WILHELM PLAYS FINALS AGAINST MACLEAY TODAY

Watson Bested in Match Yesterday Because of Poor Putting and Styxie; Champion in Top Form in Match With White; Perfect With Mashie.

RUDOLPH WILHELM, state golf champion, will defend his crown against R. L. Macleay in the finals of the 1919 tournament over the Waverley Country club course today. The match will be over 36 holes.

Macleay advanced into the finals by triumphing over Forest Watson 2 up and 1 to play, while Wilhelm, playing his best game, eliminated Andrew F. White, 5 up and 4. The champion scored a 72 after finishing up with 5 and 6 on the seventeenth and eighteenth, respectively.

The defeat of Watson was the first upset of the tourney, although it was predicted by some that Macleay would be one of the finalists. Watson attributed his defeat to his poor putting and to a styxie on the seventeenth. Several times during the match, Watson doubled 2 and 3 foot putts.

Macleay played a steady game, turning in a 76 medal score, while Watson made a 77, despite his erratic work on the greens.

Wilhelm was in top form all during his match with White, coming in with 3 under 4. His mashie shots were almost perfect, two beautiful shots being made with this club on the ninth and thirteenth holes, the last one spelling Waterloo for White, who was off color in his putting also.

TAKES LEAD ON SECOND

Wilhelm took the lead in his match on the second hole, when White dubbed a short putt after both had reached the green on their second shot. The third was halved with fours and Wilhelm won the fourth and fifth holes with five, White's poor putting putting champion 3 up. The sixth and seventh were halved, both playing par golf, and White won his first hole when he holed a 35-foot putt on the eighth. On the ninth, Wilhelm backed his drive over near the first tee, but laid his mashie dead to the pin for a three, halving the hole.

Turning with two up, Wilhelm continued his great playing and won the tenth with a four. The eleventh was halved with threes and Wilhelm scored three on the twelfth—410-golf hole—by laying a midiron short near the pin. A wonderful mashie shot on the thirteenth won the match for Wilhelm, as the fourteenth was halved in three, White missed another chance when he missed a short putt on the tenth. The champion's score was 72, one stroke above par for the course.

MACLEAY GETS START

After halving the first hole with Watson, Macleay, who is staging a comeback, won the next three holes. On the second, Macleay played a great mashie shot and holed on the green. Watson topped his drive into the bunker. Watson was in a bunker on the third, while Macleay holed out in par. Both holed the fourth in two strokes, but a miss on a short putt put Macleay three up. The next two holes were halved, and Watson won the eighth when he holed a 35-foot putt.

As in the Wilhelm-White match, Macleay was two up at the turn and won the tenth when Watson missed another short putt. The eleventh was halved and Watson won the twelfth with a four, reaching the green in two strokes, while Macleay was short on his second. On the thirteenth Macleay topped both his drive and mashie, Watson winning the hole, cutting down Macleay's lead to 1 up.

MASHIE SHOT HELPS Macleay made a wonderful mashie shot on the bunker on the thirteenth and halved the hole and on the fourteenth Watson was short on his mashie shot, while Macleay was going stronger and the match neared its end.

The players halved the sixteenth and on the seventeenth Macleay laid Watson a styxie when the young player's ball was a few inches from the lip of the cup. Macleay's ball rolled down a few inches in front of Watson's and it was almost impossible to play it, although Watson made an effort to do so with his mashie, but failed.
