

LABOR MEETING FAVORS LEAGUE

Washington State Federation Puts
Stamp of Approval Upon
Covenant and Terms.

Bellingham, June 16.—Admonishing Senator Poindexter "to rise superior to petty politics for once and use his best endeavors to bring about the ratification of the covenant for a League of Nations, and the treaty of peace as formulated by the allies, as a patriotic duty," a resolution endorsing the covenant of the League of Nations was presented to the annual convention of the State Federation of Labor here today by the Spokane delegation.

The resolution condemns the attitude of certain senators and all others who are trying to place obstacles in the way of a speed peace and the league, and classifies such opposition as "palpably an attempt by petty politicians to bring discredit upon President Wilson."

U. S. Pacific Fleet To Equal Fleet on Atlantic Seacoast

Washington, June 17.—(L. N. S.)—A Pacific and Atlantic fleet, as nearly equal in strength as it is possible to make them, with an Atlantic fleet as the third unit, will be the peacetime distribution of the navy, Secretary Daniels has announced.

They will be commanded respectively by Admirals Hugh Rodman, Henry D. Wilson and C. B. Gleaves. The Atlantic fleet will consist of four divisions of battleships, two of cruisers, 15 of destroyers, three of submarines and two of mine-laying vessels. The Pacific fleet will be the same except for submarines, of which there will be two divisions.

"Now, what I want to find out is, where is the poor house located in your town and if you will admit me there, could you give me a room on the ground floor with one or two windows, as I have to have plenty of air in my condition, and what size are the rooms, and is toilet and water handy, and are the rooms all furnished with spring mattress, and is there any park or ground for us down and out to while away the time in, and are we allowed our liberty, and how are the rooms heated and lighted?"
