

WOMEN CENSURE BATHING GIRLS IN FESTIVAL PARADE

Portland Federation Approves of
the Carnival With Exception
of Mads Garbed for Water.

SOCIAL SURVEY IS PLANNED

Park and Playground Directors
Criticized; Standing Commit-
tees for Year Are Appointed.

The Portland Federation of Women's Organizations held its final meeting for the season Saturday afternoon at the Hotel Portland with a large attendance. Mrs. G. J. Frankel, president of the federation, who acted as chairman of the committee which sent rose buds to the Shrine convention at Indianapolis, reported that between 12,000 and 15,000 beautiful long-stemmed roses were sent to the women of the federation responding very generously with their time, roses and automobiles.

Mrs. Frankel also reported that during the three days of the festival, the federation maintained a booth in the festival center where choice rose buds were given to out-of-town visitors. Mrs. Edna A. Bell was in general charge of the booth and was assisted by a different corps of helpers each day. Thousands of roses were distributed.

BATHING GIRLS DISAPPROVED

It was voted to send a vote of commendation to the Rose Festival board on the success of the recent carnival, but expressing disapproval of the "bathing girls" who paraded and of the attractions shown in the "Lane of Laughter." The recent unauthorized use of the name of the federation in sponsoring a function, was called to attention and a protest was entered. Mrs. N. A. Johnson, president of the Big Sisterhood, called to the attention of the federation the alleged inefficiency on the part of park and playground directors in the public parks of the city. A resolution was passed asking that the grocery stores close their places of business on Wednesday afternoons during July and August.

SOCIAL SURVEY PLANNED

Upon the request of Mrs. Aristene Felts, a former member of the federation but now a resident of Washington, where she is engaged in social work, a comprehensive survey of social conditions in Portland will be made and Mrs. M. L. T. Hilden was made chairman of the committee. The various clubs will be called upon to assist in this work as a summer activity of the organization.

The school bond issue was presented by Nelson G. Pike.

Mrs. Alexander Thompson, committee woman for Oregon of the Democratic national committee, invited the members of the federation and their friends to attend the official luncheon to be given Monday, June 30, at the Hotel Benson in honor of Mrs. J. P. McCann of Chicago, head of the woman's bureau of the national Democratic committee. Homer L. Cummings, chairman of the Democratic national committee, will be a speaker on this occasion.

ELTON WATKINS NAMED DEPUTY U. S. ATTORNEY

Elton Watkins, since 1912 a practicing attorney in Portland, will succeed as deputy United States attorney on Monday John J. Beckman, who has held the office for five years. Mr. Beckman entered the service under Clarence L. Holmes, who preceded Bert Haney as United States attorney.

Mr. Beckman will form a partnership with John Manning, with offices in the Fenton building, in general criminal practice. Mr. Beckman has been associated in the prosecution of many of the famous cases before the district federal court here in the last several years, particularly in the large land fraud cases and the violations of the espionage act. Mr. Haney expressed regret at Mr. Beckman's leaving.

Elton Watkins, Mr. Beckman's successor, has been practicing in Portland since 1912. Before that time he was connected with the department of justice in Washington, D. C., and during the war devoted much of his time to secret service work on the espionage cases, giving valuable testimony in the Marie Roux and the I. W. W. cases. He was graduated in academic work at Washington Lee university and received his legal education at Georgetown university in Washington, D. C. He has been an active worker in the Red Cross and Liberty loan drives in this state, speaking in all important cities and many counties.

Automobile thieves broke loose again the closing night of the Rose Festival and stole eight cars, six of which had not been found by the police. Saturday night the machines belonging to C. Osborn of 3525 Sixty-eighth street southeast, F. E. Dinhot of 10 Tenth street, J. D. Lovell of Hood River and J. M. Gillis of 810 East Caruthers. Nearly every machine disappeared from the business section of the city.

After Mr. Gillis had reported his machine stolen he returned to the corner of Tenth and Commercial streets and waited for the car's return. At about 2:30 a. m. the boys were riding in it appeared on the scene and were about to park the machine from where it had been taken, when Gillis caught them. One of the boys proved to be Robert Burroughs, 14, an escapee from a state training school officer, for whom the police have been looking for two days. The other boy was Leo Buckbee, 13. Both are charged with the larceny of an automobile. The Burroughs boy will be returned to Salem and the juvenile court will handle the case against Buckbee.

Aviator's Body Is Sent to Walla Walla Saturday for Burial

The body of W. B. Hutchinson, former United States army aviator, who lost his life in the airplane disaster at Eastmoreland on Friday evening, was taken Saturday to the flyer's Walla Walla home for burial by relatives, who came here Saturday morning. The body of Sergeant John Milkowski is at the county morgue awaiting disposition at the hands of the army authorities.

To arrange for transferring Mr.

Hutchinson's body to Walla Walla, his mother, wife, sister, his wife's parents and his sister-in-law came to Portland Saturday. Their first news of the tragedy was received through newspaper reports, although Coroner Earl Smith wired to the sheriff at Dayton, Wash., near where the dead aviator lived on a ranch, immediately after the accident.

Hutchinson's unskilled business here was taken in hand Saturday by E. W. Hester, his father-in-law, who will endeavor to ascertain the company with which the wrecked Curtiss airplane was insured. Mr. Hester will remain in Portland until he has cleared up his son-in-law's affairs.

In the meantime the coroner and the parents have been unable to determine

a cause for the accident that cost the lives of the two flyers. That the tail of the big machine became jammed and prevented its proper manipulation, was the reason given by several army mechanics with the flying circus. Others declared that the balancing apparatus in the wings did not work, but all agree the engine was in excellent condition and said that the accident was certainly not from that cause, inasmuch as it was running when the fatal dive started. Mrs. R. P. Riggs of Dallas, Or., aunt of the dead aviator, was in the city when her nephew was killed. She arrived at the scene of the accident very soon after the machine crashed.

Woman Takes Poison
Mrs. Maud Seguin, residing at 412 East Yamhill street took poison in the Clifford hotel Saturday night and is in a serious condition. She was removed to the Good Samaritan hospital, where she refused to give the attendants any explanation for her desire to take her life.
