

### MAN SHOT WHILE SITTING ON PORCH

Bullet Does Not Pierce Skull; Boys Firing Recklessly Are Believed Responsible.

F. N. Worden, 1609 Sixth street, was shot in the side of the head and seriously wounded Thursday while visiting his brother, A. J. Worden, on Errol Heights. The injured man was sitting on the porch at his brother's home conversing with members of the family, when a bullet from a .32 caliber rifle struck him in the side of the head, knocking him from his chair to the floor. He was carried into the house in an unconscious condition and a physician summoned.

The bullet did not penetrate the skull, but inflicted a painful scalp wound. Worden will recover, according to attending physicians.

Witnesses declare that they did not hear the shot fired and have no idea as to who is responsible for the shooting. A. J. Worden's home is in Rochester, avenue, just outside the city limits, and neighbors say that it is a common occurrence for boys with rifles to visit the district in quest of birds and other small game.

### Plans Discussed to Raise Funds to Get Hospital in Siberia

Plans for raising \$2500 to aid in establishing a unit of the American Woman's hospital in Siberia were discussed at a meeting of the Medical club of Portland, which was held Tuesday in the office of Dr. Jesse M. McGavin, in the Medical building. It was learned that owing to the deadly work of the typhus germ in Siberia is left with less than 150 surgeons. The women physicians of America wish to send a hospital unit to them as soon as possible, and work will be begun at once to raise the necessary money.

### Policemen Are Shot In Big Fight With Three Bank Holdups

St. Louis, June 12.—(I. N. S.)—Two policemen were shot and seriously wounded in a battle with three bank robbers who held up the Meramec Trust company Thursday afternoon.

In their attempt to escape the robbers dropped a satchel full of silver. The amount stolen has not been estimated.

A little girl was shot during the revolver duel, but it is not known how seriously she was wounded.

### Astoria Girls Are Placed in Home

Astoria, June 12.—As a result of Chief of Police Carlson's program to make Astoria spotless morally, 16 Astoria girls, most of whom are between 15 and 17 years of age, have been escorted out of Astoria. The girls have been taken to a Portland detention home.

### Influenza Cause of Death of Three in Week in Hood River

Hood River, June 12.—Coincident with the chilly weather of the week end, death has claimed three sufferers from influenza in this section. Mrs. Mary A. Noble, one of Hood River's old time residents, died from pneumonia following influenza. Mrs. Virginia B. Van Ausdal, daughter of J. I. Miller, well known rancher of the lower valley, was the second victim. Will Ogden, known throughout this section for his war work record, died Sunday. The public health officer has put a ban on public funerals, and the body will be sent east to his old home for burial. Latest reports available indicate that with improving climatic conditions this, the third wave of the epidemic, is gradually abating.

**EUROPEAN TRIP WILL BE MADE BY HOOD RIVER FRUIT MAN**

**MAYOR WILL APPLY TO STATE FOR SURVEY OF HOOD RIVER**

Hood River, June 12.—As a result of the opinion expressed by Deputy State Fire Marshal Gilbert Allen, who has just completed an inspection of the city, Mayor Scobee will apply to the state for a survey of the city in the near future. Admitting that the water pressure was all that could be desired and that the man power of the brigade was efficient, he stated that the fire hazard was great because apparatus at the disposal of the brigade is inadequate, while the hydrants in a number of cases would be useless in the event of a big fire. Of the many large warehouses in the city, he found that only two were good fire risks. The condition will be remedied immediately, the mayor said.

### Body Taken From Grave Third Time For Murder Trial

Lawrence, Mass., June 12.—(U. P.)—The first step in what is expected to become the greatest battle between medical experts ever fought in Massachusetts courts was taken Thursday when the body of Miss Florence Gay, Andover school teacher, for the alleged murder of whom Mrs. Beattie May Lundgren is on trial here, was exhumed for the third time.

The body was removed from its grave in Andover and brought here. The defense's medical experts examined the viscera of the dead woman in an effort to gain evidence to refute the state's charge that Miss Gay died of arsenic poisoning, alleged to have been administered by Mrs. Lundgren who nursed the teacher in her last illness.
