

MANY IMPORTANT COMMISSIONS TO COME WITH PEACE

United States to Be Represented on Most of Bodies Created by League of Nations.

PERMANENT COURT PLANNED

Tribunal of International Justice May Have Important Place in History of World Hereafter.

Washington, June 21.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—The ratification of the treaty of peace, with the covenant of the League of Nations, will bring into existence over a score of international commissions of importance, besides a number of others of minor character.

Upon the most of these the United States will be represented, and one of the most important class of appointments of future administrations will be the representatives to serve upon these international tribunals. Most important of these will be:

One representative on the council of the League of Nations.

Not more than three representatives on the assembly of the league.

ONE WILL BE AMERICAN

One of the five judges who will return a verdict in the case of humanity versus William Hohenzollern.

One delegate upon the reparations commission of seven members, and one assistant delegate.

One member of the mixed arbitral tribunal with Germany to determine a variety of claims for damages growing out of the war.

Four members on the international organization of labor, two designated by the government, one by employers, one by workers.

One of the 12 governors of the international labor office appointed by governments of greatest industrial importance.

OTHER COMMISSIONS LATER

In addition to the above, who may be regarded as most important of the entire number, it is definitely known that America will have representatives on other international commissions, and men of this country may be chosen on still others, where the membership is later to be determined.

There will be a permanent commission to advise the council of the League of Nations on military and naval questions, and another to advise the council on the conduct of the mandates of the weaker countries.

A military interallied commission of control will supervise execution of the terms of the treaty, with naval and aeronautical commissions for like purposes.

Each government is to appoint an agent to present debt questions to the mixed arbitral tribunals.

NOT OF SMALL COMMISSIONS

In addition to the two labor bodies before mentioned, each nation will appoint three members to a commission of inquiry, from which selections will be made to investigate complaints, and an international labor organization commission of seven, one representative each from the United States, Great Britain, France, Italy, Japan, Belgium and Switzerland.

A commission on repatriation of German prisoners of war will be named with an unspecified number of representatives for the allies.

On a number of boundary and governing commissions the United States will not be represented. Thus there will be a commission to delimit the German-Belgian frontier, one to govern the Saar basin, another to trace the Saar boundaries, and others for East Prussia, Poland-Germany, Poland-Czechoslovakia, Danzig, Schleswig, and for the regulation of commerce on the Rhine, Elbe, Oder, Niemen and Danube rivers.

RESTRICTIONS RAISED ON IMPORT ARTICLES REQUIRED BY BRITAIN

Numerous Wood Articles Among Those Which May Now Be Brought Into Country.

Restrictions on the importation of numerous wood products have been lifted wholly or partially by Great Britain, according to an announcement made recently by A. E. Browne, acting British consul at Portland. The British import regulations have been amended to admit numerous articles which were formerly shipped from this port to British merchants. Articles on which regulations have been lifted entirely include:

Cases of all description, manufactured and unmanufactured carpet whisks, wood heels, wooden hoops and ends for barrels, boat oars, wood-wool beehive appliances, wooden cedar pencil slats, small turned wooden boxes and tubes, ply wood chair seats, wooden reels and spools, woodwork for offices and schools, door handles and practically all classes of hardware.

OTHER ARTICLES LICENSED

Importation of a number of articles to be licensed only when required are also listed. Some of these are as follows: Dowels, broom handles, curtain rods, clog soles, pulleys, wooden pressed moulding, turned shafts for golf clubs, wooden tool handles of all descriptions, wash boards, bobbins, wooden plugs for paper reels, wooden ice safes and refrigerators, boot and shoe lasts, office and institution furniture, including roll-top desks, cabinets and chairs, domestic furniture of all kinds, wooden wheels, manufactures of aluminum, celluloid, locks, perfume and toilet regulations, electric toys, dairy machinery and wooden roofing.

PORTLANDER RETURNS AFTER WINNING CROSS WITH CANADIAN UNIT

DeWitt Lyons Harry Was in War for Three Years and Fought in Many Battles.

Three times wounded, possessor of a distinguished conduct medal consisting of the split Victoria Cross, and recipient of a reward of \$100 for gallantry in action, DeWitt Lyons Harry, son of G. Y. Harry, United States labor conciliator of 495 Tillamook street, has returned to Portland after nearly three years' service overseas with the Canadian army.

The young soldier received his medal and money award for distinguished conduct while serving with the 27th (City of Winnipeg) battalion, sixth regiment, Second Canadian division. The split Victoria Cross is second to the highest honor bestowed by the British. The Victoria Cross alone is higher.

Mr. Harry was formerly a member of the Oregon National guard, where he served three years with the Third regiment, and five years with battery A. During his engagements overseas he participated in a number of big battles. He took part in the defense of Arras when the Germans made their big drive in March of last year, and was in the

battles of Passchendaele, Ypres, Kemmel mountain, Amiens and the second battle of Arras. He was at the Drocourt-Queant switch when the Canadian forces smashed the Hindenburg line, and participated in the battles of Canal du Nord, Burdon Wood and Mons.

The Canadians had just attained their objective at 10:30 a. m. on the day of the suspension of hostilities, which occurred at 11 o'clock.

Following the victorious ending of the war for the allies, Harry accompanied his contingent on the march to the Rhine, and was at Cologne just before being ordered home.

Mr. Harry was a member of the staff of the Minneapolis Tribune when he enlisted.

Sheep Buyers in Baker Inquiring Into Conditions

Baker, June 21.—Bert M. Roberts, western agent of the South St. Joseph (Mo.) Stockyards company, with headquarters in Denver, and Harry B. Black, representing his own sheep commission company of South St. Joseph, are spending several days in Baker county, meeting the leading stockmen in Eastern Oregon and gaining a general insight into stock conditions in this territory. Both have visited Baker before.

Mr. Black is a pioneer sheep buyer in this section, his first visit dating back to 1896, when he shipped out of Eastern Oregon counties 86,000 head of sheep.

It is said in Washington that Secretary Daniels will come to the Pacific coast in August with the big Atlantic fleet.
