

VOTERS TO PICK DIRECTOR FROM THREE ON TICKET

Dr. J. Francis Drake, Present Chairman of Board, Will Be a Candidate for Re-election.

ELECTION NEXT SATURDAY

Trio of Office Seekers All Have Taken More or Less Interest in Civic and Other Affairs.

The names of three candidates for school director will appear on the school election ballot next Saturday. One is to be elected.

Dr. J. Francis Drake is at present chairman of the school board. He was born in Petaluma, Cal., and spent his earlier years in California and Nevada. He came to Portland some 20 years ago, receiving here his high school training. He has taken degrees from the law school of the University of Oregon and the Northern Pacific Dental college. For a number of years he was connected with the J. K. Gill company as an accountant. He is now a practicing dentist. He has two hobbies. One is botany, the other, the national guard. He classified the flowers of Oregon for the World's Columbian exposition and lectured on botany at the North Pacific School of Pharmacy. For 15 years he has been active in national guard work and is now commanding officer with the rank of major granted by federal military authorities. For five years he was identified with the organization of the Boys' Brigade. He is a Presbyterian.

OXFORD STUDENT

Arthur Cotton Newell was born in Madras, India. He won in competitive examination the classical scholarship at Balliol college, Oxford. He came to the United States and to Salt Lake City as tutor, served as high school principal and city superintendent of schools at Butte, Mont., as head of an Episcopal school at Ogden, Utah; later, in Butte, as head, first of a military academy and next of a private school. He came to Portland in 1901 to become head of the Bishop Scott Episcopal academy. For several years he has conducted successfully a private school in this city. During the war Mr. Newell served as secretary of the exemption board for No. 1 district, the duties of the work engaging about half his time. He is president of the Oregon Civic league, the organization which proposed the reconstruction convention out of which grew a number of legislative and industrial measures designed to meet the employment and other problems of the period following the war. He is an Episcopalian.

"SELF MADE" MAN

D. G. Tomasini was born in Switzerland near the Italian border and came to the United States when a boy of 13. He is largely self instructed. His business life was spent in San Francisco, where he dealt in provisions. Since he came to Oregon about a quarter of a century ago, he has not been engaged in active business, his personal income being sufficient for his needs. He has resided in Multnomah county, 24 years and in Portland 21 years. At one time he held a position under appointment of the county commission as assessor of weights and measures for Multnomah county and he also served as a deputy county clerk under John B. Coffey. He is prominent in the Masonic order. He is not a member of any church.

FINISH ELEVATOR BY OCTOBER, PLAN

Building engineer in aid of elevator construction was announced to begin on that day, joined in a statement that the addition of \$15,000 to the figures mentioned would cover the total outlay for the elevator. The grain elevator, then, is to cost \$872,028.

"The \$15,000 referred to would undoubtedly have been required to cover additional expenses in costs of labor and materials under the terms of the contract," said Mr. Boschke.

CONTRACTORS RELIEVED

The dock commission took over the completion of the grain elevator, relieving the Grant Smith company of its contract at the contractor's request.

Some confusion has resulted from the payment of \$150,000 by the dock commission to the Grant Smith company as a final settlement. This amount, it was explained, did not constitute a bonus. For work performed the contractor demanded a total of \$860,508.18. Actual payments made by the dock commission, according to figures compiled by J. R. Black, expert accountant employed by the dock commission, aggregated \$495,618.18. The balance claimed by the contractor was \$195,455.88. The amount offered in settlement by the dock commission was \$150,000 and this amount was accepted by the contractor.

THREE SHIFTS

Speed has become the first essential in the big job to which the dock commission has set itself. Materials have practically all been assembled. Machinery is on the ground. Mr. Hegardt and Mr. Boschke have decided to put on three shifts of workers, brilliantly illuminating the scene at night with electric lights.

A total of some 700 men will be employed and the engineers are confident the men can be obtained. One part of the work will not be kept waiting on any other part, it is announced. As soon as the place has been provided for a machine it will be moved in. Installation of equipment will proceed while the

roof is being put on the storage annex or grain bins and while concrete is being poured for the operating house. The basis of the dock commission's determination to take over the completion of the grain elevator on force account is its announced belief that subsidence of the ponderous structure has ceased and that it has been permanently controlled by the driving of "pinch piling" at the northeast corner of the grain bins. While the confidence of the dock commission is not shared by some, there is practically unanimous expression of hope that the commission will prove to have judged accurately.

LEAVE STRUCTURE

Engineer Boschke has devised a spread foundation for the operating house and he believes it will be unnecessary to remove the structure from its present location. It was first thought the operating house, which is much taller than the grain bins, might have to be moved farther west where the soil is firmer. From the cement mat, capping the bins, support the grain bins, some 27,000,000 pounds of sand are being withdrawn, and Mr. Boschke says the elevator, when complete and loaded with wheat, will impose a load of only about 6000 pounds a square foot on its foundation and the operating house about 4000 pounds on each square foot of its spread foundation.

WILSON ASKED TO SPEAK IN OREGON

Secretary Tumulty Sent Message Asking That President Come to This State During Tour.

President Wilson is invited to come to Oregon during his contemplated tour of the United States, upon his return from France, in a message sent Tuesday evening by Dr. J. W. Morrow, Democratic national committeeman from Oregon, to Secretary Tumulty.

It is expected that people of the state who wish to learn more fully the inner secrets of the peace conference, and the demands of the League of Nations upon the United States, will join in the invitation to the president.

The message sent by National Committeeman Morrow was as follows: "I understand President Wilson expects to make a tour of the states immediately on his return from Europe. Will you extend to him, on behalf of the people of this state, an invitation to visit Oregon and address the people on the peace treaty and the League of Nations?"

Boys Living Along Sullivan's Gulch Endangering Lives

Boys living along Sullivan's gulch in the vicinity of East Tenth street are engaging in a dangerous practice, according to a report made to the police by the Warren Construction company. The company complained that the boys turn cars loose on the company's sidetrack every night and allow them to run down on the main track of the O-W. R. & N. line. Officer J. J. Forkan arrived on the scene Tuesday evening in time to find two cars running wild. He scoured the neighborhood and secured the names of two boys who are said to have admitted being connected with the gang. For the past week the Warren Construction company had had to hire men to push the cars back on the siding, as the switch engine only passes that point once a day.

Degrees Conferred

New Haven, Conn., June 18.—(I. N. S.)—The climax of Yale's victory commencement week came today when the university distributed honorary degrees to General William Josiah Snow of the army, Rear Admiral William Snowden Sims of the navy, Orville Wright and other men of notable achievement in war work. The concluding exercises marking the end of the 219th year of the institution were held in Woolsey hall.

Since the armistice the American Red Cross commission for Belgium has distributed \$1,460,000 for the benefit of various Belgian charitable works.

HAMMER AND TIN PAN RECOMMENDED

State Fire Warden Issues Warning Against Use of Fireworks on Fourth.

Salem, Or., June 18.—A special need for precaution is sounded by Harvey Wells, state fire marshal, in his annual Fourth of July warning issued Tuesday, which reads as follows:

"Owing to the tremendous enthusiasm which will mark the observance on the part of the American people of the Fourth of July this year, I feel that it is my duty as fire marshal of this state to call your attention to the danger of the use of fireworks and other forms of explosives that are usually used in celebrating Independence day.

"Realizing the popular enthusiasm, I am giving the warning with no idea of attempting to discourage a proper expression of the great patriotic impulse underlying it. I do, however, most earnestly appeal to the people to keep the enthusiasm within safe and sane channels.

"It has come to my attention that in many localities throughout the state plans are already being made for a great community observance, with rousing home coming celebrations for the return of fighting men as the big feature. I cannot too strongly express my indorsement of such celebration, but do urge all city officials to take the initiative in protecting and safeguarding lives and property.

"Each city and village official is empowered by statute to regulate, restrain and prohibit the sale or the use of fireworks—Roman candles, skyrocket and other pyrotechnic display.

"I will ask all officials to seriously consider the regulation of the use of fireworks in order to protect our lives and property—this is a responsibility incurred upon every official.

"Let us keep the Fourth of July carelessness under the ban.

"Let us not increase the casualty list and needless fires, but be safe and sane, and anyone who must make a hole, I would suggest a hammer and a tin pan."

Lads Charged With Theft to Be Turned Over to Grand Jury

George Wood, Waldemar Larson and Clifford Kier, three youths suspected of having robbed the store of Ben Selling several weeks ago, will be turned over to city authorities here following the disposition of their cases at Ukiah, Cal., where they are being held on a charge of grand larceny. This was the word received today from Sheriff R. R. Byrnes of California by Deputy District Attorney Sam Flores. The matter will be laid before the grand jury today. It is said that part of the goods taken from Mr. Selling's store were found in the boys' possession in California and is being returned to Portland.

Two Soldiers and Two Civilians Are Killed at Juarez

Washington, June 18.—(U. P.)—American casualties in the skirmishing around Juarez were two civilians and two sol-

diers killed, two soldiers severely wounded and eight soldiers and four civilians slightly wounded. General Cabell advised the war department today.

The civilian casualties were the result of shots fired into El Paso by the villistas.

The American expedition into Mexico after Villistas is regarded by the Mexican government as "a closed incident" and there will be no formal protest to this government, it was authoritatively stated today.

Strong representations have been made by American officials in Mexico to the Mexican government for protection of Americans in the disturbed areas of Mexico, the state department announced today.

A state department dispatch from Juarez said Juarez is quiet and there is no evidence of ill feeling by Mexicans toward Americans.

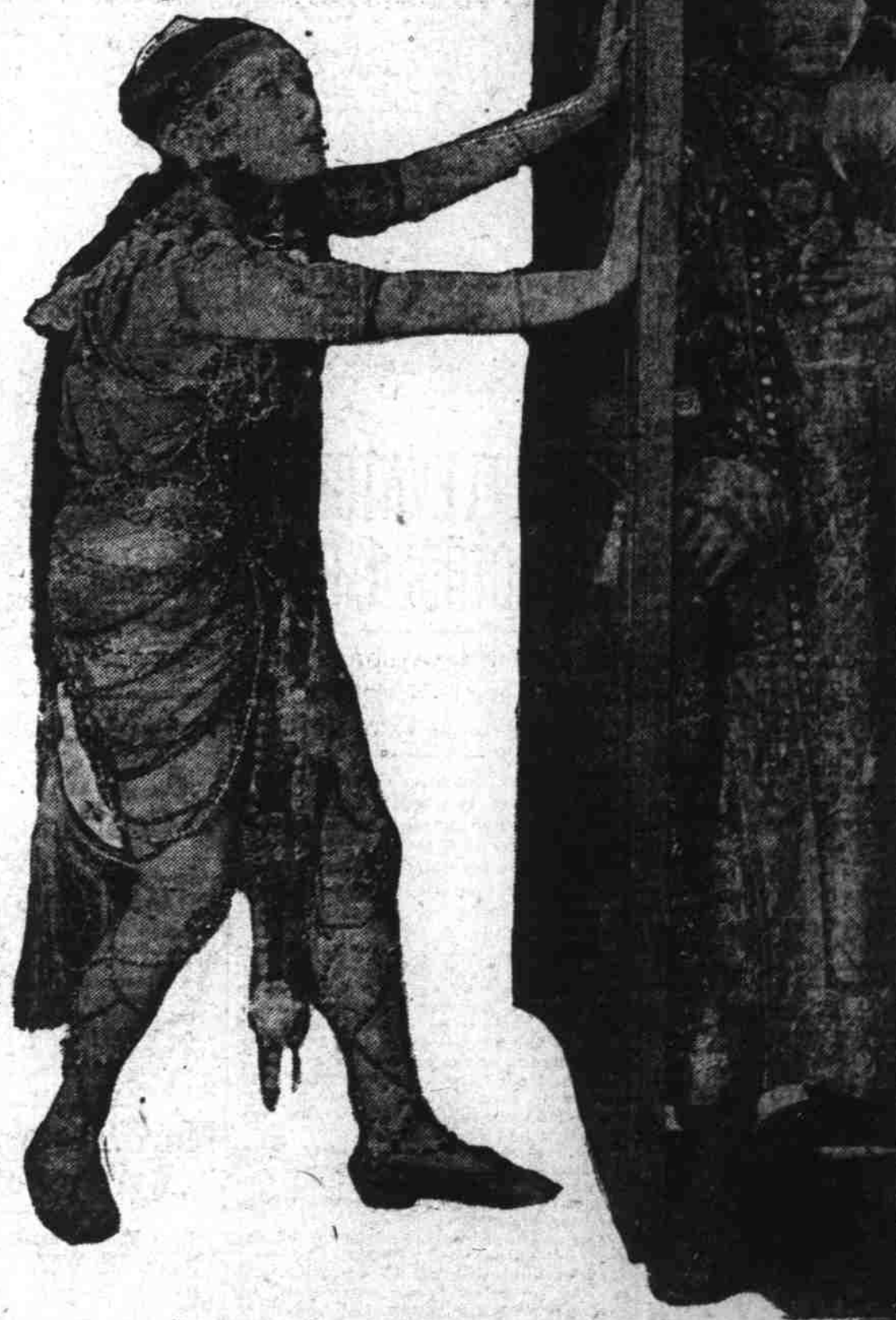
