Secretary and Treasurer of the Boilermakers Alleged to Have Disappeared With \$500 Money

H. A. Elder, secretary and treasurer of the local boilermakers' union was indicted this morning by the Multnomah county grand jury on a charge of larceny by embezzlement. Mr. Elder is charged with having absconded with \$500 which came into his hands in the course of his duties as treasurer of the labor organization.

NO TRACE OF HIM

No trace of him has been found since his disappearance. His automobile, in which he was last seen, was found outside of a public garage the day after his departure.
