked in Washington today.

The question became pertinent and politically important in the minds of the Washington statesmen as a result of the inquiry held by the senate committee Wednesday to determine how copies of the peace treaty came into the possession of Wall street financiers.

Before the inquiry Wednesday opinion was unanimous that Wall street favored the ratification of the treaty with the League of Nations covenant included.

DOUBTS ARE RAISED

It was on this understood attitude of big business and the declarations that organized labor have made in favor of the treaty that Democratic confidence in the inability of the senate Republican majority to prevent ratification rested. Democratic leaders believed this combination of big business and organized labor would prove a decisive influence.

The senate inquiry has raised much doubt as to whether the Democrats can rely on big business to exert its pressure in favor of the ratification of the document. The senate Republicans uncovered and made much of the fact that Wall street interests had copies of the treaty, while it was denied to the senate and the people. Nevertheless, the spokesmen for big business at the inquiry, Messrs. Morgan, Davidson, Vanderlip and Root, did not resent the spreading of the information that Wall street had copies of the treaty, but bitterly resented the suggestion that they possessed these copies without right and probably had obtained them through bribery.

SEE RAY OF HOPE

This was the Democratic charge, and the Republican senators took much care to make it clear to the Wall street spokesmen that the Democrats put this charge of Democratic origin.

The representatives of big business at the inquiry were plainly much more in sympathy with the Republican position than they were with the Democratic.

Moreover, their sympathy with the Republicans was not wholly a matter of inference. Senator Knox put this blunt question to Mr. Vanderlip: "Do you think we ought to guarantee their (the nations of Europe) political independence and territorial integrity as a part of this scheme?"

"I do not," replied Mr. Vanderlip emphatically.

The Republicans regarded this reply by Mr. Vanderlip as clearly indicating his opposition to the League of Nations covenant in its existing form.

PLAN IS ABANDONED

The truth is, the manifest disposition of the big business spokesmen to sympathize with the Republican attitude changed the whole course of the inquiry. The correspondents generally were told the evening before the in-

quiry that the cross-examination of Wall street's representatives would not be principally to determine how they came into the possession of copies of the treaty, but would be conducted with the view of developing fully just what Wall street's interest in the treaty is.

That announced intention was abandoned. No embarrassing questions were asked the Wall street spokesmen. No attempt was made to bring out the reasons why big business is in favor of the covenant. The nearest approach to an attempt to ascertain Wall street's views with respect to the treaty was the question put by Senator Knox to Mr. Vanderlip.

SEIZING AT STRAWS

The explanation given of this change in the Republican intention is said to be the gratification which the Republicans found in the favorable attitude of the spokesmen for big business at the inquiry to the Republican viewpoint.

If big business can be swung against the covenant the changes of passing the Knox resolution will be greatly enhanced. Because they are led to believe that it may be so swung may account for the leniency which the Republicans showed in cross-examination of the Wall street witnesses at the inquiry.

The contest is now so close that both sides are eager to seize upon any advantage which presents itself. Canvasses of the senate today were said to indicate the possibility of a tied vote, in which event Vice President Marshall would cast the deciding vote.

The debate on the Knox resolution will begin Monday, and when the senate adjourned today it adjourned until Monday to give both sides an opportunity to prepare for the fray.

Labor Troubles in Italy Are Assuming Serious Proportions

Rome, June 12.—(U. P.)—Rioting and labor disturbances continue in many parts of Italy, according to dispatches received here today.

Two men were killed and 25 injured in a food riot at Spezia (25 miles southeast of Genoa). Troops fired on civilians when the latter attempted to loot shops after looting had sought to prevent arrival of food supplies because of a municipal order cutting down prices.

Government and municipal authorities here expected to settle pending strikes here to prevent a general recession of industry.

A general strike in Naples has been settled, the workers receiving a few concessions.

Leading merchants and manufacturers in Genoa have declared a five-day lock-out in protest against state monopolies of several materials.

Remains of Townley Expected at Winona

Winona, Minn., June 13.—The body of James A. Townley, former congressman from the first Minnesota district, who died Thursday at Excelsior Springs, Mo., was expected to reach Winona Sunday. Townley had been ill for several months, a result of hardening of the arteries.

Sister Modesta Found

Sister Modesta, who was reported missing from St. Stephens convent, 1234 East Taylor street, has merely gone home for a rest, according to the report to the police this morning by Father W. A. Walt. Her health was not the best, so she left for a short visit near Salem. Father Walt reported. Her parents called for her at the convent and took her home in an automobile. A little irregularity in her departure caused some persons in the institution to fear she had disappeared.

Ray Turner Paroled

Oregon City, June 13.—Ray Turner, convicted of non-support, was sentenced to a year in the county jail and paroled on condition that he pay \$5 a month toward the support of his family. Mrs. Turner was formerly Naomi Bowers.

GEN. JOHNSTON SPEAKS IN PRAISE OF OREGON MEN WHO FOUGHT HUN

Commander Requests That Audience Save Its Cheers for Men He Tells About.

Wild cheers suddenly hushed at the Chamber of Commerce Thursday afternoon.

"Don't praise me; save your applause for the men I will tell you about," requested Major General William H. Johnston, commander of the Wild West 51st division, as he rose to speak to the members and guests of the Progressive Business Men's club.

Then he told how the gallant officers and men of the 51st pushed their way farthest into the German lines in wiping out the St. Mihiel salient, which for three years had thrust into the allied lines like a thorn in the flesh of the world. He told of the blue day, when the 51st having been credited with doing its full share in the advance, was ordered for relief work in Belgium.

Though the men were exhausted with triumph fighting they wanted no rest, but only to go on erasing the blot of Germany.

General Johnston looked backward to define the credit for the heroism of the Northwesterners. "They were worthy sons of the pioneers whose enterprise, persistence and courage built up this country, and they showed the same qualities in their fighting," he declared.

Although General Johnston praised all the men and officers who served under him, he found occasion to give particular mention to one of them. "The work of Lieutenant Colonel Guy Strohm with the sanitary train in Belgium was particularly worthy of praise," he said. Dr. Strohm is a Portlander.

General Johnston was introduced by Captain Jacob Kanaler, judge-elect of the domestic relations court. D. Burntrager presided and the musical numbers were furnished by the Royal Rosarian quartet.

Aged Man Shoots Wife

Napa, Cal., June 13.—(I. N. S.)—W. H. B. Schmidt, aged 90 years, shot his aged wife in the back, killing her instantly, and then sat down in a chair and shot himself with the revolver. The couple was found dead when neighbors entered the house late yesterday. Schmidt had been unbalanced for some time and had frequently threatened to kill himself and wife.

END OF BOLSHEVISM DUTY, GRADUATES OF WILLAMETTE WARNED

B. Frank Irvine Urges Effort to Make Spread of Propaganda in U. S. Impossible.

Willamette University, Salem, June 13.—"America is not finished. It is not perfect, but that is a challenge for you graduates to help finish it," said B. Frank Irvine, associate editor of The Journal and an alumnus of the class of 1917, in his commencement address to the 30 graduates of Willamette university at the seventy-fifth commencement held in the First M. E. church.

Mr. Irvine spoke on "Work for Graduates" and appealed for the enlistment of the services of all graduates especially to deliver the United States and the world from Bolshevism.

In opening his address Mr. Irvine paid high tribute to Willamette university and congratulated the seniors upon graduating from this school. Being a former student of Willamette, he said, no single experience in all his life had contributed so much toward making him what he is today as the training, the personal touch and influence of Willamette.

Mr. Irvine gave a resume of the conditions of devastated Eastern Europe. He compared Russia to a gigantic madhouse, a vast slaughter house, and explained the effects of sudden freedom to a people of whom 80 per cent are illiterate. He dwelt upon the situation in France, considering France to be in a state of suspended apprehension. In England he described the parliament as shrinking from the advance of Bolshevism and the United States as in grave danger from the same source. He exhorted the class to oppose such tendencies by making our country so fair, honest, just and beautiful that such propaganda would be impossible.

In considering the last election in Oregon, in which only 25 per cent of the voters availed themselves of their opportunity, he compared the patriotism of those who would not come out to vote for vital measures to the mother who had given her son a bad example.

In closing Mr. Irvine paid a wonderful tribute to the brave mothers who have sent their boys go out, not to return. He concluded by reading the poem, "Young Fellow, My Lad," telling of the 17-year-old boy who gave all, who put his all in a gold star.
