

STANDARD RULES ARE ADOPTED FOR LIVESTOCK SHOWS

Representatives of Three Big
Northwest Expositions Meet
Here and Reach an Agreement.

EXPOSITION DATES CHOSEN

Herds on Coast Have Increased
75 Per Cent in Two Years and
Fine Animals Are Being Grown.

Adoption of standard rules and classifications for entries of livestock exhibits to the three big Northwest expositions were agreed upon at a conference in the office of O. M. Plummer, manager of the Pacific International Livestock exposition, Thursday afternoon. O. P. Hendershott of Boise, secretary and manager of the state fair of Idaho and of the Northwest livestock show at Boise, and W. L. Hendershott, manager of the Washington state fair and the Western royal livestock show at Spokane, and Mr. Plummer were present.

Rules and classifications agreed upon, practically conform with those of the International Livestock exposition held each year at Chicago. Their adoption will enable the stock raiser who prepares his exhibit for either of the three Northwest livestock expositions to enter it without change in the other two expositions.

SET EXPOSITION DATES
Dates set for the Northwest expositions are as follows: Western Royal Livestock show at Spokane, November 3 to 7, inclusive; Northwest Livestock show at Lewiston, Idaho, November 9 to 14, inclusive; and Pacific International Livestock exposition at Portland, November 17 to 22, inclusive. Dates set for the International Livestock show at Chicago are November 23 to December 3, inclusive.

"In the past each of the livestock shows of the Northwest has been held independently and in competition with the other two," said Mr. Plummer. They have now decided to cooperate and work together for the advancement of the stock breeding industry.

All advertising matter sent out by these shows will bear the dates of all three expositions and special attention will be called to the fact that rules and classifications of the three shows are identical.

ENTER BEFORE OCTOBER 15
Entries of exhibits for the three Northwest shows will close October 15, and, according to the managers in conference here Thursday, all entries received after that date will be rejected. Efforts will be made to induce livestock breeders to make their entries to all three shows on the same date. All stock entered will be released at 4 o'clock in the afternoon of the last day of the show and train service will be arranged in advance by the various managements to take exhibits to the next show on the circuit.

Premiums for the three shows aggregate \$115,000, and, according to Hendershott, this is the largest amount offered by any three shows on short circuit in the United States. Appropriations from the state legislature of Idaho to the Lewiston show amount to \$45,000; the Pacific International Livestock exposition has received appropriations of \$61,000 from the Oregon legislature and \$10,000 from the Washington legislature. **BIG PRIZES OFFERED**

The Western Royal Livestock show at Spokane offers a total of \$100,000 for the best carload of swine and for the best carload of fat stock. According to Tennant this is the largest premium offered on these classes of exhibits in the United States. The Western Royal show will have 10 acres under cover, and buildings being constructed for the exposition in the Spokane Union stockyards will cost \$150,000.

Hendershott declared that the Western Royal Livestock show at Spokane was practically fathered and built up by the cooperation of the livestock interests of Idaho and Oregon and Tennant stated that the same spirit of cooperation exists in the case of the Pacific International Livestock exposition. "A big bunch of Spokane people are buying stock in the Pacific International Livestock exposition as if our city were a suburb of Portland," he declared.

Tennant managed the exhibits at the Portland Livestock show in 1917. The attendance that year was 45,000, and he estimated that the attendance of the Northwest fair had increased practically 75 per cent during the past two years, indicating that the attendance here this year will run to 75,000.

Railroad Booklet Has War Letters

A booklet containing hundreds of letters from O. W. R. & N. boys at the front and in camps, acknowledging Christmas greetings of their fellow employees during the 1919 holidays and relating some thrilling experiences, has been compiled by the war auxiliary of the O. W. R. Through collections obtained from employees of the railroad last year thousands of dollars were received, and from this fund relief was given families of the soldiers and a check was sent to each. The booklet contains 70 pages, each with a message from soldier employees of the shops, yards and offices.

Wife of Corvallis Physician Injured

Mrs. H. P. Pernot, wife of a prominent physician of Corvallis, suffered a fractured hip and minor injuries Thursday when the automobile in which she was riding was hit by an automobile at East Sixth street and Hawthorne avenue. The automobile was thrown upon the curb and between two telephone poles, while the force of the collision hurled Mrs. Pernot out of the car to the curb. She was taken to St. Vincent's hospital.

Associated Oil to Spend \$250,000 on Linnton Buildings

The Associated Oil company has completed plans for the construction of a group of buildings at Linnton representing an investment of approximately \$250,000. A large reinforced concrete warehouse, which will also house the company's business offices, will be 125 by 210 feet in dimensions. A garage building, 32 by 180 feet, will be of concrete with wood trusses, and a loading rack and shed, 14 by 60 feet, will be of heavy steel frame. Concrete retaining walls will be constructed around oil storage tanks and there will be a small concrete building 20 by 30 feet in dimensions.

Plans are being prepared for a large bunkhouse and a group of cottages for the accommodation of employees of the oil company and these, it is estimated, will cost approximately \$100,000. According to A. L. Parker, local manager of the Associated Oil company, building operations will begin immediately.
